RECTOR'S NOTES

The mysteries of church life

The life of the church is something of a mystery to most people (including, sometimes, those of us who work for it full time!). When people attend church they are often terrified of doing something wrong and making a fool of themselves because they are not familiar with church traditions. This is especially true if they are not regular church attenders. At weddings and funerals I often see people pacing up and down outside the church, sometimes furiously puffing on a cigarette, obviously screwing up courage before they go into church. Those of us who are regular churchgoers sometimes forget how difficult it can be for strangers to enter that church door.

In order to clarify some of the mysteries surrounding church life, and to make life easier for those of you who only attend church infrequently, I intend to include one or two articles in future which will hopefully clear away some of the fog. For example, in this month's magazine we include an article on how to address the clergy. If you meet one of those strange creatures known as a clergyman, or a bishop, how do you address him (or her). If you write a letter to a cleric how do you start it? What do you put on the envelope? PASTORAL CARE

BAPTISM VISITING

In January, 1987, a small group of people met at the Rectory to discuss a visiting scheme aimed at young families bringing children for baptism. The idea was to use the baptism of the child as an opportunity to offer welcome and encouragement.

We agreed to visit the family on or about the 1st. 2nd and 3rd Anniversaryof the baptism and deliver an anniversary card, an invitation to the Mothers and Toddlers Service and a Christmas card.

At present we use Rainbow cards produced by the Mothers' Union. They are very colourful and have a line from the baptism service printed on them. They are very well

received.

Over the past few years our visiting team numbers have dwindled, for various reasons, and this motivated us to begin a recruitment drive this year. We now have eleven visitors and feel ready to progress.

Following discussions with the Church Council we have decided to introduce a new scheme, starting in September. The scheme is called One to Five and is referred to as a Pre-School Christian Nurture Scheme. It aims to help the Church in its ministry to those who have undertaken the responsibility of bringing children up within the Christian family. The aim is to create a partnership and to show continuing interest in the child. We will now visit the family before the baptism to offer our friendship and a link with church.

It was the high quality of the material used by the Church of Norway which inspired the Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Carlisle to produce the cards are the heart of the scheme. A pack of these cards will be left at the back of church for your perusal. You will see that they are very attractive and give suggestions to parents and children of the way that the baptism commitment can be fulfilled.

We must establish a picture of the church which is warm, friendly and interested and is essentially a company of people.

Regular contact between church and parents over the early years of the life of the child can build the sense of common commitment to the nurturing of the child which must be our aim. Joyce Waites

Archdeacon David writes - Christian Initiation

Throughout this century the Church of England has seen an ever increasing emphasis on the Eucharist as the central

service of the Church. That is to be welcomed; now we consider the issue of how new members join the "Fellowship of the Holy Spirit."

Central

Baptism is the other Sacrament, authorised by Christ Himself (St Matthew 28: v19)

It must, equally with the Eucharist, also have a central place in the life, witness and worship of the Church.

Principles

How this is done will vary according to circumstances — e.g. how many baptisms does the local Church have in a year? 150 every year will present very different problems to 15 per annum! But the following principles seem to me to be important:

That "indiscriminate" practise must be abhorred. Indiscriminate implies casualness, and applies when a Vicar and people have no nurture system, or expectation of nurture for those who come seeking the Grace of this sacrament.

What strategy has your Church — priest and people together — to implement this nurture?

That Baptism is clearly seen as the Sacrament of Evangelism. We should

expect growth, surround these services with prayer and careful preparation of ourselves as well as the parents etc.

Guests

They are "Guest" services when we are often privileged to welcome as guests the baby, parents, god-parents, friends and relatives.

god-parents, friends and relatives.

How do you plan the worship of such services to ensure that you are prepared by the Holy Spirit for this opportunity?

That we must beware of putting too many "hoops" for people to jump through. Jesus accepts us as we are (thank God!), but far too much to leave us – and them – that way!! We are the Body of Christ, and with His love in our lives we must overflow with His love, (and please, no resentment at their intrusion) to others in the same way.

I have found that in this work the laity are very effective communicators, but trained for this by the clergy. Shared and collaborative ministry in operation!

