RECTOR'S NOTES

THE MAINTENANCE OF ALL SAINTS' CHURCHYARD

For the last four years the grass at All Saints Churchyard has been cut by two groups. The front, side and a narrow strip at the back of the church has been cut by Ackworth Parish Council, at no charge to the church. For this service, which the Council has carried out for many years, the church has been most grateful. The rest of the churchyard, which includes all the graves, has been cut by SBG Training and Developments Ltd, a training group based in Barnsley. The church has had to pay for this service. Over the years the cost of cutting the grass has gradually increased and this year the church will have to find £425 to maintain the churchyard. We have been informed by SBG that next year the likely cost of cutting the grass will increase to well over £500. The church simply cannot afford to go on paying out this amount of money.

Quite a number of graves at All Saints' are still maintained by families, but most for various reasons are not. Appeals have been made in the past for families to contribute to the cost of maintaining the churchyard. With one or two exceptions very little money has been given, and certainly not enough to cover the costs. In my opinion it is impossible for churchgoers to carry on paying for the maintenance of the churchyard, and unfair to expect them to pay for the maintenance of other people's graves.

St Cuthbert's Churchyard is cut by Wakefield Metropolitan District Council. Some years ago the churchyard was officially closed. Once a churchyard is officially closed the church council may ask the local authority to take over responsibility for its maintenance. This was done at St Cuthbert's, and it is now recognised as one of the best kept graveyards in the area. All Saints' is also a closed churchyard, but Wakefield have not yet been asked to maintain it. However, at the July meeting of the Parochial Church Council it was unanimously agreed to ask Wakefield to take over maintenance of All Saints' Churchyard, starting next year. The church will maintain the churchyard until the end of the present cutting season. This decision means that the whole churchyard will be regularly cut at no cost to the parish.

JUNIOR CHURCH

Our Junior Church, held weekly at 10 15 in St Cuthbert's Church vestry, has got off to a flying start. Paul Fox writes about progress so far elsewhere in this edition. MONUMENT APPEAL FUND

I am delighted to announce that a further grant of £1000 has been made to our Monument Appeal Fund, this time by the Henry Moore Sculpture Trust. I would like to thank those who have so far contributed to our appeal. Grant making bodies are more likely to respond if they know local efforts are also being made to raise money. VIEW FROM THE PEW

I am a new member of the sides-persons rota. It seems at times a very onerous job, not least when there is a baptism. Last month I was sides-person at not one, but three baptisms on one Sunday. I learnt very quickly to shuffle books and news sheets at an alarming rate. But it was the collection that took my by surprise. Because of the large number of people there, the collection plate under my charge became very heavy, very quickly. I wish it was always so.

Should we be interested in the size of the congregation? Should we be in the business of bums on seats? In some ways I think we should, as we are expected as Christians to proclaim the Good News and help the Church grow.

Sometimes I see the Church as a tree. The trunk is the clergy, the branches the elders of the Church, the branchlets and twigs are the regular attenders Church (and probably make up the majority). All gaining nourishment from the roots, our faith, from the soil, Jesus Himself. The leaves come and go with the seasons, just as many people come to church at Christmas and Easter, but rarely in between. There are many animals which take refuge in a tree at times of crisis, birds even nest in trees. People also come to church at times of crisis or crossroad in life, baptisms, marriages and funerals. Some even stay for a while before drifting away again when the crisis has bassed. How does a tree grow? Certainly not from the trunk, or its branches, but from the very end of the twigs. It is the responsibility of every member of the Church to spread the Good News.

Perhaps we as a Church should aim to be evergreen. Just as the tree boasts of its creation and reflects the beauty of its creator, then so should the Church. However, we have an advantage over the tree, the Church has a voice. And we should not be afraid to use it:
