

## RECTOR'S NOTES

'The Mission is ended, now the Real Mission begins'. That is how Peter Davies, our stewardship adviser, describes the conclusion of our Mission. The benefits of a stewardship mission are twofold. First there are offers of service to the church, and offers of financial help. These are tangible benefits we can see, and count as it were. These are still being received. Secondly, there are other benefits which we cannot see, but which affect both individuals and the parish. For example, over 150 families were visited in this mission by members of the congregation. That represents an enormous amount of work which could never have been achieved by your Rector working on his own. The Mission Officers and the Mission Visitors exercised a ministry to the parish and came to have real insights into the nature of the parish, and our life as a church - both its strengths and its weaknesses. Our Parish Reception was a great occasion, when over 100 church members, from both churches, shared an enjoyable evening together. The benefits of growing confidence and sharing in the church's ministry cannot be counted. They are spiritual in nature, and will have lasting benefit to this parish.

The parish now has a new hymn book. It's called 'Hymns Old and New'. Why introduce a new hymn book? Well, the title gives a clue. 'Hymns Old and New' is an interesting collection of traditional and recent hymns. Notice that its title is similar to 'Hymns Ancient and Modern', which was first published in 1861. However musical tastes change, and since 1861 that hymn book has been revised half a dozen times, though it remains the standard Anglican hymn book.

Nowadays many hymns in 'Ancient and Modern' are never used. perhaps because it was originally written more for the use of choirs than for congregations. As a result many of the tunes are set too high for churches without a choir, and a transposed tune book has to be used. 'Hymns Old and New' has six hundred hymns. Half of them are the most popular hymns from 'Ancient and Modern', the rest are either popular hymns which are not in that book, or are recent new hymns which are now becoming standard hymns in many churches.

The popularity of 'Songs of Praise' and similar programmes on television mean that many people now know new hymns, but never sing them in church. I regularly receive requests for hymns (both traditional and modern) for weddings and funerals which are not in 'Ancient and Modern' - eg 'The Lord's my shepherd', 'Amazing grace', 'Morning has broken', 'In heavenly love abiding', to name a few. All these are in the new hymn book, together with a collection of hymns which children now learn in school. I hope that this new hymn book will add a new dimension to our worship. We shall continue to use 'Ancient and Modern' as and when it is appropriate.

The Christingle Service will be held on Sunday 29 January at St Cuthbert's Church. Last year the church was so full (190 children and their families) that we were concerned for the safety of the children. Because of this problem we shall have to restrict the number of children attending the next service in January. Details of

arrangements will be given by letter in church and through children's organisations in Ackworth. I'm afraid I must request that families do not turn up on the night without having first 'booked' their seats. Proceeds from the Service go to the Children's Society. An article in this edition describes the work of one of their projects.

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CHRISTMAS PUDD. 1942

The Scene: Somewhere off the coast road North Africa.

Utensils:

Fire: Half a flimsy petrol can (4 gallons), plenty of sand in it, petrol poured on the sand.

Mixing Bowl: Soldiers steel helmet. Remove nut and screw from centre of rubber lining. Take out liner and replace screw.

Ingredients: (Guess Work)

Place flour in helmet, add 1 generous spoon of "Andrews" rising material and one handful of sugar. Mix dry ingredients. Rub in enough 'Oleo' margarine to make a mixture like bread crumbs. 'Oleo' was a very stiff substance like a cross between axle grease and suet.

The Method:

Next add water to make a stiff dough. I had saved a bacon tin and I spooned the mixture into this, tying the cleanest piece of gun cleaning cloth I could find over the open end.

Our pan was another half tin that I scoured out with sand. This was filled with water and put in the pudding tin. I then flung a lighted match in the fire can and with a WOOF we were cooking. After several fire refills the pudd was done and I served it with some watered jam for syrup.

My Tank Crew said they enjoyed it.