The Holy Spirit plays a major part in this Sacrament! Let us play our part by praying with Him for those involved and leave the "convincing, convicting and converting" (St John 16: v8ff) to Him, But remember, we need convincing, convicting and converting too!!

Diocesan Church Buildings Symposium 1991

If you are aware that your church building needs a re-think, a face-lift, a clear-out, or even a "For Sale" sign, but are not so sure how best to go about it, then come to Huddersfield on Saturday 21st September.

That's the date of a get-together of church architects and church users to swap ideas and information, to be held at St Thomas' Huddersfield, itself reopened last year after thorough shake-up of its internal arrangement.

The Symposium has been organised by Richard Giles, Parish Development Officer for the Diocese, who is also Parish Priest of St Thomas'. It is designed to help those parishes who have begun to think about reordering or redevelopment and who want to know more.

Architects specialising in church-work will be participating alongside parish representatives, and in addition to a display of recent church schemes, several with projects in the region, will be described in detail by their architects who

will be available to answer questions.

The Symposium begins at 10 am with registration and coffee, and ends at 4.30 pm. Bishop Richard will be in the chair, and to remind us of the spiritual dimension of all that we do with church buildings, David Martineau, Vicar of Gildersome (where a new parish church is now under construction) will set the scene theologically. The day will end with a short act of worship.

The Symposium fee is £10 per head, but this includes a good lunch with wine, and it is hoped that PCC's will sponsor members to attend. Monies left over after expenses will be given to the Bishop's Centenary Fund — to help get a few more schemes off the ground.

Sharing in Ministry

The vicar says "By the time I've explained it, it's quicker to do it myself!" The lay people say "He just won't let anybody help him!" The vicar says "How about us having a Shared Ministry Team?" The lay people say "That sort of thing is your job. It's our job to witness in the world." The vicar says "I asked Mrs Jones to visit a bereaved family and word got back to me that people thought it was disgraceful that I wasn't doing it myself." The lay people say "We want to help in the church's ministry, but our vicar doesn't seem too keen on the idea." And so it goes on!

In the Shared Ministry Programme we believe that the whole job of the church is everybody's. All of us have responsibility for evangelism and outreach, for teaching and nurture, for service and for pastoral care. Within this we accept that each parish will have its own pattern of who does what and that "who does what" will include lay witness at work and in the community.

The new-style Shared Ministry courses which start this Autumn will make this emphasis even clearer. Before the programme starts PCC's are being asked to consider carefully what they want their participants to do in the parish.

Those who wish to test their sense of calling should first discuss the matter thoroughly with their incumbent. He will then write to Felicity, giving as full a reference as possible and offering his own discernment with regard to the candidate's vocation.

Wakefield Cathedral

Bishop Richard often reminds people, "This is your Cathedral. This is your second Parish Church." That is exactly what we try to be – a place where all the people of the Diocese may feel at home whatever they come for.

Ordinations, confirmations, post-confirmation Eucharists, Enthronements, major Diocesan services such as the launch of the Decade of Evangelism, or festivals of praise such as Advent Praise and Pentecost Praise, are just some of the occasions that bring people from all over the Diocese to the Cathedral.

We try to ensure that people can leave a special service feeling both that they have been able to join in, and that they have had their own vision of the majesty of God and of His worship enlarged.

The daily round of worship is the chief function of the Cathedral. We pray in turn for each of the Parishes of the Diocese, asking incumbents to tell us how they would especially like us to pray for their parish. We also try to improve the quality of worship by the careful training of all who lead, choir, organ, servers and bell ringers; by commissioning new music and settings; and by using all the riches of liturgical provision available to us in both the *Prayer Book* and the *Alternative Service Book*.

But as well as being a Cathedral, we are also a Parish Church ourselves. We have to struggle to pay our quota, to deal with the problems thrown up by the Architect's quinquennial report, to care for our parishioners and find time for their weddings, funerals and baptisms in the full life of the Cathedral.

In an average week there will be at least fifty different events in the diary, from choir practices and services, to visits, lectures and concerts. Each one has to be prepared for, cared for and prayed for by the small professional staff and large number of willing volunteers who all see their vocation as serving the wider church through the Cathedral.

