BAPTIST churches have been urged to set up 'social concerns committees' to focus members' attention on social problems in their local community, and to see coordinated action with neighbouring chirches.

The Baptist Union is using local churches' experience of problems of care for the elderly disabled and mentally handicapped to compile a report to locus future thinking and action.

CONCERN FOCUS

The closure of many local authority homes for the elderly and of many geriatric hospitals, and the high costs of private residential homes and nursing cure, are of special concern, Baptists have reported.

At the recent Baptist Assembly cases were cited of very elderly and even handicapped people being threatened with eviction or forced to depend on charities for necessities Community care for the mentally handicapped is proving very uneven, it was alleged while some were satisfactorily housed in small units in the community, many others were experiencing "great loneliness", and some were even being "physically persecuted".

The Baptist Union has issued 12 'questions for the churches' about the government's Community Careplans, for study and local action

Archdeacon Ken writes

The work of hospital chaplains, both full-time and part-time is known about and much appreciated by very many people, not only within the Church, but also outside it. In the diocese a different sort of chaplain has been appointed to

work among the sick and disabled. The Rev Michael Gartland, formerly Team Vicar of Upperthong and Holmbridge, has been licensed as full-time Chaplain to the Mental

Health Services of the Wakefield Health Authority. The appointment reflects the fact that increasingly, care for the mentally ill and the mentally handicapped is being exercised not only in our hospitals but in the wider community, and that the Church has a significant role to play in their care both inside and outside the boundaries of the hospital.

Are we ready?

At the reception after the licensing in conversation a number of people were asking (which many are asking generally) with regard for those who previously have been looked after in an institution — "is the community ready for the care of those who are being discharged?"

Our common life

We might, as an integral part in that community, ask ourselves – "are we as Christian congregations ready to accept not only those who suffer mental illness or handicap, but all sorts of other people who in some way or another are disadvantaged?" In fact, it is not just a matter of acceptance, but seeing what positive part they can contribute to our common life together in the Body of Christ. The mark of a healthy society, it

has been said, is that it treats minority groups neither as objects of pity or of charity. That means that they are integrated into our community and enabled to offer their contribution in and

amongst everyone else's.

Our PCC's and organisations need every so often to look at the provision we make with our buildings and activities, (social, educational or of worship) for those who suffer physical or mental disability, both adults and children.

C.H.A.D. guidelines

CHAD (CHurch Action on Disability) puts forward these guidelines:

- 1. ALL PEOPLE should be able to get into, see, hear and understand the worship and activities of the Church.
- 2. ALL PEOPLE should be able to participate in the Church's work and ministry as God calls us (it should not be that some people are always at the receiving end).
- 3. ALL PEOPLE (Not just the ones who are disabled) have much to learn from the experience of disability if our understanding of the Gospel is to be complete.

Presentation

The Wakefield Diocesan Committee for the Deaf presented a plaque at Wakefield Cathedral on the occasion of the Pontefract Archdeaconry Farewell Eucharist for Bishop David, 24th June 1991.

The photograph below shows Janet Henshall (CHAD Officer), Bishop David and Arthur Hemingway (W D Committee for the Deaf).

It was taken near the West door of the cathedral and shows Bishop David receiving the plaque after the service.

The plaque has been designed and sculptured in stainless steel and mounted on polished wood with an engraved plate which states that it was a gift to Bishop David from the Wakefield Diocesan Committee for the Deaf.



The Deaf hear!

There is a lot of misunderstanding with regard to the deaf, and because of the treatment meted out to them over the years of their deafness, the deaf are quite backward in acquainting people with their difficulties.

Volume of speech is not always the chief criteria. What is often needed is better clarity of speech on the part of the speaker. Speaking loudly, especially in large buildings often generates undesirable frequencies and reverberations which reduce the clarity.

Sound amplification does help, as it enables the hearing aid to be adjusted to a lower level of volume control thus avoiding amplifying the background noises too much.

Turning up the volume control on a hearing-aid is often counter-productive for the background noises and reveberations are usually amplified more than the speaker's words. The situation then becomes hopeless and the deaf person tends to switch off for comfort and relapse into silence.

