RECTOR'S NOTES


St Cuthbert's Church



Those attending church this Christmas will notice that St Cuthbert's will have a 'new look'. the middle of December our building works at St Cuthbert's should be complete. What will be the difference? The most obvious difference will be that the church will be more brightly lit. Our new lighting system will also enhance the appearance of the building by highlighting architectural features such as the roof. But more importantly, we shall have a new large vestry which may be used for meetings and other activities on Sundays and during the week. vestry will include a toilet, and simple kitchen facilities. We hope that this room will be used for work with children during the Parish Communion, our Junior Church. These changes will make our building more flexible for the life of the worshipping congregation. They will also provide better facilities for members of the wider community using the church on public occasions, for example at weddings and funerals. This is an exciting time in the life of the parish, and we hope it will mark the start of a new phase in our worship and mission. We hope that these improvements will provide a renewed parish church, of which the people of Ackworth may be justifiably proud.







Magazine price increase

The church council has decided to increase the price of the parish magazine from January 1, 1992. It is four years since we last had a price rise. Rising costs have meant increasing losses on the magazine. From January the magazine will cost 25p for a single copy, with an annual subscription of £2 50 (about 21p per copy). We think this still represents good value for money. Our magazine is very well presented and printed, and we try our best to include items which will be of interest to as many as possible.

Bishop Richard writes

Christians have good news to share, and we have no mandate from the Lord to proclaim anything else.

We are not commissioned to air our personal views on current issues of

social or political concern: although, unless we are willing to speak out, it may well be the gospel perspective on such issues goes by default. We are not here to gain popular approval by echoing prejudices which, though

which, though sometimes unexpressed, are widespread in our society. We are here to tell people about the love which God has for that creation of his of which they are a part.

In order to do this it is essential that we ourselves should first have responded to his love: accepted his forgiveness: and opened ourselves to receive the gift of his Holy Spirit by which that love is shed abroad in our hearts.

Until then we have no good news to tell, and we do well to pray that at least God will give us grace to keep our big mouths shut. Otherwise we will, as a wise man once put it, "talk past ourselves, lose touch with reality, and proclaim glorious promises that are not fulfilled in our own experience."

Perhaps we are inarticulate, and words do not come easily to us. Never mind: plenty of inarticulate people over the years, who have known God's love in their own lives, have proclaimed the love of God with converting power. And plenty of highly articulate people have kept unresponding congregations

enthralled by their eloquence, and all the time it was sounding brass and tinkling cymbal.

Christmas is the time when we tell anyone who will listen, and perhaps even those who will not, that God's love

knows no limits and has no strings attached.

We tell it to people who feel confident and secure in their strength, and we tell it to people who are despairing in their weakness. "God loves you", we say, even if in some contexts we are only able to tell it slant. God loves you, and it is short-term folly to attempt to find security in anything else but his love.

God has no illusions: he knows the very worst about us, and more about us than it would be safe for us to know ourselves: and - amazingly - he still loves us, and longs to accept us as his children and to share his life with us.

"As many as received him, to them gave he power to become the Sons of God". Let us claim our own sonship first, and then, with no astringent flip-side to what we say, tell the story of God's love to the world around us.

In TS Eliot's play "The Cocktail Party" one of the characters says to the psychiatrist: "I want to be cured of a craving for something I cannot find, and of the guilt of never finding it". Perhaps someone we know will find it this Christmas.

The New Bishop's Election

The Chapter of Wakefield expects to elect Bishop Nigel McCulloch, Bishop of Taunton, as the eleventh Bishop of Wakefield at a special meeting of the Chapter summoned for 11.00 am on Thursday 12th December 1991.

The proceedings will commence with a celebration of Holy Communion in the Choir of the Cathedral, after which the Canons, in their stalls in the Choir will proceed to the election. Bishop Nigel will then become the Bishop-elect of Wakefield, rather than Bishop-designate.

This election is open to the public and the Provost, The Very Rev John Allen, hopes that many people will be present to see this ancient ceremony and start Bishop Nigel's ministry amongst us on a raft of prayer. The Confirmation of the Election will take place in York on the Feast of St Valentine, Friday 14th February 1992. Bishop Nigel will then be officially Bishop of Wakefield, and legally responsible for the Diocese. He will NOT however, undertake any public engagements in the Diocese until his Enthronement.

Arrangements are in hand for the Enthronement to take place on Saturday 28th of March 1992 at 3.00 pm. John Allen, Provost of Wakefield

MARA COLUMN

Reconciliation

The work of Jesus

In the Gospels Jesus refers to the work He has come to do. His prayer in St John 17 tells us what tasks He thinks are important – loving, oneness with the Father, the Glory of the Father.

