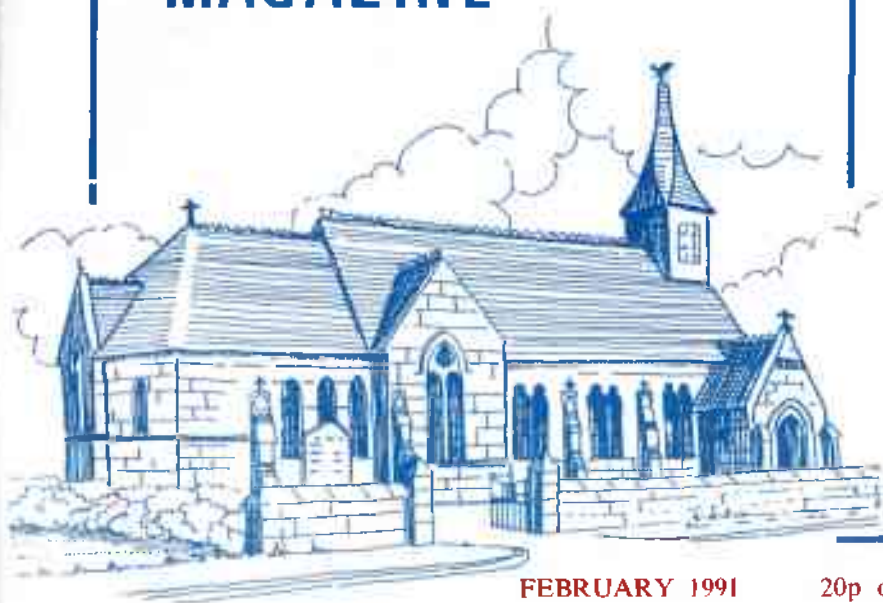
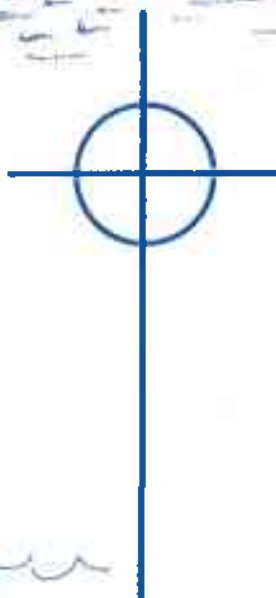

RECTOR'S NOTES



PARISH FINANCES

INFLATION! RECESSION! OIL CRISIS! GLOOM AND DOOM!.
DEBT! - we are constantly bombarded by news of financial problems. I'm afraid the church is no exception! We also face constantly rising costs and the need to increase our income. CONTRARY TO POPULAR

OPINION THE CHURCH IS NOT IMMUNE FROM INFLATION AND RISING PRICES. Unless our income increases in line with inflation (or better) the work of the church both nationally and in the parish will be hampered and the parish will gradually slide into debt.

Our main financial commitment is to pay the Parish Share. This is the money we send to the Diocese every month. Most of this money goes to maintain the church's full time ministry - it ensures this parish has a Rector. In 1991 our Parish Share is £11,445. This means that we have to find £220 EVERY WEEK in order to meet this commitment, and like any other household we have to pay for heating, lighting, insurances etc.

How can YOU help? Here are some suggestions if you are SERIOUS about helping the church:

*Join the Stewardship Envelope Scheme - giving through envelopes ensures a regular income for the church, since a commitment is made to give weekly, whether you attend church or not. (For envelopes ring Ada Pritchard, 611086)

*Covenant your giving - if you pay income tax. This means that the parish can reclaim the tax you have paid on your contributions. By simply signing a form your giving is increased by 33%! Last year we received over £2,000 from the Inland Revenue by this method. (To covenant your giving ring John Gardham, 795000)

*Consider carefully and prayerfully how much to give - in the end this is a personal matter, dependant upon income and personal circumstances. However please remember that the average cost of the Parish Share is now £1 78 per week per adult member. In other words we need to think in terms of pounds rather than pence, and we need to break the 'pound coin barrier' if our income is to keep pace with inflation. Please remember also that giving is a reflection of our faith and our commitment to the Christian life and the life of the church.

