

RECTOR'S NOTES

Christmas is always a busy time for the churches. Christmas services are usually very well attended. People are even prepared to come to church at times which if suggested at any other time of year would be considered total madness, e.g. midnight. Why is this so?

Clearly Christmas has its own special appeal with its message of peace on earth, and its romantic story of the birth of Christ in Bethlehem. Everywhere is festively decorated and it is a time of great joy, especially for families with young children.

There is a danger, however, that we see Christmas in too romantic a light. The churches may be full at Christmas, but where are the worshippers in the middle of January? As a nation we have become a secular society, i.e. few people regularly worship God in church and many have no religious beliefs at all. Most people only ever attend church a few times in their lives, on special occasions such as weddings, baptisms and funerals. The trouble is we want our religion on the cheap. We do not want it to make any demands on us. We are not prepared to commit ourselves in costly worship of God. We want the tinsel, but not the trouble.

The odd thing is that the first Christmas involved no tinsel at all, but a draughty stable. The story is about the illegitimate birth of God as man. It is about the Creator of the universe becoming a vulnerable human child. Yet we have gift-wrapped the story; we have drawn its sting; we have lost the message. The goodwill of Christmas, and our response to the message of the Christ child, will disappear like cigar smoke unless we take seriously its meaning for our lives.

I intend to hold a quiet evening in St. Cuthbert's Church on Tuesday, 15th December, from 7.30 to 9.00 p.m. As last year there will be readings, prayers, and times of quiet for reflection in order to prepare spiritually for Christmas. The evening will start with Evensong and end with Compline. Our preparations for Christmas are always hectic, and the evening will provide an 'oasis' of calm!

Another event in preparation for Christmas is a 'Service of Advent Praise', to be held at Wakefield Cathedral, on Friday, 4th December, at 7.30 p.m. This service, led by the Bishop of Pontefract, will be very well attended so if you want a seat get there early!

The Ackworth Fellowship of Churches is to distribute a Christmas leaflet, as last year, setting out the Christmas services in the village. Details of Anglican services will be found in this magazine. Children are invited to bring gifts to the crib at the service 'Carols on Christmas Eve' at 6.30 p.m. at St. Cuthbert's Church. The gifts will be distributed to needy children in the area through the social services department. Children receive so much at Christmas that it is good for them to remember those less fortunate than themselves.

"On the twelfth day of Christmas my true love sent to me, twelve lords a leaping...." Yes, believe it or not Christmas lasts twelve whole days. It doesn't end on the night of Boxing Day, or with the sales in the shops, contrary to popular belief. Nor does Christmas begin at the start of December though you would be forgiven if you thought it did. In order to emphasise this fact the date of the Village Carol Service has been altered. Instead of being held in the middle of December, at least two weeks before Christmas, it will be held this year on the Sunday after Christmas Day, 27th December, in the heart of the Christmas season. The service will be at St. Cuthbert's Church at 3 p.m. There will be no evening service at All Saints' Church that day.

The Church Council has approved a price increase for the magazine. In 1988 the cost of the magazine will increase to 20p. a copy. However, the annual subscription will only be increased from £1.80 to £2.00. This means that those who pay annually will face only a modest increase. We hope that this new subscription rate will enable us to balance our books on the magazine, and will ease the work of distributors. I hope very much that you will continue to give us your support.

LEEDS CHRISTIAN HOME FOR AUTISTIC ADULTS

At a time when thousands of mentally handicapped people are being dispersed in the community (see Bishop David's letter in the September 1987 See-Link) it is timely that a small Christian home for young autistic adults is shortly to open in North Leeds.

ASHLAR HOUSE is to be managed by an interdenominational Charitable Trust whose patrons include Lord Coggan and the Bishop of Ripon.

This home will be the only one of its kind within a much wider area than Leeds and so the trustees hope that it will have the interest and support of Christians beyond the City boundaries. They are to send further information to all churches in the Diocese of Wakefield.

