RECTOR'S NOTES



ST CUTHBERT'S CHURCH

Phase one of our building improvements at St Cuthbert's Church is now complete. Our new organ has been installed. The console is now positioned at the back of the church in the tower. This means that the organist can see what is happening in the church, instead of trying to guess what the Rector is doing! In addition he can see and hear the congregation -

essential when trying to lead worship. We have also gained an enormous amount of space, which will form part of our new vestry.

The old stone and timber chancel floor, which was in serious need of repair, has been replaced with a concrete floor. In time this will be carpeted, after the next phase of building. During the building works the choir stalls were removed from the chancel. This transformed the appearance of the church, giving a feeling of spaciousness, and helping us to appreciate the gothic architecture of the building. Now that the chancel floor is complete it is my intention to use an altar at the west end of the chancel, so that everyone in the church will be able to see the altar, which is, or should be, the focus of worship during the Eucharist.

The second phase of our improvements should begin towards the end of the summer. This will include creating a large vestry in which we hope to hold a Junior Church which will meet at the same time as the Parish Communion. We hope that this arrangement will encourage families to attend church together. The vestry will include simple kitchen facilities and a toilet.

THE REVEREND WILSON OPUDO

On Sunday 14 July we welcome the Reverend Wilson Opudo to St Cuthbert's Church as our preacher at the Parish Communion. Fr Opudo is from the Diocese of Mara in Tanzania, East Africa, which is of course linked with the Diocese of Wakefield. He is visiting the parish of Badsworth for six months and is living at Upton. Fr Opudo is married and he and his wife Mary have one child. He is the Vicar of Buhemba and is also the Youth Officer for the Diocese of Mara. We look forward to meeting him, and to hearing about his life and work, and what he makes of England. I hope that as many as possible will come to hear him

PASTORAL CARE - PARISH MARRIAGE PREPARATION COURSE

This course developed as a result of the Stewardship Mission in 1988. A group of us (Peter and Mary Moorhouse, Jeremy and Doreen Belk, Liz Jones and Dorothy Greiff) met together with Eileen Turner from the Diocesan Family Life Team to discuss how a course for marriage preparation could be started. We looked into a number of courses which were already being used, and decided that the course written and tested by Margaret Stevens would best meet our needs in Ackworth.



Preparations took almost a year. The team met once a month to learn and study the course. After all this time and work we did not feel ready to work with the couples about to be married. In order to gain further experience we followed the course ourselves with two members of the team leading in turns and the other four, complete with husbands, doing the exercises as the couples about to be married would do them. By then we felt ready to begin. So with everything prepared by our secretary, Fiona Davies, we began.

The course is run in the home of a church couple. The hosts have usually been married for a few years. They work through the course exercises with the couples preparing for marriage.

The course is divided into four sessions. The First Session starts by everyone introducing themselves to each other. This is followed by the first question and answer quizzes. These quizzes (fifteen in all) are worked through by the couples. There are no embarrassing answers given within the group. No one is put on the spot!!

Partners are encouraged to get to know each other better, understand each other more and learn to listen carefully to what the other is saying to them. The quizzes and exercises are designed to help them communicate more effectively.

Session Two is about being married and what marriage means. We discuss the differing expectations of the sexes, the different family traditions that they come from, and the influence of parents and relations. We talk about children and the changes that they will make to the marriage.

Next comes conflict, its causes and resolution. We talk about the good and bad ways of resolving conflict. A good way for example, is to talk things over carefully together - when things have calmed down! A bad way is to throw things at each others heads. We include discussion about 'forgiveness' and explain that true forgiveness means letting go of resentments, which can sometimes be very hard to do.

Session Three is about growing together sexually. We aim to encourage knowledge, understanding and awareness of each others needs, expectations and hopes. In this session we are very careful not to cause embarrassment within the group. Brainstorming is used for parts of this session. 'Brainstorming' means ideas are called out from members of the group, and the leader writes each idea on a large sheet of paper. Then the group can discuss the suggestion together.

News from Wakefield Diocese.

Bishop Richard writes

We knew we were not going to have him for the rest of his ministry, but even so we hoped we would have him for a bit longer than this !

Sadly, that was not to be: by the time you read this we will have had our Eucharist of Farewell in the Cathedral. commending him to the grace of God, and Bishop David will be on his way.

I was chaplain to one bishop, archdeacon to two others, and have been suffragan bishop to a further three. It could be said that I am something of a connoisseur of

episcopal style, and I hope it will not be thought patronising if I say that for the last five and a half years we have been on the receiving end of a quite outstanding episcopal ministry.