For tea I cut the end from a 2 gallon water can, and with the same mixture, I removed the cellophane sheets from a map case, rolled the pastry with a bottle on this, covered my tin plate with pastry, put a layer of jam on this and bobbed it into the water can oven. Petrol fire underneath as before. I had to retrieve it with asbestos gloves (for tank use).

This was also a success.

## BISHOP RICHARD WRITES

### That they may all be one

January 18-25 will once again be a time when Christians are urged to pray for "the unity which Christ wills, to be achieved by the means which Christ chooses": a formula devised by the Abbe Couturier years ago as being one which all Christians could use without any reservation.

### More adventurous

At the 1988 Lambeth Conference — as on previous occasions — we were encouraged to maintain and strengthen the links on which we have traditionally majored during Unity Week: with the Methodists, URC, Baptists, & Roman Catholics. For the first time, however, we were also encouraged to be more adventurous, and seek opportunities to discover our unity in Christ with folk — Pentecostals and others — with whom many of us thought we had little in common.

### Surprising warmth

Why not try it this year? Live dangerously! Up to a point anyway — seek out the local Elim Church or the Assemblies of God, or one of the West Indian Pentecostal Churches in Huddersfield: find out what time the service starts and ask if it would be in order to come along. You will be

surprised at the warmth of the welcome you are given. (It might be as well, though, not to leave your supper in the oven before you go . . .)

### Real dialogue

Professor Walter Hollenweger has pointed out that the real ecumenical dialogue has scarcely begun. Doctrinal conversations between Western Europeans of comparable culture, and of broadly catholic or broadly protestant outlook, is peanuts compared to the real dialogue, which has hardly started and which it is by no means certain we can conduct. That, he tells us, will be between Christians who try to conceptualise the faith in creeds, articles of belief, doctrinal commentaries and so on: and those whose religion is enshrined in stories, and songs, and testimonies.

### Christian Unity Week

Let's make a start by seeing how our own spiritual life can be enriched by worshipping together in Unity Week. Remember the African slogan: "Those who have not travelled much think that mother's is the only good cooking".

# BROADCASTING IN THE 90's: A Government White Paper

## You and your big feet!

Time was when a "footprint" was the mark of a size 10 in the mud. Now it's the area a satellite can "see" from its perch in the sky. In broadcasting we're talking about all of Europe in one stamp of the foot. And from February YOU can use a dish on your roof to receive satellite TV. Exciting times!

Exciting times throughout broadcasting. Never mind the satellites, the Government's new proposals will tread all over the airwaves too. You ain't seen nothing yet. It will affect **EVERYONE**.

## What's coming?

ITV will become quite different, as a new, regional "Channel 3"; a new Channel 5; maybe a Channel 6; the IBA will be abolished, replaced by a "lighter touch" Authority, the Independent Television Commission (ITC); the night hours of one of the BBC's channels will go to the ITC; a new Radio Authority will (lightly) supervise Independent Radio; all TV companies (including BBC) will be able to raise money by subscription and sponsorship (the licence will fade away); all (except BBC) will be able to carry advertising.

## Why should you bother

A Christian **always** bothers – when it comes to people and their big feet. And there is Big Foot danger in the proposals. It would be ostrich-like to try to resist progress – indeed I would rather help it along. It makes life exciting. So I welcome the splendid adventures new technology and **intelligent** legislation can bring. But I'm cautious. We in Britain have lots to lose. If you don't believe me, watch some Japanese TV!

Oh yes, there's a reason to bother alright. **At the moment** we have broadcasting which is the envy of the world.

## Main questions

The chief problems are in the Government's own key words: "Choice" and "Quality". The White Paper stresses that the proposals will **widen choice** and **preserve quality**. But many think the reasoning is mistaken. We might narrow the first and destroy the second, losing our treasures to commerce for ever.

**CHOICE?** If you have umpteen channels competing ruthlessly for the same audience, all reliant on ratings for advertising, what will happen? The need for big audiences will dictate wall-to-wall soaps, game shows and

the like. A bland diet of beans, beans and more beans. And we all know where that leads.