VISITING PREACHERS

On Sunday 3 February we welcome the Rt Revd David Hope, Bishop of Wakefield, as our visiting preacher. Bishop David visited the parish in December, but was only able to meet PCC members and a small number of other people on that occasion. This is your opportunity to hear and meet your bishop. On Sunday 3 March our visiting preacher will be Felicity Lawson, the Director of Training for the Diocese. Felicity is a former parish worker and so is familiar with the nuts and bolts of parish life. Before coming to the diocese in 1987 she was chaplain and tutor at St John's Theological College, Nottingham.

LENT STUDY GROUPS

The Ackworth Fellowship of Churches is organising a series of Lenten study groups. As this year marks the start of the Decade of Evangelism the groups will be studying the topic of 'evangelism', ie the church's task of spreading the gospel. The course will be based on the book 'Lights that Shine', published by the Bible Reading Fellowship. This interesting and imaginative book raises such important questions as: 'What is the gospel?'; 'Why is it that some people go to church, but others do not?'; 'How do people become Christians?'; 'How can we make evangelism happen - eg ways of reaching people'. ASH WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 13

Ash Wednesday is a special day in the life of the church. It marks the beginning of Lent, and the rules of the Church of England state that the Eucharist must be celebrated in every parish church on that day. I invite everyone, therefore, who regards themselves as a church member to attend the Parish Communion at St Cuthbert's Church on Ash Wednesday at 7 45 pm, or All Saints' Church at 9 15 am.

DUTY — OR JOY?

IF YOU ask the average man in the street why he doesn't go to church you will get a wide range of answers. Some typical answers would be: "It's boring," "It's unintelligible," "It's irrelevant," "I don't need the church." If you asked the average church-goer about church you might get some very similar comments! So why do we go to church? Many of us go because we feel we have to, we feel it is our duty. Sometimes as you look around at the earnest, dutiful faces surrounding you, you might wonder if they're feeling as miserable as they look.

Duty is a funny thing: it has this tremendous capacity for killing enjoyment. The Englishman as he performs his duty maintains a stiff upper lip, grits his teeth and



gets on with the onerous job ahead. But is this the way a Christian should approach worship? Somehow I think not. Our dutiful approach to worship has helped to make the church inaccessible and remote to the daily lives of many people. Our church services could become much more alive if we took to

heart the following words from the Anglican service of Holy Communion: "It is our duty and our joy at all times and in all places to give You thanks and praise." Down the ages we have concentrated so much on doing our duty that many of us have lost much of our sense of wonder and of joy. Our worship is supposed to be an act of joy which should flow out to those surrounding us. Our joy stems from our relationship with God through his Son, Jesus Christ.

One of the most powerful witnesses to the Gospel is the effect it has on our lives. The joy we experience as members of the Church can be of great help to those who have little or no faith in God.

Bishop David writes - what about our worship?

One of the main ways in which people experience church is through worship. It may be the occasional visit, such as a funeral, a baptism, a Songs of Praise, or even a fleeting visit to the usual Sunday morning service. What does such a person find? I expect it would be varied, depending on which church they happened to visit.

Yet the fact is that all our churches ought to have a proper concern about worship. What worship is and how it is done, communicates something about us and, far more importantly, about the God we worship. The truth is that many people find what goes on in church - "boring." The worst thing we can do is to make God boring! So there is the need for every church to have a continuing concern about worship, especially its content and presentation.

"Is it time for you to take a fresh look at worship in your parish church?"

The language of worship is important, but that doesn't just mean the "old service" or the "new service". The language of worship is indeed about words, and silence too, the "mood", the structure, the movement and music, about standing and sitting and kneeling (have we forgotten or abandoned kneeling?).

These are all ways in which the human person individually and together as a worshipping community is enabled to enter into that which is both the mystery and the familiarity of God, who binds us together in Jesus Christ through His spirit, and who invites us into a deeper relationship with

him by way of equipping us for going out in love and service in the world.

