

WEAKNESS

Christmas is a celebration, a celebration of weakness over strength, and a celebration of folly, the foolhardiness of God. At Christmas we recall God's audacity in which he showed that his weakness is greater than all our strength and that his folly is wiser than our wisdom.

At Christmas we remember that unique moment in time when God entered our world in human form. In the birth of Jesus we see God coming to us in weakness. God is our creator, he has created the entire universe, but despite this, he comes to us in weakness and humility.

Through Jesus, God made himself vulnerable to pain and suffering, and yet in the infant Jesus we see the strength that lies in weakness. In weakness we see the fullness of God's all-embracing love. In weakness we see the confidence God has in the future of all members of his creation.

For in his birth, Jesus accepts the mantle of pain and suffering that we inflict on each other. We spend much of our time squabbling like children and the result is that we harm ourselves and our world. It is therefore apt that a child should bring us hope of a better future. In Jesus we see the hope that comes from love. Once we have accepted that God loves us, then we can learn to love one another.

That God should choose to be born into the world and share in our joys and sufferings is also an act of immense folly. As ruler of the universe God can command our obedience.

Yet that is not his plan. God gave us free will, and by taking human form God shows us his love and calls us to respond freely to it. The folly of Christmas exceeds all our collective wisdom and offers us joy that we do not deserve but for the grace of God and his Son, Jesus Christ.

"You can't do that:"

"Because everyone will object:"

That is a phrase I have heard many times, not necessarily to do with churchy things. No-one, even me, likes to change. The reasons are that it produces a sense of insecurity and a sense of fear. The fear of the unknown. The next time you are in church, look around, and see what has

changed in the last 2-5 years.

Shortly we will be celebrating our Lord's arrival on earth. What an event: Someone once recently said to me "I would like to go back to 1100, to see their type of worship." I replied "I would like to go back further. Into Israel".

I would love to have been around at the time of Jesus. Can you imagine what it would have been like to actually see Jesus, and through Him our Heavenly Father? The Gospels can only give us a brief glimpse and a distant view of what it was like. "What an exciting time it must have been" must be the understatement of time:

If you feel threatened by change today, think of how the Jews felt in response to Jesus. The Jewish church had waited for Him for thousands of years. But when He didn't fit into 'their' image of the "Messiah", then He was rejected. Jesus wreaked havoc with changes of ideas and attitudes which He taught us to adopt.

If Jesus walked into our church would He recommend changes? Perhaps He would suggest to us such radical change that we would would be unable to accept it. However, whatever the change, we should, as obedient Christians accept it, if it is the will of God.

So the next time any of us see a change on the horizon, pray to God about it. If we can see God at the heart of it, if the change will give greater glory to God then we should embrace that change with all our heart and with all our mind and with all our soul. This was how the disciples embraced Jesus. Eventually!!



Bishop Nigel writes:

A lot of fear and not much hope. That sums up how many people feel this Christmas as they face a new year without a job.

Here in our diocese the morale of our mining communities has been given a devastating blow. We already know to our cost that when a colliery closes a community dies.

That is why the Church should keep up the protest against the pit closures. The closure policy seems to put love of money and profit above concern for people.

That is wrong. People do matter. And it is the moral duty of the Church to speak out and say so. This we have done. Rarely in recent times has the conscience of the nation been so spontaneously stirred as it has been over the way the miners have been treated.

This Christmas many families face a bleak time. I know our parish priests and church members will continue to do their best to help those who are full of fear about the future - by supporting them with good deeds and strong words - and by giving them fresh hope.

Within the Church too it has been a time of hopes and fears. No-one has been a victor in the voting over the ordination of women to the priesthood. There are wounds on all sides.

At times of difficulty in my ministry I have found strength in these words:

We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend; and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed.

Earlier in that chapter (2 Corinthians 4) we are reminded:

For it is not ourselves that we

preach; we preach Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake.

It's important to remember the trust - whether we speak on behalf of the miners or consider the future of the Church of England in the light of the synod debate.

The Christmas hymn O Little town of Bethlehem puts all plans

and worries exactly where they belong - with Jesus:

The hopes and fears of all the years are met in THEE tonight.

May that message calm your fears and bring you fresh hope this Christmas.

The Decade of Evangelism

We believe that evangelism is not just a "one off" high profile occasion, but is a twenty-four hour attitude, so that through our lives, our actions, our words and prayer, both as individuals and as the corporate body, others will come to know and experience God's love and salvation.

This is an evangelism statement from a Barnsley Parish, following the use of the Send Us Out course by several groups.

It is very different from the images held by many Christians in the past. The image of door knocking and loveless aggression which Bob Newton of Christ Church Mold Green says he and many others have had. "Now", says Bob, "through use of the course and our

Vicar's teaching, members of the house group are gaining an understanding of "Christians getting our act together in our own lives and finding ways of reaching people which are sensible". Group members are getting a lot from the course.

Christ Church Mold Green is just one of several parishes using the course this autumn. Has your parish used the course yet? If not, ask about it.

Finding Faith Today

Experience in parishes in the Wakefield Diocese supports the findings of Canon John Finney's research published in "Finding Faith Today - How does it Happen?"

Most people became Christians gradually and the process can take up to four years. For most new Christians their spouse or partner, a relative, Christian friends, a minister or children are likely to be factors in their growing to faith. Some church services, particularly baptism and the Eucharist - were turning points. Certainly observing that someone else's life is being positively directed by their living faith has attracted questions and prompted a search.

So evangelism can mean Christ's

people being Christian in the workplace, shop and home and churches being more outward looking and wholesome.

The Society of the Holy Cross - SSC

The Society of the Holy Cross (Societas Sanctae Crucis) is the oldest society of priests in the Anglican Communion. It was founded in 1855 by Fr Charles Lowder and five other priests who felt called to serve God in parish and mission work within the context of Catholic priestly discipline, devotion and brotherhood.

SSC has around 1,000 priests throughout the Anglican Communion. Most of the brethren are grouped into Chapters which meet regularly for prayer, study and discussion.

The objects of the Society are to strengthen and consolidate the spiritual life of its members according to Catholic belief and practice; to maintain and extend the Catholic Faith and discipline, and to defend truth against error; to unite its members in a spiritual bond of mutual charity arising from their common faith.

The Mass is at the centre of the life

of the brethren, and a disciplined spiritual life is regarded as vital to each priest's response in the call to personal holiness. So the Rule of Life envisages a daily Mass, the ordered recitation of the Divine Office, daily prayer and study, an annual retreat and regular use of the Sacrament of Penance. The brethren seek to live out the discipline of the Crucified Saviour in every aspect of life, and, through their teaching and pastoral care, to help others to do the same.

A priest who is interested in joining the Society should first seek permission to attend Chapter meetings. Then, if he wishes to proceed to membership, he must be proposed by two members of the Society who know him well. If his nomination is approved he would then proceed to election at a Synod of the Society.

The Revd John Ashman, Parish Priest of Saint Peter's, Doncaster Road, Barnsley, has been appointed a Guardian of the Shrine at Walsingham, and the representative there for the whole of Yorkshire. His induction will be in May of next year.

PCC NOTES 2 NOVEMBER


- 1 The Treasurer gave her report on the parish finances. A substantial gift has been given towards new vestry furniture.
