

## RECTOR'S NOTES

Marriages are made in heaven, so they say. I'm not so sure. The fact is that the breakdown of marriage is now a major social problem. The disintegration and breakup of a marriage is tragic, and can have long lasting effects on all concerned. The husband and wife are subjected to considerable anxiety and stress, which shows itself in physical and emotional symptoms. The children of an unhappy marriage often become innocent victims and may suffer because of their parents stress. They may become emotionally disturbed in the home and at school.

As a parish priest I see many couples who wish to marry. Like all young people in love they have great expectations about married life. Yet the fact that about one in three marriages end in divorce demonstrates that many have their hopes shattered. Many of the couples I interview seem to have given little thought to what marriage is about. A great deal of time is spent planning the wedding, the reception, the bridesmaids' dresses, the house, and so on. Yet some couples have not decided whether they want children, and if so how many. It could be a recipe for disaster if one partner wants children and the other doesn't.

Perhaps what is needed is greater education about the meaning of marriage. To this end I recently took part in an interesting experiment, when I 'married' two pupils from Ackworth Middle School. The fourth year pupils now study various aspects of marriage in their RE lessons. At the invitation of their teacher Mrs Elizabeth Jones, and with the permission of the headmaster Mr Naylor, we held a mock wedding at All Saints' Church. The pupils looked at various aspects of the marriage service in their lessons, and planned the wedding. As part of the preparation I visited the school and interviewed the 'happy couple' in front of the fourth year group. A report of the service, and some of the pupil's comments on marriage are printed in this edition.

What do you know about the working of the Parochial Church Council? Probably not a great deal, I suspect. The question of making the work of the PCC more widely known was recently discussed by its members. As a result of that discussion it has been decided to publish a summary of each PCC meeting in the parish magazine. The first report is published this month. In addition it is planned to have photographs of PCC members on display in each church, so that parishioners know who is on the Church Council, and in what capacity they serve. In this and other ways we hope that the work of the PCC will be made more widely known to members of the parish.

The Parochial Church Council is now considering how to build on the initiative started by the Barrowby Weekend. The suggestions made about worship will be examined by the worship committee which at present plans the Family Eucharist. Another group will look at the ways in which we can care for those who look to the church for pastoral help, eg those applying for baptisms, weddings and funerals. The Church Council will debate the issue of how to develop and make the best use of our buildings, and also how we may extend our mission to a wider group within the parish.

## BISHOP DAVID WRITES

### Against Parochialism

One of the things which every parish needs to guard against is parochialism. It means that we must not get caught up in our own local, often "churchy" concerns, at the expense of the larger and wider issues. This can go for Dioceses too! So it is a good thing in this the Centenary Year of our Diocese that Bishop Richard and myself will be going off to the Lambeth Conference.

### Lambeth 88

The Lambeth Conference is a ten yearly gathering of bishops from the world wide Anglican Communion. We have been asked to "bring our Dioceses with us", a bit of a tall order. I have submitted my own contribution which I hope reflects as accurately and as fairly as possible where our Diocese is, and the concerns with which we are faced.

There are, of course, a whole range of matters which are to do with how the church relates to the world, questions of freedom and justice, the church and politics questions about the nature of life and death and the dignity and worth of human life. There are some large questions about the very nature of the Anglican Communion, about authority and decision-making between the Provinces, about our relationships with other churches and so on. Looking at the time-table we are not likely to have very much spare time! I hope that you will be remembering all of us gathered at Lambeth from 16 July-7 August.

### The Ordination of Women

One of the major issues will be about the ordination of women to the episcopate. The ordination of women is also on the agenda of the General Synod. At the Synod there are to be two separate though not unrelated debates, one on a Second Report from the House of Bishops, and then a further session on the legislative proposals enabling women to be ordained to the priesthood of the Church of England. Clearly both these are likely to attract considerable interest and provoke a good deal of argument all round. I commend to you the Report by the House of Bishops. It is an attempt to set out the great deal of common ground


that there is between those who support inclusive ministry and those who don't.

