THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

The Rectory,  
Ackworth.

My dear People,

I am very grateful for the time I have spent in Ackworth. It has been a great experience. No one could have received greater kindness than I have done. My wife, who has been here only a short time, my mother and I, who have been here since 1971, are all sorry to go. We shall miss many friends. We shall miss our lovely churches. We shall miss the character and variety of Ackworth, and its great beauty. We shall miss the united services with the other churches and Ackworth's unforced oecumenism.

I shall have been nearly thirty years in the West Riding and in the Wakefield Diocese. It has been a wonderful time, as a curate in Brighouse, as Vicar of Lundwood, and here at Ackworth. I have learned a lot in each place. There has been so much to cheer and to encourage in the firm faith and great dignity of so many people faced with the great trials of so many people.

To be a parish priest is to be uniquely privileged. There is no other calling in this world to compare with it. I know things are supposed to have changed beyond recognition since the War. Superficially that is so. The things that really matter are still the same. Real people in the parishes have still the same real needs. The priest's work remains the same, his duties as they have always been. The priest of the Church of England is still the Parson of the whole parish, and he is in his parish for all God's people in that place. God loves all the people, simply because they are His, and the priest is here as the minister of God's love to all those people. We know that things are not as they should be. But they never have been. And now, as always, God works out His purpose, often most powerfully in places and among people where things are apparently least as they should be. People worry tremendously about poor leadership in the Church as a whole, but what really matters is what is happening in ordinary parishes. At worst Bishops and General Synod members can only demoralize and discourage the faithful laity and the parochial clergy. At best they can only encourage. And best of those effects is more lastingly achieved, or more swiftly undone, by what happens in the relationship between priest and people in the parish. The Church is built up by the cooperation of the Church in the parish with God's activity in that place and among that people and in the lives of individuals there.

I pray that I may continue to learn from the faithful laity in Farnworth and Kearsley. I pray that you may soon be given a faithful and loving priest and that together you will be used by God to do great things for Him in Ackworth.

Thankyou for all the love and kindness you have shown me and mine. Thankyou for having us.

## AIREDALE'S HALF CENTURY



JULY 14th is the 50th anniversary of the Consecration of Holy Cross at Airedale, and at a sung Mass that day the preacher will be Bishop John Daly who was Vicar when the church was built and who became Bishop of the Gambia and the Rio Pongas, and later of Korea.

At the time of building in 1934 the population of the parish was less than 5000 — now the figure is 26,000 with more building planned in the parish boundaries!

**SEA SUNDAY — July 8th.** *The Church's ministry to seafarers is the particular concern of The Missions to Seamen, working within port cities and towns to bring together the seafaring community and the local Christian community. ## KEN UNWIN, ARCHDEACON OF PONTEFRACT, WRITES . . .

**JULY** — and your holidays are probably just around the corner! Where is it to be this year? Oberamagau, the Costa Brava, back to the cottage in Wales? — or none at all?

**THE REVOLUTION IN HOLIDAYS** which has taken place since the war is second to none. Increased affluence and cheaper travel mean it's no longer Blackpool or perhaps the Lake District for a week if you are lucky, but, for many, it's some exotic place for a fortnight. It is good that this is possible for more and more because holidays are, for most of us, the only time in the year when we totally break out of routine and meet new people, see new places and get a wider vision of the world. They should for Christians be a stimulus for praise, and also perhaps an opportunity for new experience of worship with other Christians.



But we do not have to travel thousands of miles to have a holiday of value. One of our best family holidays was a war-time one spent only 12 miles from home; another was a 'locum' at Ilkley. And I suppose they were good because holidays are, in any case, a time for cementing family relationships. Indeed, they are cementing points for years after, either through memories recalled or via the family snapshot album.

But there is also another dimension to the subject. For every person looking forward to a holiday this year, there will be one for whom there will be no holiday. There are the three million unemployed and their families; there are the families of miners on strike; there are those too old, too ill, too lonely, to take a holiday.

It is good that Christians, through a variety of agencies, can help some to have a holiday who desperately need it who otherwise would not. For several years we had children from poor London homes come to taste the delights of Yorkshire through the Children's Country Holidays Association. Children from Northern Ireland too have benefitted from parishes willing to provide hospitality. And the Mothers' Union in our own diocese have two caravans to give a break to families under stress.

