



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## RECTOR'S NOTES

On holiday I came across the following story which I would like to share with you:-

### Whose Job Is It?

This is a story about four people named Everybody, Somebody, Anybody and Nobody. There was an important job to be done and Everybody was asked to do it. Anybody could have done it, but Nobody did it. Somebody got angry about that, because it was Everybody's job. Everybody thought Anybody could do it, but Nobody realised that Everybody wouldn't do it. It ended up that Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have done.

How true that is of human groups, whether it be in the home, at work or in the life of a community! It struck a particular chord with me, because I had not long before received a letter complaining about the state of All Saints' Churchyard. A lady from the south of England on visiting Ackworth had tried to find the grave of a relative. She was shocked and hurt to find the churchyard in its present overgrown state. The problem facing us is: 'Who cuts the grass?' Whose job is it?

I suppose there was a time when each family maintained its own graves in the churchyard, and a number of graves are still lovingly maintained in this way at All Saints' and at St. Cuthbert's. However, the vast majority of graves are not so maintained. Perhaps the family have moved from Ackworth, or the existing members of the family are unable to do the necessary work. Whatever the reason, such families in effect expect someone else to take over responsibility for the maintenance of their graves. In the case of a churchyard, that responsibility rests with the Incumbent, the Churchwardens and the Church Council.

The Parochial Church Council is concerned about this problem, and is considering various solutions. As a first step the Council has decided to apply to have the Churchyard at All Saints' declared closed, since there is no room for new graves. Families with existing graves still have the right to burial in the churchyard, provided they can prove that the grave is deep enough. I am therefore inviting any family with an existing grave at All Saints' Church, which they may wish to use in the future, to write to me as soon as possible. This will enable us to keep a record of their request for future reference. I also invite any other families with a grave at All Saints' to write to me so that the Church Council can keep a register of people to be consulted in any future plans. I hope that in time both churchyards will be maintained in a fitting and proper way.

A Parish Gift Day has been arranged for Saturday, 10th October, at St. Cuthbert's and All Saints' Churches, from 10 am to 1 pm. During this period the Rector and members of the Church Council will be in church to receive gifts. On that day the churches will be decorated for the Harvest Thanksgiving (in the morning at St. Cuthbert's). It is hoped that gifts for the Harvest and for the Gift Day will be brought to church. An envelope for gifts is included with this magazine. Please contact Mr. J. Gardham (Tel.794500) if you wish to covenant a gift.

A wardrobe is needed to store vestments at St. Cuthbert's Church. If anyone has a wardrobe which they may wish to donate, please let me know.

## SOME NEW LIBRARY BOOKS

We now have a small library in St. Cuthbert's Church, with a variety of books on prayer, the Bible, biographies and pastoral matters. Below are a few of our new books.

### THROUGH GRIEF by Elizabeth Collick.

The experience of bereavement is one which in time will affect each one of us. At the time of suffering it is a bewildering and often very lonely and frightening experience. Elizabeth Collick, herself a widow, writes out of her own experience and that of many others to describe what happens, in the hope that it may bring strength and support to those in grief. She writes of the yearning ache, the strange fears, the anger, guilt, frustration, loneliness and lostness which make up bereavement. The book does not seek to soothe pain, but to help people 'come through' to life on the far side of grief.

Two other books on bereavement and grief in the library are GETTING THROUGH THE NIGHT by Eugenia Price, and A CANDLE AT DUSK by Wendy Green.

MOTHER TERESA: THE EARLY YEARS by David Porter. Based on the first official biography of Mother Teresa this book gives an insight into the earliest influences on this remarkable woman. The story tells of her call to be a nun, and of her call to work with the poorest of the poor in India. Mother Teresa's story includes no earth shattering revelations. It is, quite simply, an account of how God can take the life of any individual and make it into something extraordinary.

THE LOVE OF CHRIST and A GIFT FOR GOD are both books by Mother Teresa. These two books reflect the varied aspects of the depth of her love for God and for mankind, giving comfort and inspiration to all who read them.

A BACKDOOR TO HEAVEN, an autobiography by Lionel Blue. Rabbi Lionel Blue is well known to millions of people by his many appearances on radio and on television. His own brand of humour shines through this account of his early life, and his gradually growing awareness of God in the world about him.