Birstall Deanery

Birstall Deanery is a geographical anomaly encompassing Cleckheckmondsedge (in Kirklees) and Morley with its satellites (in Leeds). It is what our own Diocesan Working Party called a *dispersed Deanery* i.e. one in which the parishes look towards several different and sometimes rival centres.

Times have changed. The little townships no longer echo to the sounds of clacking looms, factory hooters and booming with heavy industry; and the little villages have grown into extended commuter enclaves. Most of the rivalry is now directed towards "them" in Huddersfield, Leeds or even Wakefield.

Nevertheless there is still a lot to be done in terms of breaking down the walls of partition. The parochial system may still be one of the glories (fading?) of the Church of England, but fewer incumbents now wish to work in splendid isolation, and even fewer parishes have adequate resources internally to meet the challenges of a decade of evangelism — not to say the day—to—day business of caring for people, maintaining buildings and providing good liturgy.

"Collaborative ministry" (see the front page) is thus the name of the game. A

dispersed deanery like ours, has therefore, to take steps to identify the skills and resources which can be called upon from within its own parishes. There are signs that this message is beginning to be heard. Recent discussion within the deanery of the report Receiving and Giving has helped us to see how we might assist one another in the matter of pastoral care, stewardship and financial management.

A previous exercise identified the particular interests and skills of deanery synod members. Courses for adult Christian education and training are being held in the deanery and are being staffed elsewhere by people from the deanery.

We may not make much geographical sense; but we need each other pastorally and evangelistically.

How to address the clergy

Those who write to or about clergy are often unaware of correct styles of address. This is a summary of the main needs you might face.

The notes below show customary current usage

(a) on an envelope

(b) in starting a letter or in speech

(c) when referring to one of

the clergy.

It is acceptable to use a Christian name in place of initials. Abbreviations for "Reverend" are "Rev" and "Revd". "Right Reverend" can be abbreviated to "Rt Rev" or Rt Revd", "Venerable" to "Ven". Some clergy prefer to be addressed "Father", which may be abbreviated to "Fr".

1 Ordinary Clergy (male)

(a) The Reverend A. B. Smith or The Reverend Alan Smith (b) Mr Smith (Father Smith, if a priest prefers this) (c) The Reverend A. B. Smith, Mr Smith (Father Smith), Alan Smith.

Note:

'Reverend Smith' and 'The Reverend Smith' are NEVER used. If initials or a Christian name are not known, the correct forms are (a) The Reverend - Smith, (b) Mr Smith (c) the Reverend Mr Smith, Mr Smith.

2 Women Deacons

(a) The Reverend A. B. Smith or The Reverend Alice Smith (b) Mrs Smith, Miss Smith, Ms Smith (c) the Reverend A. B.

Smith, Mrs (Miss, Ms) Smith, Alice Smith

Note:

As for note on 1 above

3 Canons (both Residentiary and Honorary)

(a) The Reverend Canon A. B. Smith

(b) Canon Smith (c) Canon Smith.

4 Archdeacons

(a) The Venerable the Archdeacon of X, occasionally The Venerable A. B. Smith, Archdeacon of X (b) Archdeacon (c) the Archdeacon of X; the

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, being Privy Councillors, have 'Right Honourable' included in their style.

Is there a Christian way to move house? I don't just mean remembering not to swear when removal men are within earshot.

PRAYER for the choices involved - job change, home change, expenses. And prayer when faced by the lack of such choices; perhaps accepting that staying put may be a call. Thankfulness in the hectic times that other people are praying and holding you in their prayers.

RESOLUTIONS at the start of this new chapter - to recycle more, to be more hospitable, to conserve energy, to reuse as much as possible (even familiar old curtains).

STOCKTAKING - feeling grateful, and concerned at the hoarded possessions. The week when removal firms' estimates were coming in there was a newspaper photo of a refugee - one man in the desert with all his belongings on his back. Do I really want to bequeath to somebody the task of dealing with this lot? As Donald Nicholl reminds us in his book 'Holiness' - they are not mine, just on temporary loan'.

SETTLING IN involves looking for lost lampshades and the answers to unsettling questions.