**QUALITY?** Even though the proposals provide safeguards, who can protect such a vulnerable flower from the hot-house of our market places? They threaten our very culture. Televisual art can't survive.

And what if we fund the BBC by subscription? Will poorer people (the old, the unemployed) still afford it? Will it compete or survive at all?

Can religious programmes survive? Or any other minority interest? And how can a "lighter touch" Authority preserve a sense of taste, decency and balance?

## Cobblers

Big feet need good cobblers. What can you do? Well, do it soon, whatever it is! Chiefly:

- (1) Learn about it, make it your business (ask for my free file, and book into my training sessions on 28th January).
- (2) Write to the Home Secretary (but be positive too!)
- (3) Lobby your MP (especially Conservative backbenchers!) now, and when it's in Parliament.

## SERMON NOTE BOOK

# 'THAT THEY MAY BE ONE'

**JANUARY** sees the **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18th - 25th)**. How do Christians pray for each other across the denominations?

**Jesus' prayer in John 17 will help us: 'that all of them may be one' (v.21). He is praying for:**

### TRUTH

Jesus first prays: 'keep them true to your name' (v.11, Jerusalem Bible). Christians are united by faithfulness to the revelation of God in Christ.

Work towards unity is often slow due to disagreements over essential truths.

Consider the things that cause disunity among Christians? Are we ready to 'speak the truth in love' (Ephesians 4:15) in these areas? How should we pray?

### HOLINESS

Secondly, Jesus prays: 'keep them from evil' (v.15). The Church is a holy people with a new life, lifestyle and standards. While being distinct from the secular community around, we are also immersed in it.

In what spheres of public life do the Churches need to stand together if society is to see change? Are we prepared to pray for this?

### MISSION

Jesus also prays: 'sanctify them in the truth...As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world' (v.17,18).

Jesus' mission involved costly identification with us and our world. As the Church today, how prepared are we for this?

### UNITY

Only after praying for truth, holiness and mission in the Church, does Jesus go on to pray for its unity. How should Jesus' words (v.20,23) affect our attitudes to 'visible' unity?

Be ready to bring to God your hopes, fears and expectations about unity. Why not use John 17 as a basis for your prayer as a church this year?

## THURNSCOE FAMILY CENTRE

"I'd like to do something exciting, but I don't know anything exciting".

This was the response from an 11 year old to the question "What would you most like to do", and to me summed up what the new family Centre in Thurnscoe was there to provide. Thurnscoe was chosen as the area which would most benefit from a Centre because of the levels of unemployment and poverty, and shortage of other facilities: while we can do little to relieve poverty, what we can do is offer opportunity for people, new experiences for the children, and a range of facilities to encourage the growth of community groups. The idea behind this is that when people can achieve something, whether it is helping at a playscheme, learning to type, or learning to make Christmas decorations, it gives them that bit more self confidence. The more self confidence someone has, the more able they are to face up to and tackle problems which they face, and in this way the Centre can hopefully reduce the stress people are feeling while also widening their experiences both inside and outside the village.

This particular Centre, run by the Children's Society, and jointly funded by Barnsley Social Services has been open just five months. The activities on offer so far include two Mother & Toddler sessions, a Toy Library, two After School Clubs, and Typing and Craft Sessions run by other agencies. We are keen for the Centre to be used by as wide a range of people as possible, and will always encourage residents to run the activities rather than leave it to staff. Not that we are lazy you understand, but an activity run by one of the workers lasts as long as the worker is there; one run by a resident not only can last as long as the resident is there but 'belongs' to the village much more than something run by an outsider. The staff have much to offer in terms of their skills and knowledge, but we also recognise who the real experts on Thurnscoe are: the people who live there.

1. The treasurer reported on the accounts at the year end. The parish has been able to pay the Parish Share in full.
