


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# ACKWORTH PARISH MAGAZINE



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## RECTOR'S NOTES

How many people live in Ackworth? How many young people are there? How many retired people live here? How many of these people come to church? Easy questions to ask, but not easy ones to answer accurately. The last census of Ackworth was carried out in 1981. At that time the population of the ecclesiastical parish was \_\_\_\_\_. (Have a guess, then look up the answer on page 7) However, since that time the number of people has increased considerably, though no one will know the real figure until the next census in 1991.

The need for accurate information is important in all walks of life, including the church. That is why, as a part of our Parish Profile, we are going to give a questionnaire to each person who comes to church in July. The questionnaire will consist of simple questions about church going. It will be entirely confidential - no names are wanted. We hope that the information given will help us build up a picture of the pattern of church going in Ackworth and will make our Profile an accurate account of parish life.

The parish is due to have a confirmation in 1988. However, because of the bishops' commitments to the Diocesan Centenary Celebrations, confirmations will not be organised for individual parishes, but by deaneries. I intend to start confirmation classes in the autumn, in readiness for a deanery confirmation in March 1988. Please let me know of anyone who wishes to be confirmed.

The Diocese of Wakefield contains within its boundaries two religious communities. The Community of St. Peter at Horbury is a community for women. The altar breads used in our communion services are made by the community bakery. The sisters also make church linen and vestments. The Community of the Resurrection (CR) at Mirfield, for men, is the other religious house. This centre is well known throughout the world, partly because of its works in South Africa and through the work of Bishop Trevor Huddleston.

Both communities hold commemoration days (or open days) in July, at Horbury on July 4 and at Mirfield on July 11. These 'commem days' are a good opportunity to see something of the life of a religious community. The Mirfield day begins at 12 noon with a Eucharist at which the preacher will be the Roman Catholic Bishop of Leeds, the Rt. Revd. David Konstant. Bishop Konstant recently visited Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Ackworth at a service to which I was kindly invited by Fr. Funnell. Religious communities are not always the enclosed worlds so often portrayed on television. Both Communities in our diocese have strong links with parishes, and they provide facilities for meetings and also for retreats (times of quiet for prayer and reflection). If you wish to visit either place see me for further details.

Sunday 12th July is 'Sea Sunday', and on that day we shall remember in our services those who 'go down to the sea in ships'. The tragedy of the loss of the Herald of Free Enterprise highlights the risks still to be experienced in sea travel. The work of the Missions to Seamen, and similar missions is still of great importance to seafarers worldwide.

## Mr. Fred Davies

This month we feature our recently appointed churchwarden, Fred Davies.

Fred has attended church regularly since his childhood, and was a choirboy in the local village church from the age of eight.

Though he was born in Southport, his family moved early on in his life to live in the Peak District, and he was brought up in a village near Glossop; attending school and then university in Manchester, he graduated in French Language and Literature.

He became a schoolmaster, teaching French at Glossop Grammar School, and it was here he met his wife, Fiona. She was taken on as a teacher of music and, since her classroom was next to his, Fred was asked by the Head to

keep an eye on her. He reckons he has been doing so ever since!!

He has three children - two boys and a girl. Nicholas obtained a degree in Law and now works for Wandsworth Council; Andrew is employed by a local company, Yorkshire Timber Products, in kitchen design, and Sarah works for a systems analyst. Sarah was married to St. Cuthbert's Church at the end of May.

At a time Fred thought he might leave Glossop Grammar School, he was offered a step up the ladder and persuaded to stay on. He didn't really mind, he liked Derbyshire - enjoying the moorland and fell walking.

Eventually, however, he felt the time had come to move on and in the summer of 1965 was offered the position as Head of Modern Languages at Ackworth School. He took up his appointment in January 1966, becoming Senior Master there in 1977.

Fred told me that he had been extremely happy in the two establishments which he had worked, "Some may perhaps think me staid in my ways, but I do not regret to have changed jobs more often and been more adventurous. However, speaking as an ex-teacher, I believe one has to be at a school a good few years before you can say you're settled into the life of things. Quality of life is of the utmost importance. I never wanted to work in a large school where I would have just been another cog in a large, impersonal machine. For me, small is beautiful".

Since retiring in July of last year, most of his time has been taken up with reading and painting - the latter purely for pleasure and relaxation he hastens to add. He has a very large garden plus an allotment and between them these take up a large amount of time and energy. He still enjoys walking when able and continues to complete the walk on Founders Day each year at Ackworth School.

