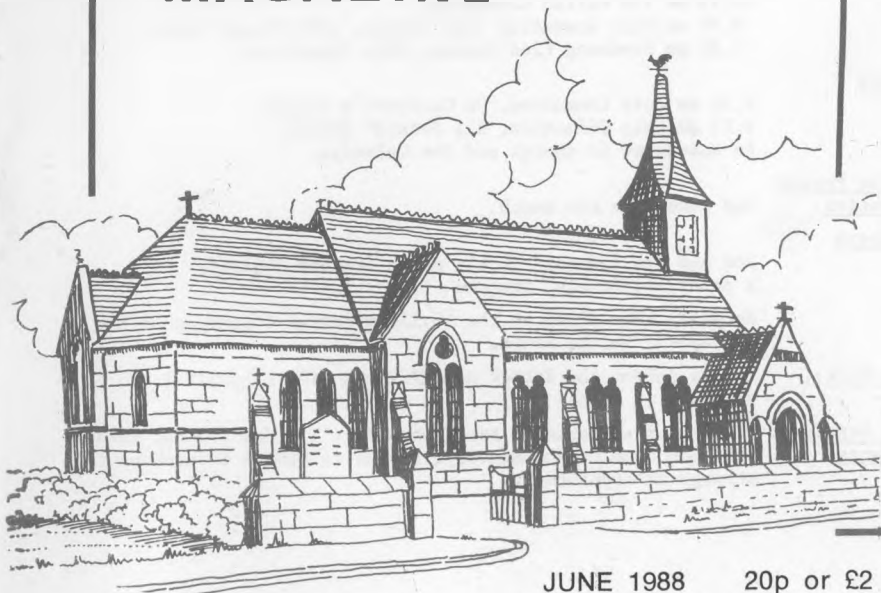
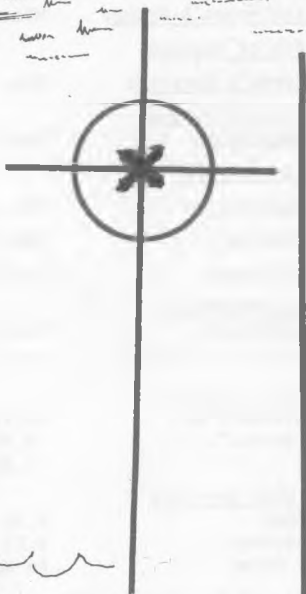

RECTOR'S NOTES

We all dream dreams from time to time, in order to plan for the future. Sometimes our dreams come to nothing, or are unattainable, but occasionally its nice to think about what might be possible.

I write these notes on the day after our Parish Weekend at Barrowby House, near Harewood. For forty eight hours a group of us from the parish of Ackworth let our imaginations run riot in order to plan the 'perfect' parish, to dream dreams. The challenge set by David King, the leader of the weekend, was 'if anything were possible what would you like to introduce or change in church life in Ackworth?'. We were encouraged not to exclude the impossible, but to generate as many ideas as we could.

Some of the results of this process were clearly not practicable and by the end of the weekend we had been encouraged to come back down to earth again. Eventually a series of more realistic, but exciting, recommendations had been listed. They are concerned with four broad issues - more effective use of our buildings, worship, mission and outreach to those not members of the church, and the pastoral care of people. The ideas produced will be submitted to the Church Council for discussion. We also hope to hold a meeting for those who did not attend the weekend, at which the issues raised will be presented. I also intend to preach about the weekend at all services on Sunday 12 June. Some of those who went to Barrowby give their reactions in this magazine.

The Diocesan Centenary Eucharist is to be held on Sunday 26 June, 11 am, at Huddersfield Town Football Ground. On that day both morning services will be cancelled. The evening service will be a Eucharist at All Saints' Church at 6.30 pm. About fifty people from the parish will be travelling to Huddersfield by coach. Further details about transport arrangements will be given in church.

A coffee morning in aid of the Church of England Children's Society is to be held on Tuesday 21 June at Jackie Dawson's house, 60 Holly Bank. If you have a Children's Society box this will be a good opportunity to return it. If you are unable to attend the coffee morning boxes may be returned to church as soon as possible. New boxes will be issued at the coffee morning, or by request to Mrs. Dawson.