Bishop David came to us as a local lad, and much play

was made at the time of the piquancy of his banging for admission on the door of a cathedral which contained folk who had known him there when he was singing as a treble in the choir.

He was accepted and affirmed as a person from the moment he arrived, but they would hardly have been human if people who had known him years ago had not suspended judgement before acknowledging his capacity for leading the diocese forward into its next exciting stage.

It was the Centenary, and the

preparations for celebrating it, which dispelled any lingering queries there may have been. Bishop David's tours of the deaneries, his helicopter swoops onto school playgrounds, the Huddersfield Town Football Ground service, and then the Lancaster Conference: all of this made evident to a wider public what some of us had been sensing for a while.

The Lord had sent us another! He would be with us for a few years: to be hardened off, to gain confidence from the kind of affirmation West Yorkshire can give to

And then, like Bishop Colin before him, he would be whisked away to what has if we are realistic - to be recognised as offering greater scope for gifts of that kind than we can offer here.



CR - Mirfield

The House of The Resurrection, Stocksbank Road, next to the Parish Church of Christ the King, Battyeford, has been our Mother House since we were first welcomed to the diocese by Bishop Walsham How. It is the home base for just over 30 of us, and at present we have smaller houses in London, Sunderland and Johannesburg – there are about 50 of us all together.

This is not the largest men's community in the Church of England, but the only one now with a large house like Mirfield, and this means we can offer an ordered, God-centred style of life and worship, and the resources of a large library, to enquirers, guests and students which it is hard to find elsewhere.



Our main commitment is to Community life, sustained by common worship and prayer. From these flow works such as retreats, missions and preaching away from home, as well as teaching and spiritual direction at Mirfield itself. The Community is well known for its work overseas, principally and still in Southern Africa, but not so extensive as it once was. In the diocese the best known work is the College of The Resurrection, where men are trained for the Anglican priesthood. The College staff consists of brethren of the Community and two priests who are not members. Local clergy are also involved in the training programme, not least because the students get their first



experience of ministry in local parishes, hospitals, prisons, etc.

All Christians are called to live out their baptismal vows in the Body of Christ which is His Church. There are a great variety of vocations in which people can serve God and their

fellow men and women: some are called more specifically to serve in and through the Church itself. God's call may make itself known to us through what others say, or it may make itself felt in the silence of our hearts. Such vocations need to be no less carefully tested by submitting to the assessment of experts as would the qualifications of someone aspiring to one of the professions.

If you feel you may have a call to the priesthood, or to the religious life in a Community like Mirfield, the first step is to go to see your parish priest and talk it over with him.

We are hoping to organise a day conference, in the near future, to inform and educate further about these issues. For, let's face it, people are not really very interested in issues to do with criminal justice because they are not always very comfortable facts. We should be particularly concerned to pray and think about prisons in *Prisoners' Week* each November.

Faith and work

I have enthusiastically committed myself to the Group because I always try to consider what the link is between the job I do day to day, and my Christian commitment. This is one of the ways that helps me to think through some of the difficulties I have in linking my faith and my work.

Intouch - Mission to Lepton

After a meeting with the PCC some three years ago, Philip Hacking, Vicar of Christ Church Fulwood in Sheffield and Chairman of the Keswick Convention agreed to hold two missions to Lepton. The first we called "Mission to Ourselves," held in 1990, a week of teaching, challenging the congregation of St John's Lepton (near Huddersfield) to reconsider the claims of the Gospel for themselves. There were never less than a hundred people attending the five evening meetings.

The response

The following winter the Church abandoned its House Groups and encouraged their members to attend the "Person to Person Course" as a preparation for every-member evangelism. Eighty five people responded, though by the end of the second part, Lent 1991, the number had dropped to thirty! Undaunted, the preparations continued.

Bishop David's support

Prior to the Mission to Lepton, each house received an extra edition of the Parish Paper which gave details about the three open meetings in the Church and encouragement from Bishop David to take The Mission seriously.

The "Christian" meetings

The Mission consisted of 22 events – largely coffee mornings, afternoon teas and buffet suppers, all in homes. In addition there was a ladies' lunch held in the Church, a men's breakfast in a local school and an area workers' lunch. There was also a meeting for the parents of children who had no contact with the Church and a meeting for teenagers – as well as the already mentioned meetings in Church. We made it clear that they were being invited to a Christian meeting!

What did it all achieve?