## NEW OFFICER TO MAKE THE MOST OF BUILDINGS



*THE REV RICHARD GILES, aged 46, at present Vicar of St Jude's Church in Peterborough, has been appointed Parish Development Officer by the Bishop of Wakefield. He will hold the appointment alongside a parochial job, as priest-in-charge of the parish of St Thomas, Huddersfield.*

*The post is an entirely new one, created by the Bishop to help parishes make more imaginative use of the buildings they have. The Bishop says 'It seems such a shame that our buildings stand idle for most of the week and yet we are sometimes hard put to it to think what might be done. I hope our new officer will be able to use his planning and artistic expertise to help those parishes which would like to move forward. I see the post as a resource for parishes and as a way for us as a Diocese to make better links with local authorities.'*

*Mr Giles is well suited to the job. He was trained as a planner and that helps him to spot the potential in buildings and in building sites. He also has a considerable interest in art and design and hopes to be able 'to help parishes think out in detail how their buildings serve their work and mission.' In his recent posts he has been responsible for the restoration and re-ordering of a Victorian Church in Wallsend and for the planning of a new church in his present parish.*

*He also brings more than twenty years' experience as a priest to bear on his new parish post. He is married to Susan, a teacher, who at present works as Development Officer for the Marriage Guidance Council in Peterborough. They have a 6 year old daughter, Simone.*

## BISHOP DAVID WRITES . . . WAKEFIELD GOES TO CANTERBURY

NEXT YEAR nearly five hundred Bishops will be meeting in Canterbury at a gathering called 'The Lambeth Conference'. We will be from the Anglican Church throughout the world, meeting together once every ten years to consult about matters which affect the whole Anglican Communion.

Each Bishop is being asked to bring his Diocese with him — a pretty tall order! — especially when we are being asked to do it on a single sheet of paper! Bishops are being asked to do their own 'Bread not Stones' project — *Where are we now? What issues face us?* — and to feed this into the preparations for Lambeth 1988.

The Conference itself will be divided into four main sections:

Mission and Ministry

Dogmatic and Pastoral (the section I  
am in)

Ecumenical

Christianity and the Social Order

We shall be asking some very important questions, and discussing major issues.

### How does the Anglican Church order its affairs?

The Lambeth Conference is what it says it is — A Conference, with much consultation, listening, and responding. Resolutions are made, but they are not binding — we are not expecting to make any dogmatic definitions. But the resolutions are significant expressions of Anglican Bishops across the world.

No doubt contentious 'churchy' issues will attract considerable interest, but of far greater relevance and significance will be the important task of the Church's mission in the world. We will

need to listen very carefully to our brothers and sisters in other parts of the Anglican Communion where the Church is far more lively and more engaged in Christian witness than the Church of England. I know from my own experience in Tanzania last year that we have much to learn from them.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has already spoken of the background to Lambeth 1988: *'We stand at a juncture in the history of human kind where the issues which confront us are of the scale and magnitude that put in question the whole future of God's world'*. This may seem a little melodramatic, but given the world which does come into our homes via television coverage of world events, there can be no doubting the reality of what he has set before us.

So, as well as the preparations for the Centenary, begin to make a space in your prayers for that household of faith, the world-wide family of which we in this Diocese are a part, the Anglican Communion, and the Lambeth Conference next year.

*'We depend on seafarers to leave their homes and families and to face the dangers of the sea to bring us many of our daily needs'* said the Archbishop of Canterbury *'and Sea Sunday gives us a special opportunity to thank God for their contribution and to support the Church's ministry to them'.*

## **RECOVERY OF SIGHT FOR THE BLIND**

*THANKS TO the donations received from Wakefield Diocese, surgeons have been able to perform 174 operations for the restoration of sight and 23 operations for the prevention of imminent blindness. In addition, 300 patients were treated for various eye disorders,* reports The Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind. The Eye Camp sponsored by the Diocese took place recently in the village of Hydergarh, North East India. The Society last year opened an office in Ripon which would be happy to supply more information about the work or to arrange talks about the Society and show slides of an eye camp taking place. 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## KEEPING THE CHURCHES FLAGS FLYING AT SEA



For our Island race the sea has always been big business, as well as vital to our security and national identity. With all the newer forms of transport it might surprise you to know that most of the world's trade is still carried by sea - 98 per cent, by volume, of Britain's imports are brought to us under the Red Ensign. This means Sea Sunday on July 12th is highly relevant to all of us.

Sea Sunday is sponsored by Missions to Seamen (the Anglican organisation set up to care for merchant seamen throughout the world), the Apostleship of the Sea (Roman Catholic) and the Free Churches' British Sailors Society.

Missions to Seamen have been known for generations of seamen for their Flying Angel Clubs. These days around half their seafarers' centres are run jointly with other denominations. They have 90 full-time staff and 250 honorary part-time chaplains throughout the world.

The Apostleship of the Sea has Catholic chaplains in ports all over the world. They have national organisations in each country which all come under the Pontifical Commission based in Rome.

The British Sailors Society has a dozen full-time chaplains. Most of these are based in UK ports. They are heavily involved in welfare as well as other missionary work, for seamen and their families. The shipping lines, for instance, draw on their help when a seafarer has to be traced, where there are family difficulties, or a man has to be brought home urgently. They have a further 88 part-time honorary chaplains on every continent.

## SLEEP OF THE JUST

*Kenneth Leech writes about him in his recent book "Spirituality and Pastoral Care" (SPCK). Hugh Maycock, born in 1903, was for many years Vicar of Little St Mary's, Cambridge, and then Principal of Pusey House. Recog-*

*nising the folly of continually being in a state of exhaustion and its effect on prayer and the spiritual life, he laid much emphasis on the importance of sleep.*

*Hugh practised what he preached. The hours between 2-4 pm in the afternoon were set aside for sleep, and so sacred was this time that he was known when Principal of Pusey House to introduce a speaker at a conference and then go off to bed, returning to close the session at 4 pm. Sleep is something to be enjoyed!*
