#### RECTOR'S NOTES

#### ST CUTHBERT'S CHURCH

The Parochial Church Council has decided to undertake a series of major improvements to St Cuthbert's Church. The plan involves replacing the existing organ with an electronic one, the new organ to be sited at the west end of the church in the tower. The present vestry/organ chamber will be screened from the rest of the church to create a separate room, in which there will be a toilet. This new room will in effect be a large vestry, in which other activities will take place eg a Sunday School, committee meetings, informal services etc. The room will have improved storage facilities for Communion linen and altar requisites, vestments, cleaning equipment, flower vases etc. It will have a sink and simple kitchen facilities. The chancel floor will be repaired, and we hope to install improved lighting in the church. The Bradley Memorial, which is perhaps the finest monument in the church, and is at present behind the organ, will be restored and resited. These developments will tidy up the church, give us greater flexibility, and provide the opportunity to start work with children and young people.

#### THE DECADE OF EVANGELISM

The Bishops of the Anglican Church throughout the world have called for a Decade of Evangelism, "to make Christ known to the people of the world". The Pope has also called for "a decade of evangelisation", and there is increasing support from many other churches. The Decade of Evangelism will start on Epiphany Sunday, 6th January 1991. In this diocese there will be a Commissioning Service for parish representatives at the Cathedral on that day. In order to help us think about what this means for us in Ackworth I have invited Ken Sawyer, the Bishop's Adviser on Evangelism, to preach at St Cuthbert's Church at 10 15 am on Sunday 4 November. I hope that as many churchgoers as possible will make an effort to hear what Ken has to say.

#### BISHOP OF WAKEFIELD'S VISIT TO ACKWORTH

The Rt Revd David Hope, Bishop of Wakefield, is to make a pastoral visit to the parish on Wednesday 5 December. During the course of his visit he will call at the Howard School and meet with parishioners, including the churchwardens and the PCC.

#### JONATHAN COOK

On behalf of the parish I wish to congratulate Jonathan Cook, until recently our organist, on being elected to an organ scholarship at Oriel College, Oxford. This is a tremendous achievement and we are all delighted at his success. We extend to him our very best wishes for the future, and hope that this will be the start of an outstanding musical career. Jonathan will begin his studies at Oxford in October 1991.

#### EDWIN NICHOLLS

Edwin Nicholls who was a regular worshipper at All Saints' Church died recently after a short illness. Edwin was a quiet unassuming man who demonstrated a natural humility in his life and in his dealings with other people. He had been a magazine distributor, a sidesman, and a faithful member of the church. He was a committed Christian who prayed and read his Bible every day. We extend to his wife Dorothy, and daughter Lynda, our prayers and sympathies at their sad loss.

#### PCC NOTES, 1 OCTOBER

- 1 The treasurer reported on the church accounts. A bequest of £1000 has been left to the parish by Mr J M Howe, formerly of Ackworth. Mr J Gardham gave a report on convenant income. A claim for £2769 had been submitted to the Inland Revenue.
- 2 The PCC agreed to proceed with a plan for major improvements to St Cuthbert's Church, including; repairing the chancel floor; replacing the existing organ with an electronic one, to be positioned under the tower; creating a room in the north east corner of the church, to include a toilet; installing a new lighting system.
- 3 It was agreed to purchase 70 Alternative Service Books for use at St Cuthbert's Church with money from the Howe legacy.
- 4 A discussion took place on lay administration of the chalice. It was agreed to apply to the bishop for permission for this to take place, and to submit some names for approval.

# ARCHDEACON DAVID WRITES

One year on . . .

At the time of writing this article, Bishop David is in Madagascar on behalf of the Eames Commission sharing with the Province of The Indian Ocean on the issues concerning the Ordination of Women. Therefore he has asked me to write this letter for See-Link as I reflect on my first year in the Diocese of Wakefield.