The whole parish had some contact with the Church and between 300 and 400 people received an invitation to one of the events – 150 people from outside the Church responded. If there can be any measure of success, it can only be that 17 people responded positively, some of whom were outside the Church, most of whom were on the edge of the Church family – all are being "followed up" and invited to join an enquirer group or a nurture group.

One thing we have learnt is that it is merely the beginning. The Mission has given us an excellent launch-pad into future evangelistic ministry in the parish,

News from Mara Diocese

Link Baby

Wakefield and Mara are like first-time parents with a new baby – The Link. It's very nice, but what do we do with it, and when will it stop clinging to Mum and Dad?

Linking is about communicating, which will always be our biggest problem. No 'phone, no fax, no photo-copier, no post, no car, no road, no rail — that's the reality for Mara. We even find it hard to keep in touch with each other, so how can we get, or stay, linked to Wakefield?

Our internal problem is being eased by the Luddenden motorbikes. We now see our Rural Dean regularly, and that alleviates the dismaying isolation of our Pastor. Seeing Serengeti's Rural Dean, Peter Tabuse, pulling involuntary wheelies on a 100cc Kawasaki with The Rev Narkiso Majwala as ballast is an unforgettable memory, and it helps bind us together! We now feel part of Serengeti Rural Deanery.

From time to time we also feel part of Mara Diocese – when the Bishop comes for a Confirmation Service, for example. We worship under the shade of an ancient Jaracunda – our classroom

Church is far too small – and belt out songs of praise led by our youthful choir in crisp school uniform.

Feeling to be part of Wakefield is proving more difficult, but we are working on it, and the Mara Link Committee (the one in Mara) has three positive recommendations. Firstly, it wants each of our 30 odd parishes to be linked with at least one of Wakefield's 200. Secondly, it wants each parish which is linked to say so on its stationery, its notice board, and in a prominently displayed parish version of The Link Covenant exchanged by our Bishops in Wakefield Cathedral. It will be written in English and Swahili. Thirdly, a three-monthly deadline is to be set by which time hard news and information must be ready for onward transmission to Wakefield.

We want all in our Churches to think and pray about our Wakefield brothers and sisters as often as possible, rather than see The Link relegated to infrequent and sparsely attended meetings.

These things we in Mara are resolved to do. Our baby is precious to us. We, as you, expect great things of it. May God bless and protect it.

The Deanery of Pontefract

While the rest of the diocese catches its breath after the excitements of its Centenary, the Deanery of Pontefract celebrates this year (with something short of bated breath) the 65th Anniversary of its annexation from the Diocese of York. It brought to the Diocese in 1926 some 25 parishes – and shortly afterwards a Suffragan Bishop! It is – only just – the largest Deanery, both in number of parishes and area, in the diocese.

Inevitably, there are striking contrasts. Much of the area has been shaped by its coal-mining history, and many of the 'pit villages' retain their character of closely-knit families and fierce loyalties, even though most of the pits are now closed.

Pontefract, at its centre, still is a thriving market town, with the only race—course in the diocese, and its own distinctive aroma of licorice to remind the world of its fame. Castleford is recovering slowly after being badly hit by recession in the eighties. There are also quite a few pretty rural villages.

In all these distinctive communities the Church continues to strive to serve the people. Clearly, in such a large and varied deanery, problems and opportunities differ widely, and parishes tend to work together in clusters rather than as a deanery. Yet there is a strong sense of unity among both clergy and people, and Pontefract generally knows its mind about the important issues of the day!

CHANGES-OF-ORDER. Please write to the Editor BY 1st SEPTEMBER with details of required changes for the quarter OCTOBER-DECEMBER. Changes-of-Order are concerned with; how many copies each parish receives and whether the copies are FLAT or FOLDED.

A quiz is used to help couples talk to each other privately about sexual matters. The group then talk together about having children, including whether they intend to have children, how many and when. This session is closed by telling them that most couples have some difficulties with sexual relations, at sometime in their marriages, and we recommend some books on the subject. We also tell them where to go for help if they feel that they need expert guidance.

Session Four is about growing together spiritually and emotionally. We read through the marriage service together in the group and discuss what the vows mean. We help them to understand what it is that they are promising each other. The group also discusses attitudes, feelings and experiences of God, for example in times of trauma, crisis or joy. A video called 'Getting Married in Church' is watched and discussed. The course ends with a prayer asking God's blessing on the couples and their marriages.

It is difficult to know how successful we have been in our aims to bring the couples to a closer understanding of each others needs, feelings and the true meaning of marriage, but they appear to enjoy the course. One couple who completed the course last year were hosts to a course this year, and one of this couple has volunteered to become a leader.