We have tried to say something about the whole business of making decisions in a divided church, and to share some thoughts about how the "mind" of the church is to be discerned and discovered. Above all else, it is important, I believe, to have the humility to recognise, that wherever you stand, you may just be wrong!

### Return to Wakefield

Finally, I have gratefully received the responses from so many parishes to their Bread not Stones exercises. Already the planning group for Lancaster has got together a large amount of material, and it is interesting to see that time and again similar items are arising from very different parishes in our Diocese. With three hundred or so lay people from across the diocese, together with the clergy, Lancaster looks like being a lively and exciting venture. If you still haven't booked in your representatives, please be in touch with Bishop's Lodge at once, there is still time – just – to make any necessary arrangements. I am very grateful also to Canon Thorley Roe who has agreed to continue his involvement with the Lancaster Consultation and to see us through to the other side of Lancaster.

## SILKSTONE DEVASTATED

---

After inquiries were held it is said that this terrible affair helped Lord Shaftesbury to get his Act through Parliament, thus stopping the exploitation of children in factories and women and children in mines.


PCC NOTES

1. The PCC plan to install lights on the Rectory drive.
2. The wall on Pontefract Road has now been removed so that the stone can be used to restore any worn part of St Cuthbert's Church fabric. It was felt that by buying the wall now, the church will save money in future years. Plans are in hand for the re-flooring of right hand side of All Saints' Church and to have the notice board re-erected and painted.
3. In order to help Parishoners be more aware of the Parochial Church Council, photographs of all members of the council will be put up in both churches.
4. A silver cup, dated 1564 belonging to the parish is being restored and repaired by the Goldsmiths Company, London under a grant scheme.
5. Two letters from the Bishop of Wakefield were read out concerning the Bishops Centenary Fund and how money from the "Faith in the City" fund can be claimed by each Deanery for improving church facilities.
6. The main part of the meeting was spent discussing a report on the Barrowby Weekend. The feeling was that this weekend had been highly successful. Many interesting ideas were developed concerning our Buildings, Worship, Pastoral Work and Youth and Mission. There is no doubt that the results of this weekend, and the follow-up, is going to have many exciting influences on the life of the Parish.

While University of Kent students are away this month their place will be taken by 600 Anglican Bishops and Archbishops from all over the world. They are meeting in Canterbury from 16th July to 7th August in the Lambeth Conference, which is brought together by the Archbishop of Canterbury every ten years.

## DOING THE LAMBETH TALK



It takes two years of organisation to mount the mammoth event. At the 'home' end, David Long has been the organiser, and in Anglican Churches worldwide parishes and dioceses have been meeting to discuss the main themes of the conference with their Bishops and Archbishops.

Dr Runcie has asked each Bishop in this way to 'bring his diocese with him'. When they disperse afterwards, the process should be reversed, when the Bishops 'take the conference back to the diocese'.

The main themes are: Ecumenical Relations, Mission and Ministry, Christianity and the Social Order, and Dogmatic and Pastoral Concerns (including relations with other Faiths). That will be especially important this conference, with the rise of Islamic Fundamentalism renewed attention on the Holocaust on the part of the Jewish Community.

David Long sees as one of the most important aspects of 'Lambeth' the chance for so many church leaders to live, work and pray together for three weeks. For the rest of the time, in most parts of the world, they will live widely separated by perhaps snow, desert or thousands of miles.

### WHAT'S IN A CHURCH BUILDING

How do you like where you live? As a church family, that is. Is your house (of God) too small, or too big? Does it delight you, or drive you up the wall? Does it suit your size of family and the kind of life you lead? And what do the neighbours think of it?

Like our own private home, the church building is a reflection of the family who lives in it. Its appearance will tell the world a lot about us - what makes us tick, what our priorities are. Further, we usually adapt a house to suit the family, not the other way round.

Richard Giles has been appointed Parish Development Officer for the Diocese to help parishes take a fresh look at the kind of houses they live in, and how church buildings can be adapted to fit the church families who use them.

The re-ordering of interiors for today's needs (not those of 1888 or even 1488); the incorporation of social as well as worship facilities; helping the building to say 'hello' rather than 'go away'; these are the kind of issues on which free advice is now available from the Parish Development Officer.