Certainly it is good to be here. Such words reflect the words of St Peter on the Mount of the Transfiguration. He said that it was good to be there: it was a mind-blowling experience seeing the Lord transformed in glory in the presence of Elijah and Moses. But this side of eternity we only get glimpses from time to time of that glory. Thank God we do, but we are not permitted to stay with them for long. Like Peter and the others, we must come to grips with the reality of the hardships and difficulty of the valley. For Jesus has said to His disciples, "in the world you will have tribulation, but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world.

There is, I find, a spirit of quiet confidence but not over-confidence (!) in the Diocese. There are very good things going on - many of them in small and quiet ways, a few of them in quite dramatic ways, as well as there being a right spread of problems!! The best definition of an individual Christian truly following Christ, (and therefore also of a Church whether it be a parish or a diocese) is, "never out of blessing, never out of trouble." That of course is what Jesus assured us. There will

be problems but the rewards in working through these problems with Him are boundless.

There is a realism and confidence in all this which is reflected in the central events of our faith: Good Friday and Easter. It is NOT easy being a Christian today. But, then, Jesus never said it would be. We teel a very small minority (and we all too easily think that in former years it was very different - actually it often wasn't!) and for some it is costly to stand for Christ and not "let the world squeeze us into its own mould." (Romans 12:2) Teenage Christians sometimes find it can be very costly - for ridicule is all too often their experience. We need to pray for each other, and thus encourage one another.

Yet despite all this, there is a confidence. God reigns, and, from time to time, we see this worked out in our experience as individuals and as fellowships. We are surprised, amazed, and stand "lost in wonder, love and praise" and discover again that He really is "with us always, even unto the end of the age!"

To this end I have always found the words of St Paul (in Acts 20) helpful and they were given to me as I faced this new work: "I commend you to God and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you the inheritance among all those who are sanctified."

## UNITED IN CALDERDALE

Liam Gallagher, our housing adviser, is funded by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation. His job is to explore ways in which the churches can use their resources to develop affordable housing and to produce a "Good Practice Guide" from the results of his research.

#### **Home Sweet Home**

From 53,000 in 1978 to 126,000 in 1989! These figures are the number of households accepted by local authorities as homeless. They do not include the majority of single people or childless couples who are homeless because the local authority is not required to find them accommodation.

Many people on low income have enormous problems finding affordable rented accommodation and owning a home is totally out of reach.

#### **CEHA**

Clergy in Calderdale, especially Canon Robert Gibson, The Rev John Bunker and The Rev Malcolm James alarmed at the local housing crisis, decided that immediate action was required. So, with the assistance of the Housing Adviser in the Diocesan Social Responsibility Department, the Calderdale Ecumenical Housing Association (CEHA) was formed.

**All Acting Together** 

It was agreed that CEHA would be ecumenical, so CEHA includes the Baptists, United Reformed Church, Methodists, Roman Catholics, Anglicans, Religious Society of Friends and professionals from both the Local Authority and Housing Association world.

The Revd Kathleen M Richardson (for the Methodists), Bishop David Konstant (for the Roman Catholics) and Bishop David are the Vice-Presidents of CEHA.

#### **Aims**

CEHA helps to provide affordable housing for those in need; to provide assistance to existing projects, to identify Church land and property of any denomination

suitable for housing; and, most importantly, to make use of the Churches' experience in human relations when dealing with vulnerable people.

#### **Pulling Together**

CEHA facilitates and co-ordinates, linking up with the existing registered housing associations who will act as the developers and managers of the dwellings.

CEHA shows that the Churches, the Local Authority and Housing associations can and do work together for the benefit of the community they serve.

As a result of Bishop David's support and encouragement for CEHA and other housing initiatives, the Diocese is demonstrating Christianity in action.


The Diocese of Wakefield is laying foundations for joining in the world-wide launch of the

# **EDITORIAL**

He's doing his best!!!