YOU HAVE A MINUTE, LORD? (A Sort of Prayer Book) by David Kossoff. The sad, thoughtful, and, at times amusing prayers of a plain man perplexed by the problems of his day. The prayers are not the formal ones perhaps we use, but are addressed to God in an easy, informal yet respectful way. This is a delightful and, at times, a very moving book.

## BISHOP DAVID WRITES:

### OUR CHRISTIAN FAMILY

The scene is very different a hundred years on both locally and nationally. Yet the heart of the message remains the same — the setting forth of Jesus Christ and his Kingdom — Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and for ever. And this celebration and proclamation of Jesus who is Lord is always focused for us in our worship. Worship, as it has been down the ages, is that point both of departure and of return, for Christian witness and mission in the world.

**Sunday 26th June 1988 at Huddersfield Town Football Ground** will, I hope, see a great gathering of celebration and witness from every parish in the Diocese. Bring as many folk as you can, young and old, groups, organisations, representatives of as many of your parish and local community as is possible. There will be plenty of room so do encourage **everyone** to come along and join with us, as members one of another, in this **Christian family** which is the Diocese of Wakefield.

We come together to share in that thanksgiving, the Eucharist, instituted by Christ himself as a perpetual memory of his precious death and in celebration of his risen and unending life among his people, until his coming again. The Eucharistic Celebration reminds us both of the point from where we have come and of the glorious future to which we are moving. It is a gathering together of God's people here on earth along with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven. So as we are drawn more closely to the Lord, and in him to each other, we are taken up and out of ourselves as we hear "on the ear the distant triumph song" of heaven. We catch a glimpse of that glory which is yet to be!

### THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving must be uppermost in our minds as we move nearer our Centenary Year 1988. Despite problems, difficulties and differences, the creation of the Diocese of Wakefield in 1888 was greeted with much enthusiasm and joy by the local people.

Indeed it was the local folk who by sheer dint of hard graft made sure the money was ready and available for the Bishopric of Wakefield to come into being. Canon Straton in his little booklet on the Wakefield Bishopric Movement, writes "... whatever else the future Bishop of Wakefield may feel, he may always feel sure that more than any other bishop on the English Bench the people of his Diocese ... have helped to create his See and provide for its endowment."

The accounts of the inauguration of the Diocese, the services held, the sermons preached, are proof enough that in a spirit of **thankfulness** to God hopes were high that here in the Diocese of Wakefield, "was a golden opportunity to be seized for the promotion of the cause of Christ and the advancement of the National Church, in the very core of England's industries."

### PREPARE IN PRAYER

One of the more encouraging developments over recent years is the way in which we have come to perceive that worship, liturgy, is the work of the people. It is an activity and experience in which all participate and into which all are drawn. To make Huddersfield 1988 the joyful and confident proclamation and celebration I believe it can be will however need considerable preparation on the part of us all in our parishes. It is important, for example, that we all know the musical parts of the service, the hymns and the songs. Preparation has always been a vital part of any worship, and this is just as important as we move towards our Diocesan celebration.

Yes, there will be a whole range of practical preparations to be made, but do not forget either the most important of all, as outlined in the first "note" in Rite A of the Alternative Service Book, that careful **devotional** preparation be made before the service for every communicant. And what a timely reminder too that all our Centenary celebrations need to be undergirded **daily** in prayer to the Lord our God. He has so wonderfully been with us over these past hundred years. He is now calling his church in this Diocese forward into his future and those good things that he has yet in store for us.

# WAKEFIELD DIOCESAN CENTENARY

## THE ARCHDEACONS WRITE ABOUT THE PLANS FOR THE CENTENARY EUCHARIST

### Sunday 26th of June 1988

The Liturgical Committee has been faced with this tremendous challenge in the firm hope that **ALL** other services will be cancelled this day. This will allow as many people as possible to attend this one Eucharist for the whole diocese on this day.

### THE VENUE

The Huddersfield Town football ground is on the A62, 2 miles from town centre. Although there is a large car park it would help if parish parties arrived by **coach**. Arrangements will need to be put in hand **NOW** as this will be the busy period for coach operators in any case. Whatever the means, please come; some young people are coming by Shanks's Pony.

The stand can seat 6,000, the allocation here is for the elderly and anyone else who needs to sit down. Details of how to apply for these seats will come later. The Diocese has no plans concerning refreshments, please bring your own if you wish.

