

## EDITORIAL

This month sees two important festivals in the Church's year: Ascension Day and Pentecost. The Ascension of our Lord marks the end of his post-resurrection appearances to his disciples whilst Pentecost is the celebration of the fulfilment of his promise to send us his Holy Spirit.

Pentecost is also kept as the "birthday" of the Church. When the first disciples were filled with the Holy Spirit, they were transformed from a frightened band of followers of Jesus into the Church which St. Paul speaks of as "the body of Christ". Without the Church, the risen Christ would be invisible, unapproachable, faceless. But the Church is the body and so the abiding presence of Christ in the world. It is the Spirit which gives life to the body. The Spirit binds the Church, for all its faults, into one single fellowship of faith, love and devotion.

The Spirit gives life to the Church - and gives life to each of us as members of the Church. The Spirit transforms each of us by his influence on our lives. Before Pentecost, the disciples were frightened men, hiding behind locked doors for fear of the Jews. After Pentecost they boldly proclaimed the Risen Christ to the crowds in Jerusalem.

The Spirit is sometimes called "the Comforter" by Jesus in St. John's Gospel and he is our comforter because he is the abiding presence of Jesus in our lives. During his earthly life, Jesus could only be in one place at one time. The Spirit is not limited in this way, He is with us all the time wherever we are. To experience the Holy Spirit in our lives is to experience Christ. Knowing that Christ is always present with us wherever we go, whatever we are doing, at all times is what upholds us in our lives.

So let us earnestly pray this Pentecost that the Holy Spirit may fill us with his power, that we may be constantly aware of Christ's presence with us, supporting, guiding and encouraging us through life's good times and life's bad times. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit will give us courage to boldly proclaim the good news of Christ to all people as he did to the first disciples. But, above all, let us pray that the Holy Spirit will give life to our congregations, that we may truly be the Church, the body of the Risen Christ in Ackworth.

## Christian Aid Week May 13-18



In this year's Christian Aid Week (May 13-18) public attention will be focused on the Third World's millions uprooted by drought, war or oppression. On posters depicting mass flight is the campaign slogan "This Week Charity Begins with the Homeless".

It is Christian Aid's hope that the recent outpouring of relief assistance to famine victims will have sharpened public interest in preventive measures of development, for the long term homelessness is a matter of justice rather than "charity".

With that aim Christian Aid's 3,000 local committees are hoping to beat last year's £4.8 million Christian Aid Week total.

Some 17 million envelopes will be delivered and collected by 400,000 house to house collectors during the Week.

Will you help? Our congregations are responsible for collecting in High Ackworth and part of Ackworth Moor Top near All Saint's Church. Please volunteer to collect from one street by putting your name on the list at the back of the church.



## BISHOP COLIN WRITES HIS LAST SEE-LINK LETTER . . .



The time is fast approaching when I have to say good-bye. Yet as I write Easter still lies in the future. And a busy programme including the four lectures in the Cathedral, a number of special services, institutions, parish visits and confirmations, and the May meeting of the Diocesan Synod, has to be carried out before the Bishop's Eucharist and farewell takes place on May 25th. So I have not yet fully adjusted to the painful reality of bidding farewell to places I have come to love and to a host of people all over the diocese whose friendship I treasure.

### THE POWER OF THE SPIRIT

It is a mistake to look back. But there are experiences whose value I want to affirm. First and foremost, a bishop is a pastor. His office gives him the opportunity as he visits parishes to call on people in their homes, to drop into schools, and to work alongside his brother priests and get to know their families. Meeting with the P.C.C. has enabled me to discuss (usually) in an open way the needs and priorities of the individual parish. And there has been the special joy of celebrating the Eucharist and confirming young people and adults. And from this we have developed the post-confirmation Eucharists in the Cathedral. But whether it has been the ordination or institution of a priest, or your own confirmation, these are not just happenings receding into the past, dates in a yellowing diary, they are spiritual realities each with its distinct potential, both now and for the future. 'Still let me guard the holy fire, and still stir up thy gift in me'.

As each parish prays for its neighbours in the diocesan calendar part of our intercession should be that the spiritual gifts already imparted and received may be stirred up and used to full effect.

### SHARED MINISTRY

A major development is now taking place through the Shared Ministry project. Here the gifts and talents that God has given in our church membership are being discerned; and people are being trained and equipped for a variety of pastoral ministries in the parishes. I pray that those who have completed their training, and those contemplating it, will under God be a major resource in strengthening and extending the work of the body of Christ.

### MISSION AND SERVICE

We are now half way through the nineteen eighties. At the beginning of the decade we reflected on the five essentials of our corporate Christian life in terms of Worship, Education, Pastoral Care and Fellowship, and Mission and Service. This Lent some parishes have been considering how 'Christians can make a Difference' in their local community. As the diocese approaches its centenary in 1988 I hope that parishes will engage more confidently in ways of sharing Christian faith with our neighbours, and in educating and equipping ourselves to bring our Christian faith and judgment to bear more directly on our everyday life and work. Looking to the future, when opportunity offers, we need to re-inforce this by increasing our commitment to industrial mission, and in community relations and social responsibility.

Her third engagement will be a Cheese and Wine evening on Wednesday evening at 7.45 pm at the Arts Centre in Venn Street, Huddersfield.

Mrs Treadgold is the youngest Central President in the history of The Mothers' Union and is known as a lively leader who is trying to bring encouragement and enthusiasm to the Union's attempts to deal with present day family problems.

#### ALL OUR YESTERDAYS.....

Following my request for any old magazines in last month's issue, I have been lent a copy of the August 1934 issue by Mrs. Asquith. The Rector was then the Rev. J. Lowther Bouch, whilst Mr. G.E. Clay was serving as Lay Missioner at All Saints'.

The main thing that struck me on reading it was how little church life has changed in Ackworth over the last fifty years! The Mothers' Union had been by coach to York Minster, Knaresborough and Harrogate. It was reported that the Bazaar total had reached £91.16.1d. Perhaps we raise more at our bazaars these days(though probably not if we take inflation into account!) but Bazaars and Mothers' Union outings are still significant activities in the life of our parish to-day!

There was no Rector's letter in August 1934, but instead Mr. Clay wrote an impassioned plea for more people to become more involved in the life of the church by volunteering to sing in the choir, and to lead "youth classes". "Therefore without fear or favour", he writes "I venture to urge all, to reconsider their responsibility in this matter now!" His words could equally well apply to us to-day!