Perhaps nowhere are the inequalities in our society more marked than in the holidays we take — or cannot take. Our prick of conscience should not make us enjoy ours the less, but ensure that we make such enjoyment possible for more.

# MISSION FILE

## DETERMINATION IN NO SHORT SUPPLY

IN MAY we introduced DAVID and MARION BARTLETT, missionaries with USPG in Tanzania, and heard something of David's work as Priest-in-Charge of Kwa Mkono.

Marion is Doctor in charge of Kwa Mkono hospital and in charge of medical work in the Diocese. There is also a hostel for polio children at Kwa Mkono. Life, says Marion, is fascinating, and by no means a rest cure! The work load at the hospital, the amount of clinical medicine, surgery and midwifery, and the very active Preventive Medicine and Health Programme never cease to amaze her. But work is hampered by a shortage of drugs and other hospital supplies, and outreach to the villages is perpetually jeopardised by shortage of diesel for the Land Rover and lack of spares. The hospital building programme is also thwarted by supplies running out. Cement has been right off the market for several months.

The work goes on. Marion is able to operate on hernias and do Caesarian sections, as well as a lot of smaller operations. It's work that requires determination, especially the Health Education programme, when surrounded by screaming and shouting mothers and children demanding medicine, injections, and supplementary food rations, and all this amid the pressures to single out the few urgently ill babies needing treatment for malaria or gastro-enteritis or pneumonia.

One of the things that makes all the difference to Marion's work is the magnificent supply of bandages from people in the U.K. Parcels need to be strongly done up, and a list of what is in them enclosed (to deter tampering). They can be posted direct to Dr. Marion Bartlett, St. Francis Church, P.O. Kwa Mkono, Handeni District, Tanga Region, Tanzania. And if any nurse knows how to make many-tailed abdominal bandages, 8 to 12 of these would be most useful.

## Sunvil Travel TREASURES OF CYPRUS

*As a result of reading the very small print in SEE-LINK early last year, I wrote off to "Sunvil" (of whom I had never heard) for details of a tour of "Byzantine Cyprus" (of which I knew almost nothing). I was intrigued, it appealed, I booked and was hooked; so much so that by the third day of a ten-day-tour I had decided to return again this year.*

*The tour was expanded to be "The Treasures of Cyprus". These are many. Marvellous Roman mosaics, the Makarios collection of Icons, the Pierides collection of Antiquities in the Swedish Consulate and, what we had mainly gone to see, the Icons and painted Frescoes in the little churches and mediæval monasteries up in the mountains. New Testament links abound; Paphos where St. Paul preached and Larnaca, where tradition has it that Lazarus was consecrated Bishop by Paul. Sitting by the sea there, eating quail in the sun and looking out over the Mediterranean, really felt Biblical. Nearby, under palm trees by the salt lake, is the shrine to the Prophet Mohammed's Foster-mother, Islam's third most holy site. We also had fascinating glimpses into the life and worship of the Greek Orthodox Church; very much part of every local community, but at the same time, virtually stuck in time, unchanged since a thousand years before the Protestant Reformation. We shared in the Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom in a monastery church.*

*All this hardly mentions the beautiful scenery, or the marvellous food and wine, or the people — extremely friendly and almost embarrassingly hospitable. One rather special person to whom I was introduced is an Orthodox priest in Galata in the Troodos mountains, who paints Icons, and from whom I've commissioned one. I promised to return to collect it. But, St. Mamas, whom I've appointed as my own special Cypriot Patron Saint, is quite another story.*

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INFANT BAPTISM.

May I have one last moan about the age at which children are brought for Baptism? They should be brought when they are a few weeks old, not when they are a few months old. Infant Baptism exists because of the supreme importance which Christian parents have attached to their children's belonging to the Church and their being brought into and being brought up in a right relationship with God and the other Christians. The logical consequence of this desire for early Baptism is that it should be as early as possible. The parents have had months in which to make their spiritual preparation, and they should be looking forward to coming to church first of all to make an act of thanksgiving for God's gift of a child, and shortly afterwards to enable their child to receive God's grace in Baptism.

It is wonderful to have parents of young children bringing their children to church in spite of all the difficulties. I hope that parents who bravely and patiently persist in spite of everything realize what an encouragement they bring to the rest of us.

In the Alternative Service Book there is a very good Service of Thanksgiving for the Birth or Adoption of a Child. I am pleased that several couples have come recently to church to use this form of thanksgiving. I find this one of many heartening signs.