Our task

The world we live in often seems torn apart - wars, civil strife, soured relationships, murder, drugs and the rest. It all starts with what is inside ourselves. Our task is to devote ourselves to continue the work Jesus came to do.

We can play our part in His work of reconciling His world, starting with ourselves, our own constant reconciliation with the Father and with each other, and then encourage others to do the same. This can be part of our task during the Decade of Evangelism.

Healing

Guilt is a danger sign that we have departed from God's ways. Guilt festers if not dealt with. Many today need to be healed. It shows us our danger and leads us through confession, forgiveness and amendment.

Soured relationships

With soured relationships we can, perhaps, lead others to point where they can forgive, make a first move, even achieve full reconciliation.

A push from someone is often needed - we may find the opportunity when visiting the sick, the dying or the bereaved.

Soul friend

Many Christians have found great benefit from having a *Soul friend*, often a parish priest, someone to whom they can go in complete confidentiality to talk about everything – what affects them, relationships, guilt, sin, hopes and progress. Where they can say what they like without fear of it being repeated and where they can trust the advice given. Often the last person to forgive us is ourselves.

Sacramental confession

Many are coming to recognise the value of confession to a priest and see it as being additional to their personal confession in daily prayer and Sunday worship. It provides the occasion for careful examination of ourselves and the chance to reflect upon our sorrow. We can reveal all of what we remember in a way we would not do before anyone else. It gives us a sense of liberation and a desire to please God better. Above all, it gives us the assurance, so often needed, that God pardons the penitent. We need to hear that we are forgiven.

This is God's work of reconciliation. It is given to us to cleanse and strengthen us. It includes every aspect of our lives, bringing wholeness. It starts with us but is also connected with the ills of the world. We have to know reconciliation ourselves if we are to lead others into the love of God.

BISHOP'S CENTENARY FUND

The BCF Quiz Final

Almost a year to the day since the first match was played, the final was held on the 11th of October (just too late to get into the last See-Link, Ed).

After 14 rounds of questions and a nail-biting recount, the final score was, 114 points for each of the finalists — All Saints' Batley and St Catherine's Sandal. It did not seem fair to have additional questions to try to find the winner, as it must have been God's wish that they ended level.

Bishop Richard presented the Rose Bowl to both team captains, Geoff Bellamy (All Saints') and Freddie Marshall (St Catherine's) and they agreed to hold it for 6 months each, with a handing-over ceremony when the parishes would get together. This is most appropriate as, in addition to raising money for the Fund, the aim of the quiz has been to foster fellowship between parishes who would not normally meet – this has certainly been achieved!

Perhaps the final result was God's instruction that what has been begun should continue. Watch this space!

Progress

Two meetings were held late in October (The Treacy Hall and St Thomas' Huddersfield) when as BCF Chairman, I reported on the progress of the Fund, telling the parish representatives that the Fund has now reached £770,000 - a remarkable Diocesan achievement in these difficult

times, and that we are on target to raise the full £1 million over the four years.

In terms of grants made to projects in our Diocese, so far £52,000 has bee distributed from the BCF and we have received £252,000 from the Church Urban Fund (CUF). Up to the end of October we have paid over to the CUF £250,000 which leaves £50,000 outstanding against our original CUF target of £300,000.

Many of our parishes have achieved their target of £750 for 1991 and in order to "top up" this year's efforts the BCF Trustees have launched their appeal. They are asking all parishes to review their giving over this year and make a special effort to contribute to the BCF before the end of December.

Many good suggestions came out of the October meetings and in future editions of See-Link we will report on Parish giving, highlighting good ideas and best "practice" to help others. It is also intended to produce a barometer to chart our progress as we get into our final year of fund-raising.

Whatever happened to Saint Nicholas?

For 1500 years the good Turkish bishop, patron saint of sailors and children, was remembered as a Christian holy man who was kind to the poor. Then he suddenly became the secular Christmas symbol we all know today.

It seems the Americans are to blame. Saint Nick arrived there with Dutch settlers and by 1810 he had a new identity: fat and jolly, wearing furry red clothes and driving a wagon.

Poor people were out. Santa became an elf who could climb down chimneys; he also acquired a sleigh and a team of eight reindeer. He moved house to Lapland where, even now, he can be seen making wooden toys and writing replies to the half-million children who write to him in Lapland each year.

Other letters go to a small town in the United States called Santa Claus, where the townfolk answer all his mail. Here in the UK, the Post Office handles 500,000 letters a year addressed to Father Christmas, Reindeerland (or variations on this). They are diverted to Edinburgh (all the children get a reply).

In 1988, one little girl asked for an electric wheelchair for her invalid grandfather in Cornwall. The chairman of the Post Office delivered it personally on Christmas Eve. Less selfless was the small boy who sent Santa his father's wage packed to help pay for his his presents. Dad got his money back.
