RECTOR'S NOTES

PARISH WEEKEND, SCARGILL HOUSE, 1992

It is now three years since a small group of twenty went away for a parish weekend to Barrowby House, near Harewood in Wharfedale. On that occasion we went to consider the future life of the parish. We were trying to respond to the Bishop's request during the Diocesan Centenary that all parishes look to the future, as well as celebrating the past. As a result of that weekend we held a Stewardship Mission, and many new initiatives in our church life were started.

We now plan to hold a second parish weekend next year at Scargill House near Kettlewell in Upper Wharfedale. Scargill House is a major Christian conference centre which will accommodate about 90 people, and is a particularly good centre for families. We hope that this will be a fellowship weekend, when church members can get to know each other better, and especially those who are new to church life. Further details of the weekend are being circulated in church.

THE CHURCH URBAN FUND

The Parochial Church Council has recently decided to try to raise £750 before the end of the year for the Church Urban Fund. This is in response to a challenge set by Stan Evans, the Bishop's Centenary Fund Director. You may remember that the Church Urban Fund was established in 1987, in order to raise £18 million for the church's work in inner city parishes, and other parishes facing difficult social problems. Each diocese in the Church of England was asked to raise a target figure. Wakefield's target was £300,000. So far we have raised £154,000, although the diocese has received no less than £227,000 for various parish projects. The aim therefore is to fulfil our target as a leaving gift to the Bishop as he moves to London.

Living in Ackworth we may find it difficult to understand the need for this Fund. We are fortunate to live in pleasant surroundings, and in a community in which people are relatively affluent, and in which there are few social problems. This is not the case in many parishes, especially those in some of our major cities where crime, vandalism, unemployment, poor housing and often an ageing population create pressures which we can only imagine. In some areas the Church of England is the only presence, because as the established church we are expected to be there. The Church Urban Fund is therefore an attempt to regenerate the mission of the church in our own land, and many new and exciting projects are being undertaken. I hope the PCC's decision to raise this money will meet with your financial support.

CHILDREN IN CHURCH

That's the title of a Coffee Evening to be held on Wednesday 26 June at Ackworth Cricket Club, Wakefield Road, from 7 pm onwards. The coffee evening is being run by the committee of our Mother and Toddler Group, and is designed to raise funds for a future Sunday School, or Junior Church, and for the Group itself. The improvement work presently being undertaken on St Cuthbert's Church is partly aimed at creating a room in the church in which we can run a Sunday School. We hope that a Sunday School will be established in the Autumn of this year. Please support the coffee evening.

Yet change can often be the only way of going forward to achieve something better- as I will try to remind myself when I again pick up that scraper:

Of course; change for its own sake is not justifiable - though neither is maintaining the status quo. And, of course, change is part of the cycle of Life, as the old hymn reminds us:-

'Through all the changing scenes of life, In touble and in joy

This May day holiday, the green tinge of the year, all around us nature is in a state of flux. Spring is by its nature a season of change - a green growth from the dreariness of winter.

The poet Philip Larkin saw the growth of new greenery in Spring as a symbol of positive change for us all. In essence nature is unchanging yet every year it is in someway new.

Look at trees, says Larkin, in full grown thickness every May.

'Last year is dead, they seem to say, Begin afresh, afresh,'

! know this sounds a little bit like 'Thought for the Day!

Perhaps I'll be more successful with that scraper!!!

Bishop David writes - Moving on

Moving on is one of the themes which is embedded within the scriptures from the very beginning. It is a recurring aspect of Christian living. It is a fact of life for many people in the course of their lives. And now after five years and eight months as Bishop of the Diocese of Wakefield I am preparing to move to London, the place from which I moved to come to Wakefield!

Number ten

It has been an enormous privilege and a tremendous opportunity to serve the

Diocese of Wakefield as its tenth Bishop. Not for a moment, as I watched Bishops from the choir stalls as a chorister in the Cathedral, did I ever imagine that one day I would sit in the Bishop's

throne. I was pitched in at the deep end, being made a Diocesan Bishop from Vicar.

Teamwork

I was reliant upon the team already in place – Bishop Richard, the two Archdeacons of Halifax and Pontefract, the Provost and the Diocesan Secretary. This team, meeting regularly, usually every fortnight, along with many others too numerous to mention by name, (ordained and lay), has sought to serve and to build up, to encourage and to renew in the Christian faith and life, in worship and witness. Together we have sought to give a sense of direction and purpose to the Diocese. I am very

thankful for each and every one of you who have been fellow labourers with me in the service of the Lord who calls us all. It is with much thanksgiving for all that we have been able to share and accomplish together that I take my leave of you now.

The Centenary

One of the highlights of my time as Bishop was the celebration of the Centenary. I believe it brought us together in all sorts of ways, as no one else and nothing else could. There have been

a number of Diocesan events subsequently, in connection with the Centenary Fund, and most recently the launch of the Decade of Evangelism, when we have been able to build

further on this being together as brothers and sisters in the household of faith, which is what the Diocese most surely ought to be.

Together

I have attempted to get us going together, and working together, ordained and lay, as partners in the one mission of the Church, God's mission reaching out both in service and in celebration in the parishes and places where we are. Much, under God has been achieved, much remains to be done. It is my fervent prayer and hope that this sense of working and worshipping together for the Kingdom, will continue to inform all our praying, thinking, planning and

decision making into the future.

Look forward

And what of the future? One of my constant themes has been that our perspective as Christian people must always be forwards and future. This is what I would wish to leave with you now. Pray for those whose responsibility it is to discern and select my successor. Look forward to the arrival of your new Bishop, welcome him and support him as you have me. Finally may I commend some words of Scripture to you, from Colossians 3, v 17 "And whatever you do in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the father through Him."

Always special

Wakefield will always have a very special place in my heart. Pray for me in the task ahead, to which I believe God has called me. I shall certainly pray with much thanksgiving for all of you.