Dr. Brearley retires from the Ackworth Clinic at the end of June, after 36 years of service in the village. We wish Dr. and Mrs. Brearley every happiness in their retirement, and are very pleased that he has agreed to open our Garden Party on Saturday 18 June.

## BISHOP DAVID WRITES

### Worship Together

One of the most encouraging features of my recent "pilgrimage" around the Diocese was the experience of worship together at the conclusion of each day. Obviously much careful thought and planning and prayer had gone into each of the acts of worship. Everyone seemed to go away encouraged and refreshed, and it certainly made me realise that the Church of England isn't the spent force that so many seem to think it is, and that there's still a good deal in our church to be proud of and thankful for.

### Worship, Prayer and Life

And it's **worship** which is at the heart of our life together in Christ: public worship, and this is undergirded day by day by the discipline of prayer and reflection on the Word of God in the Holy Scriptures. If we're not being fed spiritually in these ways, being nourished and built up in the love of the Lord Jesus Christ, then our message and our witness will indeed be a very hollow and half hearted thing. It will be ourselves, our own ideas, our own prejudices that we proclaim, not that living and active word of God "which is sharper than any two edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit...discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart".

### Centenary Year

As much as anything, our Centenary Year ought to be posing some hard questions to us both as congregations and as individuals, about the extent to which our conversion to Jesus Christ remains but skin deep, or whether we are ready and open for His becoming **the way and the truth** in all our life. What then are you doing as a parish, as individuals to consolidate and to refresh and renew your worship and prayer together? Hopefully, the recent worship events will

have lifted our spirits and our hearts to a new enthusiasm and endeavour for the things of God.

### Centenary Eucharist : 26 June – Huddersfield



## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

### "THE AIMS AND THE ADVANTAGES"

As a resident of Ackworth you are part of a community but unfortunately, regardless of its size, your community may be a target for the criminal.

Of course it is easy to shrug off crime and say 'it won't happen to me' or think nothing can be done to prevent crime. In fact a great deal can be done but the police cannot do it alone. We need your help.

So how can you assist? Well have you thought about NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH? These are schemes that belong to the community, so firstly the residents must decide they want to begin and maintain a scheme. The police will gladly advise on setting up a scheme, and with the support of the majority of residents NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH can operate successfully.

Most schemes have one or more co-ordinators who are people who usually spend long periods at home. They receive information from other residents about anything suspicious they may have seen or heard and then pass this on to the police. Of course if anyone spots anything that needs immediate police attention they should still dial 999.

#### The aims of NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

To reduce local opportunities for crime thereby deterring would be thieves and vandals.

To establish community spirit so that everyone can help towards protecting their property by mutual co-operation and communication.

To inform the co-ordinator or police of anything suspicious.

#### The advantages of NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH in Ackworth

It would help to reduce local crime such as burglary, vandalism, car thefts and thefts from cars.

A better community spirit may be created.

Crime prevention advice can be quickly and efficiently circulated throughout the community.

Anything suspicious can be quickly reported to the police.

One thing we should have no doubt about is that members of a NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH scheme are not vigilants. Patrolling the streets is the job of the police.

Please remember that in Ackworth you are surrounded by main roads and as well as local criminals we also have to contend with the travelling criminals who because of the roads have easy access to the village.

So why not think about NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH and let us fight crime TOGETHER.

TWO MORE BOOKS FROM THE PARISH LIBRARY

The Book of Witness - David Kossoff

The book covers the principal events in our Lord's ministry as seen through the eyes of some humble imaginary bystander. Those who have heard David Kossoff's radio broadcasts will be familiar with his pungent down to earth style, and his version of the main New Testament stories adds a strikingly modern dimension to the Gospel narrative. We cannot be certain that some palace servant referred to Herod's court cronies as a "rubbishy lot" but one is prepared to believe that someone did. Everyone will get some new insights from this well researched, and absorbing little book.

Called to be Me - Margaret Cuncliff

As the first woman Anglican advisor to an I.T.V. company, Deaconess Margaret Cuncliff is already something of a celebrity - more fame may lie ahead - but what emerges from this account of her ministry so far, is the kind of goodhearted honest and, above all, humorous personality, which gives 'religion' a good name. Her conversion stemmed from a deeply felt mystical experience one day in church, but her journey has not been one long success story from then onward. She is as refreshingly candid about her failures, as she is self effacing about her evident successes. An interesting, and occasionally moving book, with one or two good jokes.