Covered accommodation will be provided for all who attend. A football ground does have numerous constraints, not least is the English "Summer" weather, and the need for a crowd to fill it!

### THE SERVICE

The Bishop of Wakefield will celebrate according to Rite A accompanied by the diocesan staff, rural deans and any former bishops, provosts and archdeacons able to be present. The Archbishop of York will give the address and the prayers will be offered by people representing various aspects of diocesan life. The Intention for the Eucharist will be thanksgiving to God for His blessings during the past 100 years and seeking the Power of His Spirit to rededicate ourselves to His service.

### THE MUSIC

Parishes will receive details of the setting to be used, and in turn are asked to send people to form the special choir which will be directed by the cathedral organist. The hymns and choruses will reflect the various musical traditions to be found in our churches.

The accompaniment is being provided by the W. Yorkshire Police Band and the Normanton Music Group. From **10.00** the "warm-up" (!) will begin. This will be a most enjoyable start which will help to build up the atmosphere so that our great Thanksgiving can be worthy of the occasion.

A great deal of thought is being given as to how best to engage the attention of the children. Much of the success of this kind of event must rest on the support from the parishes in the numbers who come and make this an impressive occasion.

## WEEK OF PRAYER FOR WORLD PEACE 18-25 OCTOBER

It is more clear than ever, after fourteen years of the Week of Prayer for World Peace, that prayer for peace is vital and influential. A great impetus was given last year by the wonderful initiative of the Pope in calling all religions to join him at Assisi in praying for peace. The fellowship thus created, as well as by other initiatives such as by the World Conference on Religion and Peace, the International Association for Religious Freedom, the World Congress of Faiths, and not least by the Week of Prayer for World Peace itself, has drawn together people of all religious faiths into a deepening sense both of their common humanity and of their destiny as divinely created beings.

Our week always includes **United Nations Day, 24 October**, and in the spirit of Assisi we plan to hold our annual UK Inaugural Service at **Westminster Cathedral on Saturday, 17th October 1987 at 3.30 pm**. As usual, representatives of all faiths will make a short affirmation to peace and human unity, and there will be an opportunity for us all to meet after the service over a cup of tea.

## One World Week Oct 18-25, 1987

The theme this year is "Who Gets the Credits?" While millions here struggle with loans and mortgages, governments of poor countries owe massive debts to Western banks. For every £1.00 we gave for famine relief in Africa in 1985, the West took back £2.00 in interest payments. At the same time we ourselves are pressed to live on credit cards, HP and loans.

Credit and debt are much more than money. Supermarket shelves, sports pages, hospital wards, pop concerts, paper and potatoes; such everyday things proclaim the debt our nation owes to many peoples, countries and cultures.

Let's use One World Week this year to think about debt and credit in their widest sense. Let's give some of our time learning about the lives and labours of the world's ordinary people, people who pay the price but get little of the credit. Let's consider the cost to our planet Earth by the course we are following. Let's celebrate its abundance. Let's give 'Harvest Festival' a new life and meaning.

Can YOU start a One World study group in your Parish? Libraries throughout the Diocese have agreed to help you. Go to your local or central Library and seek their help. ## JOHN AND HENRY TAYLOR FUND

Created under the Will of Miss Betsy Ann Taylor of Halifax who died on the 29th September 1947.

The Will provides that the net yearly income of the Fund shall be applied: As to one-third thereof in making payments in the form of special grants in money or otherwise or in the form of annuities payable either indefinitely or for a limited period to poor clergymen resident within the Fund Area or who reside elsewhere and who either then or at some time previously have held incumbencies or been employed as assistance clergy at some place within that area for in either case a minimum period of five years:

As to two-thirds thereof in making payments in the form of special grants in money or otherwise or in the form of annuities payable either indefinitely or for a limited period to elderly (meaning by this expression of the age of 50 or more years) or invalid women, whether resident within the Fund Area or not, being the widow, unmarried daughter, sister, aunt or niece of any deceased clergymen who at the date of his death was himself qualified by holding or the previous holding of an incumbency or employment or previous employment to participate in the benefits of the Fund.

The Will provides that the Fund Area is the area comprised in the County Borough of Halifax on the 1st January 1933 and the Parishes within the ancient Parish of Halifax outside the Borough Boundary but contiguous thereto but now extends to the whole of the Wakefield Diocese.