An induction loop

The PCC of of Christ Church, Mount Pellon (Halifax) decided to tackle this problem by installing a sound amplification system together with a deaf-aid induction loop; the immediate result being that the deaf hear all of the services properly for the first time.

An induction loop is simply a length of

wire running round the inside of a building and connected to the sound amplification system. It can be hidden at floor level, which does not impair its effectiveness in any way. When a speaker speaks into any of the microphones, the amplifier generates a

magnetic field in the loop which varies in sympathy with the amplitudes and frequencies of the speaker's voice. These in turn can be received on all deaf-aids within the boundary of the loop. An induction loop can be easily fitted to an existing sound system using its own loop amplifier. Anyone in the building with hearing difficulties can set their hearing-aid from the "T" to the "M"

setting and listen to perfectly clear speech (or music).

Hearing-aids used in this way do NOT pick up any background noise or reverberations, they only hear the speaker's voice! The deaf can then amplify it to their own liking, with the speaker being heard quite clearly using their normal speaking voice, concentrating on clarity of speech rather than on amplitude. Thus prayer and sermons may then be said in a conversational voice which of course greatly adds to the improved communication.

It will be a great advantage for the deaf if all public buildings and churches install

> an induction loop -- as indeed all public telephones are now fitted in this way.

The Editor has it on good authority that the induction loop fitted inside Halifax Playhouse not only allows perfectly clear speech to be picked up in this way, but

also to be picked up in the Beehive and Cross Keys Inn across the road!

The Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches

"DAC" for short!

Most churches require urgent attention after a quinquennial inspection. The work usually needs a faculty-written permission for alterations to a church or churchyard, granted by the chancellor on behalf of the bishop, following the DAC's approval.

The DAC advises the applicants and the chancellor on faculties. The committee has expertise in various areas, like church architecture, organs, bells etc. Parishes considering repairs, alterations, or reordering of fabric and furnishing, heating, lighting, decoration, public address systems, should seek the DAC's advice at the earliest opportunity. The committee also advises on the erection of new churches, on extensions to present buildings and on the care of churchyards.

Acting honourably

The Church must be seen to act honourably. Most churches are 'listed' but they are exempt from the normal regulation about alterations and decorations. This "ecclesiastical exemption" allows the Church of England to regulate its own system of caring for its buildings. Historically the "exemption" was granted because the Church's system was more stringent and effective than the then state system. It cannot be stated too strongly that we shall only retain the privilege of the "exemption" if it is clear that we are not abusing it. So it is important to recognise that it is in parishes' own best interest to apply for faculties (especially now they are paid for centrally!).

Reordering

At almost every DAC meeting there are proposals for reordering churches. These vary in scale from major schemes, often incorporating facilities which might once have been provided by a church hall, to a minor rearrangement for a free-standing altar and un-cluttering of liturgical space.

Theology

Sometimes it is necessary to re-site the font or make provision for baptism by immersion. But, whereas there is general agreement about our understanding of eucharistic celebration, there is no such agreement about a common practice of baptism. Proposals for baptistries pose, as yet, unanswered questions about the theology of the sacrament.

New legislation

The new Care of Churches Measure will require the Chancellor to refer to the DAC before granting a faculty. The DAC will have to have at least one representative selected by English Heritage, and another by a "relevant authority". The Church's Consistory Courts will have powers to take out an injunction against any parish about to carry out alterations they deem unlawful, or to order the church to be restored to its original form if the work has been completed. The move is a confirmation of the Church of England's desire to maintain the ecclesiastical exemption rather than accept a planning control system. Roy Clements



CHILDREN AT COMMUNION

A 'Radical change in thinking and practice' on admission of children to communion is called for by a report by the Church of Scotland's Education Committee: it concludes that baptised children should now be admitted. The report says that such a change would not come overnight and it proposes a review period of five years 'to enable snags and unforeseen difficulties to be sorted out'.

In reaching their conclusion the working party 'believes the Church would gain a new awareness of the significance of the sacrament, a new sense of its worth and a new sense of Christ's presence with us'.

Children brought up to know what it means to sit at the Lord's Table, the report continues, would be more likely to relate to that opportunity and privilege in later life. More would be likely to remain as adults where they were accepted and participated in the central activity of the church as children.

'Children are well able to follow the symbolic representation in the sacrament,' states the report.
