RECTOR'S NOTES

Keeping Sunday Special

There has been much debate in recent weeks over Sunday trading. Should the opening hours of shops be controlled on Sunday or not? Almost everyone involved in this debate agrees that the law on Sunday trading needs to be changed. Shops can sell newspapers, magazines and cigarettes on Sundays but not Bibles or birthday cards. It is an odd situation.

It is one thing to tidy up the law. It is quite another to allow all shops everywhere to open all the time. There are many non religious arguments against Sunday trading - eg the effect such trading would have on those who live near shopping centres (can they not have at least one peaceful day a week?); the effect on family life of those who work in shops, since many shop workers are women; the effect on small shop keepers who may find themselves working all the time in order to stay in business; the fact that keeping shops open longer will increase costs and may well increase prices, and lead to the loss of full time jobs.

My concern, however, is with the religious and spiritual side of the debate. The fact that we are having this debate is good. Perhaps it will focus our minds on what Sunday is really all about. For a Christian Sunday is above all the day of Resurrection. It is the day on which we worship the Risen Lord. The Christian tradition has always stressed that Sunday should be observed by worship in church in fellowship with other Christians, and that this should be a weekly commitment. For that reason alone Sunday is a special day to many people in this country.

Sunday is also traditionally a day of rest and re-creation, following the pattern of the story of creation in the Bible. There is an important principle at stake here, ie the idea of rest from work. The question facing us, as a society, is whether we want a day which is set aside, for most people, from the normal demands of life. A day in which we can give attention to the spiritual side of life in its broadest sense, ie worship (for those to whom it is important), the demands of the family and a time for recreation. Some people will always have to work on a Sunday, that cannot be avoided, but if we have unrestricted trading and commerce on a Sunday we shall lose an important 'marker' in our lives. Sunday will simply become another day in the week, and as a country we shall be all the poorer for it.

St Cuthbert's Church Monument Appeal Fund

The Church Council has undertaken to restore two important memorial plaques in St Cuthbert's Church. The first memorial is to the Reverend Thomas Bradley DD and his wife Francis. Dr Bradley was Rector of Ackworth at that time of the Civil War, and was at one time chaplain to Charles I. The second memorial is to Richard Mason, a gentleman who lived in Ackworth in the Eighteenth Century. Both plaques are in urgent need of repair, and the Bradley memorial is to be moved from its obscure position in the vestry to a new position in the south aisle. We are opening an Appeal Fund for the conservation and restoration of these two memorials. In the next magazine Dr Jeremy Belk will write in more detail about our Appeal. Archdeacon Ken writes: Expectations

On February 6th it will be just forty years since the young Queen Elizabeth stepped onto the tarmac of an English airport after an abbreviated African tour to assume the responsibility of sovereign on the death of her father.

For these forty years, Elizabeth has set an example of quiet but firm Christian discipleship, we thank God for such leadership in our sovereign.

Bishop's election

The 14th February also has significance for us in Wakefield Diocese. On that day Bishop Nigel McCulloch will have his election as Bishop of Wakefield confirmed in York Minster. confirmation of a Bishop's election is the point at which he becomes the Bishop of the Diocese. The subsequent Enthronement is the ceremonial acknowlegement and celebration.

Bishop Nigel will be central to the life of the Church in this diocese and will have to bear a massive burden of expectations as all bishops do, and will need to be selective.

A Regional Director?


To those outside the life of the Church a bishop may be thought of as a sort of regional managing director of a ecclesiastical organisation, and it is true he does need managerial skills. To the local community, he will be regarded along with other notables as a patron of its many activities, and he will be called upon to make speeches, preside at meetings, present prizes and give

support and encouragement to a multiplicity of good causes. And of course the Church itself will have its expectations of him, not only as a dispenser of those functions which belong to him alone, but also at a host of other occasions, committees and ceremonies where his presence and participation are not strictly essential.

Defender and expositor


But none of these expectations goes to the heart of what a bishop really is. Above all his relationship to his people is that of a pastor. He is a Father-in-God, and how much this is at the heart of his ministry and is allowed to be at the heart of his ministry will affect the whole of the life of the diocese. He also, along with his fellow bishops, is a defender and expositor of the faith. He will be a centre and focus of unity, relating the church of today to the church of yesterday and tomorrow, and expressing the link between the church in Wakefield and the church universal.

To follow God's calling Wakefield has been extremely fortunate to have had a succession of bishops who have tried to be truly bishops. We pray that Bishop Nigel will be given grace to discern and follow what God is calling him to be and that we for our part will not put misguided expectations upon him and his office.



FIGHTING CRIME BY HELPING OFFENDERS

NACRO 25 years on

IT nearly didn't happen. When the National Association of Discharged Prisoners' Aid Societies was dissolved in 1964 (the probation service had taken over its role), its assets were to be divided up between the various societies. But a few far-sighted individuals realised the need for NADPAS to continue in a new form and in 1966 NACRO was born.

25 years later, the National Association for the Care & Resettlement of Offenders has a unique place in the penal system. It now has 1,000 staff, helps 15,000 individuals each year and operates 150 resettlement schemes throughout England and Wales.

Its work covers accommodation, training for work, education, young offenders, mental health and crime prevention. It does not take a 'soft' approach to law-breakers but seeks to draw them back into society and offer reconciliation.

As a recent Home Office report put it, persistent law-breaking 'occurs as the result of an indidivual's bond to society being weak or broken'. So NACRO tries to link offenders into a network of social relationships.

'Much of the way in which offenders are dealt with at present does the opposite', says its Director, Vivien Stern. 'It puts them in institutions or groups where they may have little in common with others except a background of offending.'

There may be an artificial relationship with a social worker with whom they have nothing in common, but ties with families, neighbours and friends are often damaged by the stigma of having committed crime and may be broken completely by imprisonment.

THE HOUSING FACTOR

One-fifth of those on probation officers' caseloads have a serious housing problem; on release from prison many offenders have no home to return to. Two-thirds of homeless petty offenders are reconvicted compared with 26 per cent of those who have somewhere to live.

NACRO provides accommodation for over 800 homeless offenders (and others at risk). It also provides support for other similar work. Some projects include lodgings shemes in which an organiser finds landladies and landlords prepared to take in exoffenders.

Those without a job are much more likely to drift back to crime. NACRO currently runs 43 New Careers Training Centres, including some specially for 16-18 year olds. There is a special Youth Crime Section.
