RECTOR'S NOTES

The Promised King

Daughter of Zion, rejoice with all your heart; shout in triumph, daughter of Jerusalem: See, your king is coming to you, his cause is won, his victory gained, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

(Zech 9.9; Matt 21.5)



Why did Jesus enter Jerusalem on a donkey? Perhaps, as Matthew suggests it was to fulfil the prophecy of Zechariah, that that is how the Messiah would arrive. I like to think also that Jesus had a sense of humour Surely he recognised the comical absurdity of his arrival in Jerusalem. Its a poignant moment in history as Jesus the Son of God, the great teacher and prophet, arrives at his destiny on a small, trotting donkey.

There was of course no better way of illustrating that Jesus' kingdom was not of this world. Here was not a man to drive out the Romans by some kind of armed revolution. How could such a man ride a donkey? Here was not a man seeking political power. His reign was not to be based on the exercise of worldly methods, but by a supreme act of self sacrifice undertaken in weakness. He allowed himself to be used by the powers of this world in order to save it. It was by his painful death on the cross, and by the glory of his resurrection, that Christ came into his true kingship. Christ's weakness in the face of worldly power, betrayed by all about him, was transformed into glory, and that is what we celebrate every Easter. Alleluia:

The General Election

Election fever is in the air. For the past few months the political parties have been flexing their muscles, and sniping at each other. By the time you read these notes the date of the General Election may well have been announced. The phoney war of the last few months will have become real.

Perhaps those seeking election in the coming General Election will remember Christ's entry into Jerusalem. Not that I can see John Major, Neil Kinnock, or Paddy Ashdown riding across Westminster Bridge on a donkey! After all modern politics is far too serious for such stunts. How could we vote for a leader with such an image? What I mean is that I hope those standing in the election will remember the humility of Christ. The exercise of power is a great responsibility. Too often those in power, especially government ministers, seem to use power in an arbitrary way, based on their own prejudices and ignoring the advice of others, or responding to powerful vested interests who subject them to intense lobbying. In the end those in positions of political power hold it in trust on behalf of the people. It is a trust which must not be abused in pursuit of their own ends, but is to be used on behalf of others. In so many ways during his life Christ set the example of the right use of power. Let's hope and pray that those to be elected will remember that. Let's hope and pray that those who vote will also remember that power should be given to those who will use it wisely, for the good of all in our country and not simply because which ever party will be elected will benefit ourselves.

Bishop Nigel writes

Although I am writing this some weeks before the Enthronement, my family and I have already been given a really warm Yorkshire welcome. With Celia, my wife, I now look forward to getting to know the clergy, the congregations, and the communities which make up this very special Diocese of Wakefield.

Care of families

One of my favourite texts is John 10:14 – I know my sheep and my sheep know me. In the task and privilege I have been given of leading this diocese and being its chief pastor, I will do my best never to forget the importance of those words.

The pastoral care of the clergy, and where appropriate their families, is one of the highest priorities a bishop has. It is my practice to see any of the clergy in urgent pastoral need within 24 hours. It is of the utmost importance that clergy should feel they can turn to their Father in God in need.

Affirming and encouraging

Of course, getting to know people is not just to do with emergencies. I have already booked into my diary personal visits to all the clergy in their homes. I believe this to be a very important way of beginning my ministry of knowing, affirming and encouraging the clergy in what, for some, is a lonely and sometimes discouraging task.

Lay ministry

I mention this here because, by giving

these visits such high priority, some other things which I would like to do may have to wait for a while. I ask for your understanding and patience over that please. As the Church moves towards the next century, the laity will have to become more and more our front-line missionaries. So you will find me to be a bishop who very much wants to strengthen the ministry of every lay member.

Visiting every parish

I look forward to meeting the members of our churches and sharing in worship with every congregation. All this will take time – but a systematic plan of pastoral visits is being worked out, which will ensure that I visit every parish as soon as is humanly possible. It is important for us all to remember that a bishop is not only the shepherd of his clergy and congregations, but also of the whole community.

What a task!

In that sense he has his own particular missionary role – getting to know and be trusted by those outside the Church; being a bridge-builder and, in sensitive ways, showing God's love for all His people. Well, what a task! I can not do it alone, but only with God's strength and your prayers. Certainly my own prayer is that I may be found worthy: as a Deacon to serve as a Priest to reconcile as a Bishop to lead and find fresh pastures for the flock of Christ.

Halifax Deanery

When I arrived at Halifax nine years ago the town was suffering from a loss of confidence due to the recession of the early 80's. Unemployment was high and there had been a collapse of our local industrial base. Due to the co-operation between Council, Local Businesses and the Churches there has been a considerable improvement in morale and all sorts of interesting things are taking place.

Faith in the City

During that time the Diocese has celebrated its Centenary and there has been great emphasis on Church and Community working far more closely together. In a recent report on the work of the Bishop's Centenary Fund grants have been made to St Hilda's (facilities enabling the Church to meet the growth and serve community needs, £1,000).

The Church Urban Fund has also made grants to support St Augustine's -Pre-school and Family Centre, (£10,000), the Charity Shop/Flat Development (£5,000) and for a Family Centre Worker (£9,000). Illingworth has received £25,000 to help refurbish the building. At Mixenden a grant has been given to help the parish to respond to local need in an area of much deprivation. The parish has also taken the lead in establishing a Local Credit Union at the Parents' Centre (£13,000). At Ovenden the old vicarage has become a thriving Parish Centre with a £15,000 grant. It is encouraging to see how the Council has helped in these areas of social need through the Fair Shares initiative.

Come and Celebrate

The parishes in the Deanery are in good heart, song groups now exist at Warley, Sowerby, All Saints' and St George's; they are adding new dimensions to our worship.

"God Cares" - and after

Who will ever forget that memorable occasion at which the God Cares Mission was launched in Halifax at The Parish Church which overflowed with representatives from Calderdale Churches. Over the next ten days the Parish Church acted as a centre for the Oxford Pastorate Team which carried the Good News throughout Calderdale supported by song, dance and drama. Existing Church growth is taking place in congregational life in a number of parishes and it is reported that the Vicar of St George's will publish a book on New Model of Churches.

The Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod continues to exercise a supportive and pastoral role. At present we are endeavouring to produce a fair system for establishing social mix gradually within the parishes. A recent debate concerned Holy Trinity Senior School, our Church Aided Comprehensive School with shared Sixth Form with the Catholic High. We have also heard about Ecumenical Collaboration at National, District and Local levels.

All in all, the Deanery is in good heart and responding well to the challenges of the 1990's.
