The Rectory,
Ackworth.

My dear People,

I have now been Rector of Ackworth for twelve years. It has been for me a most interesting and happy time. Ackworth is a fascinating and delightful place. My life has been immeasurably enriched by my time here. No place can have a more loving and loveable people than I have met in Ackworth. No parish can present more opportunities than does this one. HERITAGE IN GLASS

MEDIAEVAL GLASS from the original parish church at RIPPONDEN has recently been restored by the York Glaziers Trust. Much of the glass was damaged or lost in the great flood of Ripponden in 1722. The restored remnants were re-installed in the window of the present church during April, and will be re-dedicated by the Archdeacon of Halifax on Sunday May 6th at 10.30 a.m.

ST AUGUSTINE'S FOUNDATIONS

A COMMUNITY PARK on the site of **St Augustine's Church, Halifax**, will have a grand opening on May 5th at 2.30 p.m. The old church foundations can be clearly seen and have become an important feature in the Park. On the corner-stone of the foundations is a plaque: *'Faith that is firm is also patient'*. And a stone-built cairn will bear the famous prayer by Augustine: *'Oh God, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you'*.

PILGRIMAGE WALK

FOUNTAINS ABBEY near Ripon is regarded as the jewel in the crown of Yorkshire's historic buildings, but it needs a great deal of restoration work.

THORNHILL'S ROYAL COPE

THE ROYAL WEDDING COPE — the Cope worn by the Archbishop of Canterbury at the Wedding of the Prince and Princess of Wales — will be a special feature in an **Exhibition of Embroidery and Church Vestments** at Thornhill Parish Church on 19th-21st May. Also there will be the Cope worn by Lord Coggan at his Enthronement as Archbishop of Canterbury in 1975, as well as Pre-Reformation Vestments (dating 1450-1500) and many items made more recently.

The ancient parish church at Thornhill is remarkable for its excellent medieval stained glass, Anglian Cross fragments, and effigies of the Thornhill and Savile families.

BISHOP COLIN WRITES ABOUT



VIDEO

could in time become familiar and even acceptable. Such video works can be particularly damaging to children and young people, and adults who are emotionally disturbed.

ONE OF THE GROWTH INDUSTRIES at this time is that of video cassette recorders. Two years ago they were to be found in seven per cent of homes. Today the figure would be between twenty five and thirty per cent. By 1990 it could have risen to seventy per cent.

They have a variety of uses. It is possible to record television programmes, and play them back at times of our choosing and as often as we want to. Video cassettes are now being marketed for hire or purchase. There is a choice of films, drama, entertainment, music, and educational works. Video can be an enriching element in people's lives.

Parliament

Parliament is currently considering a bill to regulate the sale and distribution of video recordings, and provide that certain categories of works are classified (like films). So in selecting them people will know the kind of thing that they are getting and what is considered suitable for viewing by children at home. This is necessary because the pictorial image shown on the screen is more powerful than that conveyed in the written and spoken word. And exposure to obscene and violent works, which degrade human or animal nature, can desensitize our feelings with the risk that the abhorrent

Possibilities

We need, however, to keep things in perspective. Video nasties (which will be banned) are the unacceptable end of a product which in itself can be of positive good. The Church needs to be alert to the educational and evangelistic possibilities of video. Our teaching and preaching, and our worship too, have been predominantly verbal and literary. The way we communicate is often too abstract. In earlier times the Church through drama, the visual arts in churches, and parable and allegory made its appeal to the eye as well as the ear. In this century we have recovered and developed religious drama, and fostered the arts in church life. Now through television and video we can present Christian life and teaching in a more visual way. It is important that we find the resources, and the people with flair and imagination, to develop the kind of presentation which is memorable and persuasive.

COW CRISIS IN KWA MKONO

DAVID AND MARION BARTLETT, missionaries with USPG, write to us of some of the strange events of parish life in the Diocese of Zanzibar and Tanga, Tanzania.

David, who was Curate of Brighthouse 1951-54, has been Priest-in-Charge of Kwa Mkono and Rural Dean since early last year. In that area the custom at the patronal festival is to slaughter a cow and invite all and sundry to a big feast. David's problem at his first such festival in the parish was to find a cow at a reasonable price. A motorbike trip to a cow auction 7 miles away was unsuccessful. Then the offer of a local cow was suddenly withdrawn on the eve of the festival. David writes, 'This really was a crisis! A parish priest could be forgiven all sorts of things, but not a patronal festival without a cow! Marion and I fully expected to have to pack our bags again!' Luckily, one of the Masai had a card up his sleeve, and a nice fat little cow appeared from only a few hundred yards away. The day was saved.

And the meal, which was supposed to begin at 1 pm, started at 3.15 pm — a record time, since it hadn't begun until 6 pm the previous year!

David has six small churches in his parish, the furthest being about 15 miles away. The local Christians built these with mud and sticks, and gradually the parish will try to replace them with corrugated iron. Each of the churches has a Eucharist once a month. The church at Kwa Mkono itself has been greatly improved by replacing corrugated iron with transparent sheets in the sanctuary area. Now the congregation can actually see the crucifix behind the altar!

GOOD WORKS.

A child receives ' a pat on the back ' from a relation, a friend or a teacher for something which has been completed or worked out: a small acknowledgement of something well done or bravely attempted.

In more subtle ways adults, too, need encouraging. They have a need to be shown that the world acknowledges what is good. For Christians, this means gratitude for everything achieved through God, who made the world and all who live in it.

Jesus said to his followers: 'Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven.' This is not a demand for results rewarding to ourselves, but a request that what we do should reflect the goodness of God.

Anyone who gives money to Christian Aid for a new pump or standpipe in India, for example, naturally wants to know that water is gushing out at the other end - not so that the donor sees value for his money, but so that God's children are fed.

Christian Aid is not just a provider; it is more of a pump primer, an enabler. It is a partnership of people, reaching across frontiers and faiths, aiming to support local groups and families in what they can do to improve their food and water supply, their jobs, their state of health, and their ability to live life to the full.

Depressing though most world news is, there is an antidote of hope in much of what the churches in areas of poverty and strife manage to achieve. God is seen to work. It is our privileged task to contribute money to it and in Christian Aid Week to invite our whole community to do the same.
