## PASTORAL CARE

### WHAT IS PASTORAL CARE?

Pastoral care is caring by members of the Church for members of the Church. This includes active members and those who have only occasional contact with the Church. It should surely also include care for the wider parish, those with no church connections.



Our church, however, is only one of several churches in our parish, our parish one of many in the diocese and our diocese only one small part of God'd would-be kingdom on earth. We should draw no boundaries to our caring - it should grow like ripples in a pond.

### WOT? ANOTHER COMMITTEE?

The Pastoral Care Sub-Committee was formed at the first meeting of the PCC in March. Its function is:

- (a) to coordinate the many aspects of pastoral work currently taking place in the parish
- (b) to recognise areas where help is needed
- (c) to put ideas into practice.

The Stewardship Mission held in Autumn '88 revealed the depth of pastoral care already taking place and sought to build on it and expand the work. As a result new people offered their services in visiting the elderly, and a rota was drawn up of people willing to give lifts to church. Numbers were added to a baptism visiting group already in operation. A further group trained themselves to run marriage preparation classes, which are now in their second year of operation. All the groups mentioned are thriving and their work expanding.

### WHAT OF THE FUTURE?

The opportunities for further care are endless. Things that have already been mentioned are - welcoming new comers to church, learning about bereavement and visiting the bereaved, and increasing our support for the Church overseas. How many of us feel that support for the overseas church means 2p in the Mara bottle each week?

You will continue to be asked for items of clothing, furniture etc. as the the need arises. This is coordinated by a small ecumenical group working in the village.

Over the next few months you will be hearing more about the work of the individual groups mentioned. The members of the group are:-

## PCC NOTES 8 APRIL

- The treasurer reported on the church accounts. It was agreed to set up a finance subcommittee to monitor parish finances. The PCC decided that the 'social mix' of the parish was "average" for the purposes of the Parish share.
- 2 A discussion took place on the results of the Lent House Groups. Some recommendations are to be made to the Ackworth Fellowship of Churches with regard to church publicity and welcoming newcomers to Ackworth. Ideas about caring for those who look to the church for baptisms, weddings and funerals were put forward.
- 3 It was agreed to set up a working party to look into all aspects of parish publicity, including the parish magazine and communication both within the church and to outsiders.
- 4 The establishment of a Sunday School, or Junior Church, is to be discussed by a small subcommittee.
- 5 The Pastoral Committee is to discuss ways in which baptism visiting may be expanded.

### ST CUTHBERT'S CHURCH IN MAY

During May the chancel floor of St Cuthbert's Church is to be repaired. The work will take about four weeks. In this period all funerals will take place at All Saints' Church. Please note also that the 9 15 am Tuesday morning Eucharist will be held in the Mary Lowther Almhouses.

## **Bishop Richard writes:-**

"We are the Easter People (and Alleluia is our song)." This slogan has been around for a number of years, and featured in many an Easter sermon.

We also need to remember that we are the Good Friday People, and that dying with Christ is the prelude to being risen with Christ. Knowing yourself dead with Christ and raised with Christ takes many forms, and it is a mistake for us to try to

reproduce in each other precisely the same experience we had ourselves of God's transforming grace. But it has been true over the centuries for countless thousands of christians that to know the joy of sins forgiven has been the first taste of resurrection.

The same Gospel

We are the Good Friday People, we are the Easter People, and above all we are the Pentecost People. The Gospel itself does not change, even though the ways in which our minds reach out to grasp it are changing all the time. The Gospel is the same as that which was preached in New Testament times: it is a summons to repentance, and forgiveness, and – with the gift of the Holy Spirit – new life in Jesus.

The Pentecost experience is not some extra-special favour which the Lord reserves for his spiritual elite. The 'power from high' which was promised to the disciples, the release of the Holy Spirit which is an integral part of our

inheritance in Christ, this is for all those who will turn to the Lord in repentance and faith and ask for it.

It is essentially the power to be the Lord's

witness, to tell other people the good news of Jesus. It is not something the Lord gives us for our own benefit, to strengthen our faith or whatever.

Possibly we may sometimes have sought

power from on high for our own reassurance, or our own enjoyment, or for the astonishment or even perhaps sometimes – alas – the annoyance of our friends.


forgiven has been

Small wonder, then, if we are disappointed. But for those who want to be the Lord's witnesses, who are willing to acknowledge their weakness and unworthiness, who turn to the Lord and trust him for his promise: for them the experience of the Lord's presence and power is as available today as it was to those of whom we read in the Acts of the Apostles.

This is not theory. The Holy Spirit, as Tom Smail has reminded us, is not doctrine: the Holy Spirit is event. May this event happen in your life at Pentecost this year: renewing, cleansing, and empowering you to proclaim, with power that does not come from you, that Jesus Christ is Lord of all.

## Fan the Flame - Under new management

Actress Kathy Staff, familiar to many as the TV character Nora Batty has said in an interview, "for me, my Christian faith has always been the centre of my life." Her daughter, Susan Staff, is a deacon in a Derbyshire parish. She is full of hope for the Decade of Evangelism. "I am in favour of personal witness which is an ongoing thing. We have

been telling people not to be panicked by the thought of sustaining this effort for ten years."

Ongoing personal witness began at the first Pentecost when quite ordinary people, who were friends and followers of Jesus were moved on from resurrection joy to ongoing mission. The baptising with the Holy Spirit made Jesus present in their lives, equipped them and sent them out. They were witnesses in their being — their faith at the centre of their life. When it was right they were witnesses by their telling about who was at the centre of their lives.

This can still happen and does happen today. We can be equipped for mission, under new management of Jesus present in our lives.

