

RECTOR'S NOTES

Throughout the ages the Church has been associated with the Arts. Christians have always known that one of the most effective ways of expressing religious truth is through music, singing, dance and poetry, and through the visual arts such as painting and sculpture. Many of the world's greatest paintings and pieces of music have been inspired by religious themes or personal religious experience, and the Church has often acted as patron to composers and artists. With your copy of this month's magazine you should have received a programme for the 1986-87 Season of the recently formed Ackworth Concert Society. The Society's aim is to provide live music for families in Ackworth and district, and as such is an important new development in the community life of Ackworth. In addition to the concerts outlined on the programme there will be a Carol Concert at St. Cuthbert's Church on Saturday 20th December. On behalf of the church in Ackworth I would like to wish the Society every success in this its first full season.

We were all very shocked and saddened to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. Alice Hurst, so soon after that of her son Peter. Mrs. Hurst was a very faithful member of St. Cuthbert's Church, and down the years worked tirelessly for the parish. She served for over 25 years as Treasurer and member of the Parochial Church Council, a notable achievement. In addition she arranged flowers at St. Cuthbert's Church, especially at the major festivals. On a personal note, Mrs. Hurst was very welcoming to me on my arrival in the parish last year. I know that she will be sadly missed by many. We extend to Mr. Hurst our deepest sympathy and assure him of our prayers on his sad loss.

We welcome to Ackworth Mrs. Vivien Downham, who is to be the new Headteacher of The Howard School, Low Ackworth from 1st September. Until recently Mrs. Downham was Deputy Headteacher at Townville First School, Castleford, a post she held since 1979. We hope that Mrs. Downham will be very happy in her new job.

I am very pleased to announce that Mrs. Jennifer Firth has agreed to act as Treasurer to the parish, and her appointment has been confirmed by the Parochial Church Council. Mr. and Mrs. Firth and their family are regular worshippers at St. Cuthbert's Church. Mrs. Firth works in banking and we are grateful that she has agreed to take up this responsible position.

The Parochial Church Council meets monthly at The Howard School, Low Ackworth, usually on the first Monday of the month. In September the PCC will meet on Monday the 8th, which is the Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On this occasion a Eucharist will be held at the school prior to the meeting, at 6.45 p.m. It is my intention to make this a monthly service whenever the PCC meets. The service is not just for PCC members, but for all the parish, especially those living in Low Ackworth.

A group meets weekly in the parish, to study and discuss the Bible, and to pray together. The group usually meets at the home of Sam and Phyllis Brooke, 128A Station Road, Low Ackworth, on Thursday evening at 7.30 p.m. New members are welcome.

This month's edition carries a profile of Mr. Jarrett, one of our churchwardens. It is hoped that this will be the start of a series of profiles of members of the parish.

The visiting preacher at St. Cuthbert's Church on Sunday, 5th October, will be the Revd. Leslie Brooks, regional organiser of the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel (USPG). USPG is one of the two largest missionary society's in the Church of England. I hope that many will make an effort to come and hear what he has to say about the present state of missionary work, and about how we as a parish may be able to support this work.

Harvest Thanksgiving this year will be held on Sunday, 12th October, at both St. Cuthbert's and All Saints'. The Social Committee are planning to hold a Harvest Supper on the Saturday evening, 11th October. Further details will be given later.

MR. WILLIAM JARRETT

I was fortunate indeed in my first interview for the parish magazine. On a pleasant evening in June, Mr. William Jarrett welcomed me kindly when I visited him in Orchard Drive, and proceeded to tell me many anecdotes about his long life, which began in Leeds in the early years of this century. He was brought up in Hunslet, and as a boy attended the Methodist Sunday School there. Mr. Jarrett showed me a Bible that was presented to him on the 11th June 1916, under the terms of a bequest made by Philip, Lord Wharton, in 1695. As a young man, Mr. Jarrett attended the P.S.A. men's fellowship at Salem Congregational Church in Leeds; these

Pleasant Sunday Afternoons, regularly attended by about two hundred men, featured prayers and hymn-singing, an orchestra and soloists, and speakers giving talks on a variety of topics of general interest.

In 1919 Mr. Jarrett began working for the railways - a job that was to last forty-eight years until his retirement in 1967. One of his enthusiasms at this time was cycling: I have already heard something of the enormous popularity of the northern cycling clubs during this period, and it was fascinating to hear a first-hand account of the Leeds club from Mr. Jarrett. His other great interest, which became one of the chief pleasures of his life, was music. Mr. Jarrett was about seventeen when he learned to play the trombone. He played in various bands and orchestras for many years; it was very evident that he recalled his time with the Leeds Model Band with great affection - I could almost fancy myself in Roundhay Park at Whitsuntide half a century ago, listening to the band play! He played with the Leeds Symphony Orchestra for over a decade, as well as playing for a time with the D'Oyley Carte Opera.

In 1926 Mr. Jarrett met his future wife, Eleanor, who came from Ackworth, and they married at St. Cuthbert's in 1928. For ten years after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Jarrett lived in Rothwell. After this, Mr. Jarrett's work took them to various parts of the country - Workington, Carlisle, and eventually Watford. He recalled the weekend excursions they made to different parts of Hertfordshire and the different churches they attended as the essential start to their day out. It was on the 16th March 1964 that Mr. Jarrett was confirmed by the Bishop of Bedford in St. Alban's Abbey.