A fresh look at worship

There are set forms for worship and many parish churches have the Family Eucharist as the main Sunday morning act of worship. There are needs in addition to this for special "one-off" services for particular celebrations, or a more regular family service - all of which can become nothing more than a rather unimaginative hymn sandwich.

Our Diocesan Liturgy and Worship Group is offering therefore two duplicate evenings in each archdeaconry for anyone who has a responsibility for planning worship, (see page 3).

The evenings will enable them to take a fresh look at what they are about. Each one will include an introduction to the principles of planning an act of worship, as well as allowing the participants to experience the kind of service arising from these principles.

In the Diocese are many examples of good practice, both of the traditional and more modern style of services. Many parishes have blended imaginatively and sensitively both "ancient" and "modern," which is precisely what the living tradition of the Church has always done and continues to do. Is it time for you to take a fresh look at worship in your parish church?

The Church Hall Almondbury

Towards the end of 1990 we saw the opening of All Hallows Almondbury's (Huddersfield) new church hall by Bishop David. An ancient doorway in the North wall has been re-opened after many centuries to provide access from the church to the hall.

In 1985 the old Church Infants' School near the church was transferred to a newer building much further away. The old building was too big and too costly to adapt and maintain; and its future ownership was in doubt. The Church Council studied several schemes before deciding on the present building.

Faculty and Planning Consents were obtained in June 1989 and an appeal for £170,000 was launched immediately. The response was very encouraging. In fifteen months, All Hallows raised the majority of

this amount from within its own membership, with some additional resources. We hope to raise the outstanding amount in the very near future.

Sadly, the project has suffered from local controversy after the building was started with a campaign of opposition being mounted. This has hindered the appeal to the wider community, something which has been very difficult to overcome.

However, we now greatly appreciate the feeling of common purpose which having the hall has brought to this church. It is in use for a variety of church and community groups, and is going to be an important tool for the church's mission.

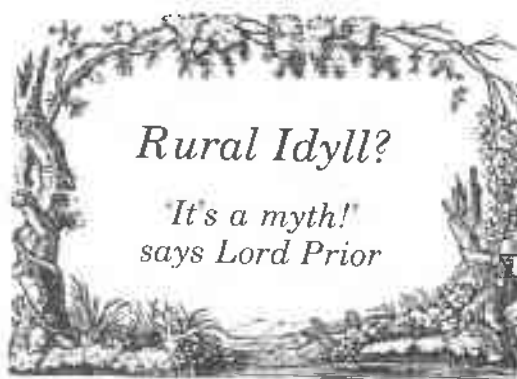

The English countryside is experiencing rapid and comprehensive social economic change - and Church and community need to act urgently to meet the challenge. That's the message of 'Faith in the Countryside', the report of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York's Commission on Rural Areas.

The Commission undertook two years of independent research in country parishes throughout England. Its report portrays the social, economic and spiritual life of rural England at the end of the 20th century and highlights areas of particular concern.

This follows the 'Faith in the City' report published five years ago which has contributed widely to Government, Church and Voluntary Sector planning for the country's urban priority areas and not least to the setting up of the Church Urban Fund.

'Faith in the Countryside' is set against a background of declining agriculture, a deteriorating environment and infrastructure and a lack of affordable housing. The report makes a number of detailed proposals in these areas which it addresses to central and local Government and it examines environmental issues.

On the Church, the report calls for better support structures, more appropriate clergy training, more lay involvement in the Church's mission and ministry and greater financial responsibility for the work of the Church at parish level.

Lord Prior, who headed the Commission, says: 'We have confronted some hard truths about life in the countryside. The rural idyll is a myth, and the Church must join others in an urgent review of how best to serve the altered needs of the rural community.'

The 'Faith in the Countryside' report was published in September 1990, in time for it to be debated in the Church of England's new Synod which met in November 1990. Published by Churchman Publishing, it is available from bookshops at £12.50.

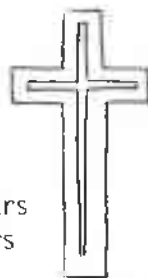