# Young Peoples' Gathering - Easter Monday

On Easter Monday, about 160 young people (11–18ish) with about 35 "adults" gathered at Sandal Magna Aided Middle School. They were to spend the day together celebrating the Easter Story under the title Fools for Christ. It was April Fools' Day. They remembered that fools and clowns have the ability to make others laugh and cry. Also, they remembered that in the medieval court, the fool was the one who alone could tell the truth.

After the introduction and welcome by Bishop David, people engaged in a workshop of their choice, music, drama, art, and words for worship.

With the assistance of skillful and encouraging workshop leaders and helpers, everyone was involved. Lunch was taken on the move and various people went for a swim if they so desired.

In the afternoon, people began to move to the Cathedral and the results of the workshops were drawn together in an act of worship which was enthusiastic. It was designed and largely led by the young people themselves, under the presidency of Bishop David. I'm not sure, however, how a nine-year old 'joker' managed to process and sit with the clergy! Banners and an altar frontal enriched the Cathedral.

After worshipping together, there was a hot meal provided by the Diocesan M. U. This was much appreciated by all before everyone moved again to St Andrew's Church for an evening of music with Red Alert, the band based in a Baptist chapel in Sheffield.

9 pm came and the day ended, a first for such a diocesan gathering of young people, but not, I hope, the last. Adults went home tired, the young people resiliant as ever, less so.

A word of thanks should go to all who designed and organized the day, a group of young people (with a few wrinklies) — and the young folk themselves.

# The Calder Valley Deanery

The nine parishes of the Calder Valley Deanery stretch from the west of Halifax to the Lancashire border. The deanery has boundaries with the Bradford, Manchester and Blackburn dioceses – all of whose cathedrals are nearer to parts of the deanery than our own cathedral!

We are a small deanery, and see this as a strength; the parishes are growing together, and share an increasing number of deanery occasions each year. The joint Ascension Day service, and a joint Evensong in All Saints'-tide, are always highlights.

All nine of the parishes have hills and moorland, some, with spectacularly beautiful scenery.

People and Places

The Rev Andii Bowsher, Assistant Curate of All Saints' Darfield (Sheffield), is to be P-in-C of All Souls' Halifax.

The Rev Arthur Crow, Vicar of Flockton, is retiring.

The Rev Michael Gartland, Team Vicar in the Upper Holme Valley Team Ministry, is to be Chaplain to the Mental Health Services – Wakefield Health Authority.

Mr Arthur Stockhill, retired about 5 years ago after 30 years service as a Reader. At 81 he still assists, on a monthly basis, at the Communion at St George's Brockholes. Is he the oldest server in the diocese?

This is an attractive area in which to live, and many people who work anywhwere from Leeds to Manchester, and even further afield, choose to live in the Calder Valley. House prices in the countryside are high, and local young people cannot hope to buy property in the villages and hamlets.

Most parishes had strong connections with the woollen trade, although Todmorden was more of a Lancashire cotton town – now completely within West Yorkshire, in spite of the Oldham postcode! There are now a number of small industries throughout the valley, with few large employers.

In this situation it would be easy for the Church to be inward looking – nothing beyond our valley matters! Our parishes make sure that this does not happen. There are many individual parish initiatives to be aware of the world outside, and as a deanery we are developing a link with the parish of Airedale, which is certainly proving beneficial to us.

Although at the western edge of the diocese, we greatly value our belonging to Wakefield, and we have always known that our parishes matter to our Bishops.

As we look to the future, we hope to increase our sense of fellowship within the deanery; to be aware that as our parishes are very similar, there may be a breadth of vision which is lacking; and to do all in our power to increase our understanding of the kingdom of God—and of this very special part of it!

### THE PARISH WOMEN'S GROUP



# Life before death

Christian Aid's Director reflects on the theme of this year's big fundraising week (May 13-18).

I HAVE vivid memories of an evening in Brazil when I was not sure whether I was in a union meeting or a Bible study group.

I was visiting a community of rubber tappers. Some of you may have heard of their leader, Chico Mendes. He was shot dead three weeks after I met him, in December 1988.

Rubber tappers are forest people, milking latex from rubber trees and selling it to tyre manufacturers. If the trees disappear, and they are coming down at an alarming rate in Brazil, the result is not only environmental damage, but an end to their livelihood.

So the rubber tappers have formed unions to resist the developers and preserve the forest. They are not popular with the land owners. Many, like Chico, have been murdered.

These rubber tappers are Christians. When they meet, they meet in church. They argue about what to do next to bring about justice for their communities and a more peaceful way of life.

They find that they cannot keep their faith out of it even if they want to. When they meet, they don't just listen to each other; they read their Bibles and try to listen to the word of God.

Most of us find it all too easy to keep the union meeting and the Bible study group apart. Being involved in 'politics' - practical action to create a better world - is one thing. Reading the Bible and talking about religion is another.

Rarely do we sit down and talk about our faith and our politics at the same time. Often, when we do sit down, we try not to talk about either in case the conversation gets too heated.

This year's Christian Aid Week theme - 'Do you believe in life before death?' - brings our faith and our politics together. 'Life after death' is one way of talking about our Christian hope. What has it got to do with the poor of the earth now? Do we offer it to them as compensation for all that they go without during earthly life? Do we use it as an excuse for doing little except being sorry?

Or do we firmly believe that only as we struggle with Christ to fashion a life-giving rather than a death-dealing world on this side of the grave, can there be any hope at all of life in all its fullness once all the suffering and the dying is over?

The rubber tappers have their own way of witnessing to their belief in life before death and afterwards. If Chico dies, they said, a thousand Chicos will rise and take his place. It sounded to me like a stirring call to action, and strongly reminiscent of the heart of the Christian gospel.