MYTHOLMROYD PRODUCES CHOIRGIRL FINALIST

CONGRATULATIONS to Joanne Alston of St Michael's, Mytholmroyd, who has been chosen as one of the two West Yorkshire finalists in the 1986 BBC Choirgirl of the Year Competition.

Judges for the competition include Mrs Rosalind Runcie, music teacher and wife of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and Mr Barry Rose, Master of the Choirs at the King's School, Canterbury, and the BBC's music adviser to Religious Broadcasting. Joanne will attend a special Festival on Sunday November 2nd at the BBC in London. She will have to sing a hymn and an anthem and provide a tape of her work. Some of the finalists will be heard on Radio 2's 'Good Morning Sunday' during the run-up to the finals, and the final will be broadcast by Radio 2. Only last year Joanne received the Bishop's Chorister Award.

BISHOP RICHARD WRITES IT TAKES ALL SORTS TO MAKE A CHURCH

I was in York Minster twenty-five years ago for the enthronement of Archbishop Coggan. In his sermon he hoped that he would see *"adventurous experiments in the field of liturgy and church relations"*, and a chill wind blew round some cosy Anglican shoulders.

They needn't have worried. We settled back into our comfortable attitudes, and reckoned this was someone else's adventure. *"Those who have not travelled much think that Mother's is the only good cooking"* This African proverb was quoted at the Diocesan Synod in the discussion about unity.

I was one of those who grew up without travelling much, if at all: even within Anglicanism. We belonged to a style of Anglo-Catholicism for which you would have to shop around extensively if you wanted to find it now. We never ventured afield, and it was a while before I realised that not every christian was like us.

I have beside me now the devotional book I was given when I was confirmed in 1933. I am grateful for the richness of the tradition in which I was nourished in the faith, and I do not want to seem to denigrate its value now. The book was of its time, and many people treasured what it contained.

CLICK, CLICK, CLICK . . . the Church of England Children's Society is asking people to join a sponsored knit on or around Monday October 6th. To help you prepare for confession there was a list of sample sins for you to work through, checking yourself against each section. It was a kind of creeping barrage: if this one didn't hit you, well the next one would. "I have eaten too much", "I have cheated the Railway or Bus or Tram Companies", "I have given more time and thought to amusements than I ought", "I have spent money on Sunday without a good cause", "I have talked about the faults of others".

At the end there was a real corker: "I have joined in schismatic worship". I had no idea what this was, but it sounded more exciting than "I have been late for church", "I have neglected to get instruction in the Catholic Faith". (More exciting, possibly, than it actually was).

"How can we love each other if we do not know each other, and how can we know each other if we never meet each other".

I believe christians should find opportunities to experience unfamiliar ways of worship whenever they can, and discover what a variety there is among those who, together, make up one body. I wish I had, long ago.

SHOP BOOSTS CHILDREN'S SOCIETY FUNDS

VOLUNTEERS from local churches have raised over £11,000 since last September, when the Children's Society opened a Charity Shop in Wakefield. Originally the shop was only on temporary loan. But so great has been its success that the Children's Society is trying to secure a permanent shop in Wakefield. The Society is also looking to double its volunteer force, now at 45. Besides the actual selling, volunteers are also needed to sort, check, iron, and price articles behind the scenes. Volunteers work on a two rota system: mornings 10am to 1pm, and afternoons 1pm to 4pm, six days a week. Clothing in good, clean condition, bric-a-brac, books, toys, games are always needed.

By the time Mr. Jarrett retired, his wife was not in good health and she was advised to move away from London. In 1969 they moved back to Mrs. Jarrett's native village where they attended All Saints' Church. Mr. Jarrett became a sidesman and then, nearly fifteen years ago, a churchwarden. In 1984, Mr. Jarrett sustained a great loss when his wife died and in her memory Mr. Jarrett has recently presented a cope to the church.

Mr. Jarrett is a very active man. He is a member of the local Probus group and showed me photographs of a recent holiday with the group in Tenby. In the week that I talked to him he had been to Opera North's production of Gounod's 'Faust', music he is very familiar with from his days as an orchestral player. He is also a founder member of Ackworth R.D.A. His duties as churchwarden play a very considerable part in his life; this was, of course, especially so during the thirteen-month interregnum before the Rector's induction last year.

I am sure that other members of the congregations at St. Cuthbert's and All Saints' feel, as I do, how pleasant it is to be greeted, week in week out, by Mr. Jarrett in his usual position near the church door.

The Ackworth Group of RDA is ten years old in September. From small beginnings - two ponies in my paddock and half a dozen children from Fieldhead Hospital School - it is now a considerable organisation which owns eight ponies and caters for about 50 riders per week. During its short history it has involved a large number of Ackworth residents. One particular reason for this is its pony "share holding" scheme whereby able bodied riders have the use of the ponies when they are not needed for the disabled in return for a contribution to their keep.

We would welcome enquiries from parents whose children might be interested in becoming pony share holders - though it must be understood that parents are expected to contribute to the running of the Group. We rely heavily on fathers who can help with structural repairs, mothers who can help with fund raising events, and families who are prepared to turn out to help on visits to local shows. We have had tremendous support from local residents in the past but are always glad to welcome new supporters. Many of our present supporters would say that they have obtained pleasure out of helping those less fortunate than themselves and made new friends. If you would like to become involved in any way, or are disabled yourself and are interested in riding, or driving in a purpose-built vehicle, we would like to hear from you.