The monthly publication for the Parishes and Parish Magazines of this Diocese usually appears as a single sheet - (A4). Sometimes, I am forced into two such sheets, like this month, so this is a 'double-issue.' The recent change to white paper has brought down our production costs, which allows us these occasional double-issues at VERY little extra overall cost. # GETTING KEYED IN TO COMPUTERS

SOME 2,000 CHURCHES in this country have access to a computer, according to the best estimates. Spreadsheets for finances, membership and 'contact' records, mailing lists, word processing — these are just some of the tasks ministers and church office-holders are discovering a computer can handle better than all those scrappy bits of paper, charts, files, etc. scattered among a number of homes and offices.

Tyneside minister, Stoker Wilson, already has his computer doing 21 different tasks more effectively than he could have done them by hand. Among other things, it keeps accounts and names and addresses; it means he can update pastoral teaching materials, committee agendas, Sunday service sheets. He has a 'keyword' program to find the right hymn for each sermon. Parish records can be searched so that nobody gets left out of events geared to their particular situation or age.

This isn't technology for its own sake. Pastoral care can be made *more* individual, if it is simple to personalise letters, or to remember to visit people to some sort of schedule. Stoker Wilson from Tyneside says it 'allows me more time to deal with people.'

THE MICRO FIELD is a huge one, with a number of landmines. But one person who hopes to sweep away some of those is the Rev Nigel Hardcastle, who is running the new Church Computer Project of the British Council of Churches.

Nigel founded the Church Computer Users Group 112 Rotherfield Rd Garretts Green, B'ham B26 2SH.

COMPUTERS ARE GOOD NEWS, too, for men and women who speak one of the 5,000 or so languages which still do not have a Bible. Over the last few years, briefcase size micros have been appearing in all sorts of 'out-back' locations. They do not even need a power supply as they can work off batteries.


Bible translators are finding they can key in a draft, revise it as often as they like, change (for instance) their choice of a word throughout the typescript at the touch of a button.

Anyone who has prayed for years for a missionary friend who is 'just typing another draft, hopefully the last' will appreciate the enormous change this all makes.

It means that errors can be progressively ironed out — and no new errors will creep in at later stages. And it means the translation can be consistent from Genesis to Revelation.

To mark the start of the Decade of Evangelism we publish the following story:



On a dangerous coast where shipwrecks often occur there was once a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut and there was only one boat, but a few devoted members kept a

constant watch over the sea, and with no thought for themselves they went out day or night tirelessly searching for the lost.

Many lives were saved by the wonderful little station so that it became famous. Some of those who were saved, and various others in the area, wanted to become associated with the station and give of their time and money and effort for the support of its work. New boats were bought and new crews were trained. The little life-saving station grew.

Some of the new members of the life-saving station were unhappy that the building was so crude and so poorly equipped. They felt that a more comfortable place should be provided as the first refuge of those saved from the sea. So they replaced the emergency cots and beds and put better furniture into an enlarged building.

Now the life-saving station became a popular gathering place for its members. They redecorated it exquisitely and furnished it beautifully because they used it as a sort of club.

Less of the members were now interested in going to sea on life-saving missions, so they hired life-boat crews to do this work. The life-saving motif still prevailed on the club decoration however, and there was a liturgical life-boat in the room where the club initiations were held.

About this time a large ship was wrecked off the coast and the hired crews prought in boat loads of cold, wet, half drowned people. They were dirty and sick and the beautiful new club was considerably messed So the property committee immediately had a shower-house built outside the club where the victims of shipwreck could be cleaned up before coming inside.

At the next meeting there was a split in the club membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's life-saving activities as being unpleasant and a hindrance to the normal social life of the club. Son members insisted upon life-saving as their primary purpose, and pointed out that they were still called a life-saving station. But they were finally voted down and told that if they wanted to save the lives of all the various kinds of people who were shipwrecked in those waters, they could begin their own life-saving station further down the coast.

They did.

As the years went by, the new station experienced the same changes that had occurred in the old. It evolved into a club, and yet another life-saving station was founded. History continued to repeat itself, and if you visit that coast today you will find a good number of clubs along that shore.

Shipwrecks are still frequent in those waters but most of the people drown.