BISHOP DAVID WRITES

Deadline

One of the hazards of this monthly letter is that, in order to meet the editor's deadline, I have to put pen to paper well in advance of its actual publication in See-Link. So I am regularly having to "think future" – from the beginning of November into the beginning of December.

Morality debate

We are presently preparing as I write this letter for the November meeting of the General Synod with much publicity given over to Mr Higton's motions on sexual morality and I am being bombarded by material, some of it quite extraordinary, on matters sexual, from all sides – conservative and liberal! There seems little recognition in all of this of our basic standing in Christ through baptism, regardless of whether a person is homosexual, heterosexual or whatever.

In baptism we are united to Christ – behold a new creature. We are brought into a wholly new relationship in Jesus Christ, and in him with each other. For the Christian disciple, what one's sexual preference is, often a somewhat introspective preoccupation with oneself I believe, ought not to be the primary concern. The Collect for Christmas Day reminds us – who are regenerate and made God's children by adoption and grace – that we **"may daily be renewed by the Holy Spirit"**.

This "renewal" by the Holy Spirit extends into every part of our lives, not merely the spiritual, but the physical and the sexual as well. And this doesn't deny "the sexual" in any way, rather life in Christ Jesus affirms and enhances the sexual aspects of the human person when seen in the wholly larger context of God's love

for us in Jesus Christ – God with us, whoever we happen to be, however we happen to find ourselves.

Positive Christian response

In my response to Mr Higton I made it clear that I was very ready to observe that which is clearly the traditional Christian teaching rooted in Scripture, that **sexual intercourse outside marriage and "homosexual intercourse" so called, are sinful and wrong**. At the same time I simply cannot go along with the gloomy negativity of much of what is surrounding his statements.

The enfleshment of God in Jesus Christ is the ground of our Christian rejoicing and merrymaking. Here is no denial of who and what we are: here is God underscoring and underlining in the particularity of one human life the potential that there is in every human life and the whole of humanity – "God saw what he had made and behold it was very good". Perhaps we should be better served by being less judgemental, negative and condemnatory and more clearly committed to setting out the positively enterprising and exciting nature of **Christian believing and Christian living**.

Love and reconciliation

May we who at this time are preparing to celebrate the festival of him who was born of a pure virgin, reflect more truly and more clearly in our own lives and in the life of our church that same spontaneous readiness to reach out in love and service and compassion to each other and indeed to all with whom we share our common humanity. Christmas is the summons to us **to continue that work of God in Jesus Christ**, reconciling the world to himself, "not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation".

Some More Library Books.

Here are some more books in our library at St. Cuthbert's Church.

THE LIFE AND DEATH OF ST. CUTHBERT by C.J. Stranks. The story of St. Cuthbert is as fascinating as any in the history of the Church. A missionary, a miracle worker and a saint, he was greatly loved in his lifetime, and revered throughout the Middle Ages. 1300 years after his death in 687 pilgrims continue to visit his tomb in Durham Cathedral.



Three books on the Bible in the library are:-

THE LION CONCISE BIBLE ENCYCLOPEDIA, an A to Z of Bible topics for the general reader.

THE LIFE AND LETTERS OF PAUL - a beautifully illustrated book about St. Paul, who next to Jesus was the most important figure in early Christian history. His writings make up a third of the New Testament. This book outlines his life, and his teachings.

JESUS, THEN AND NOW by David Watson - another colourfully illustrated book by the late vicar of St. Michael - le - Belfry, York. This book re-presents the facts of Jesus' life, and points out the significance of Jesus for our lives to-day.

THE SCREWTAPE LETTERS by C.S. Lewis (Sub-title: Letters from a Senior to a Junior Devil.) If you have never read this famous book by an outstanding Christian author you should give it a try. The sub title tells all. Wormwood, a junior devil, receives both friendly and threatening advice from Uncle Screwtape on how to trap us poor humans.
