BRINGING CHILDREN TO CHURCH

The second in a series of articles on making sense of church life. Cut out this article and keep for future reference.

Bringing children to church can be a nerve racking experience. I speak from bitter experience of when my own children were young: Here in Ackworth we want parents to feel welcome to bring their children to our services. The following article offers some ideas on how to do it without too many tears or frayed nerves:

Most parents worry about bringing children to church because they are afraid the child will make a noise or interrupt the service, so upsetting regular churchgoers. The main thing when taking children to church is to 'BE PREPARED'! In addition it helps to remember that the problems associated with babies are different to those with toddlers.



BABIES

The main problem with babies is crying, since a crying baby will stop us hearing the words of the service. Babies usually cry because they are hungry, tired, ill, or are 'uncomfy'. The answer is to make the child feel as secure and comfortable as possible.

- Do try to be 'cool, calm and collected' as you prepare to come to church. If you are feeling hassled chances are baby will too!
- Bring a bottle of milk/juice/water for the child to drink. Please feel free to breast feed your child if necessary. God isn't going to mind (after all He designed this method of feeding babies!), and given the right clothing it can be done discreetly (during the sermon?).
- The baby should feel secure. Make sure the person holding him or her knows how to comfort a baby. Mum or Dad is usually the best person.
- Don't play 'pass the parcel', ie pass the baby from person to person.
- DO NOT sit in the pew with a crying child. Take the child to the back of the church and walk it up and down. If this fails go outside for a few minutes while the child calms down.

TODDLERS

The main problem with toddlers is boredom. Church services are not designed for two year olds: The answer is to try to interest the child.

- Bring with you a favourite book(s) for the child to look at.
- Bring with you a favourite soft toy/doll (not a toy sub machine gun please!). Make it a game by saying you are taking Teddy to church this morning.
 - Have a few sweets in your pocket (bribery works wonders!!).

Archdeacon David writes: Happy (?) New (?) Year!

1991 dawned with the dogs of war snapping at our heels in the Gulf, and ends with the perennial problems in Ulster, Yugoslavia and elsewhere. The year that is just past will have brought with it some real joys and blessings, as well as hardships, agonies and losses.

Crumbling regimes

Just over two years ago the totalitarian regimes of Eastern Europe were crumbling. The pictures of the TV screen that will stay with me were those of East Germany. The people were massing on the streets of East Berlin,

and elsewhere; armed only with courage and determination for freedom and justice.

Ordinary people

These were, like you and me, ordinary people. They were in their 20's and 30's and knew that they were putting their lives at risk by going onto the streets. But before they went outside they met; where? They met in churches—and one in particular: a Church called Gethsemene!

Named after the place where nearly 2,000 years before another youngish man in his early 30's wrestled with doing the right and losing everything, or avoiding the issue and saving his skin.

Lasting celebrations?

All the public celebrations seem to indicate a need for celebrating the advent of this New Year. But what really lasts? Only Christ has the power to draw into the reality of a suffering world a true awareness and knowledge of love tinged with lasting joy.

Terry Waite exhibited this so clearly on his return – his suffering for almost five years, chained for 23 hours a day – we cannot start to comprehend the reality of that. Try it for yourself for one day,

even one hour; but 1,763 days, 40,549 hours . . . !!? Yet such a quiet and confident joy, love, compassion and a real sense of for giveness. Amazing grace!!

When the situation seems to be getting worse by the hour, the problem of good can hit us in the eye and overwhelm us. Terry Waite had obviously discovered the truth of the great verse, in Isaiah chapter 40, They that wait upon the Lord will renew their strength; they will mount up with wings as eagles, they will run and not be weary, they will walk and not faint.

We are now into our last year of fund raising and Ron Carbutt reports a steady stream of income. The following will give you some idea of the amazing variety of ways people have discovered to raise money for the Fund.

Yorkshire ingenuity!

A lady in one parish gives the Vicar 25p in an evelope every week. The young children of Sunny Hill House School, Wrenthorpe, Wakefield, sent £1,079 as a result of a Sponsored Swim. A Band Concert at St Thomas 'Huddersfield raised £175. A Coffee Day

at the Treacy Hall recently raised £417. A Jumper Party held at St Jude's Halifax brought in £158. In Golcar a family held a Bonfire Party which raised £78. Clayton West had a sponsored Organ Play during which resulted in £165. These are only some of the ingenious ideas which people from all over the Wakefield Diocese have come up with, there are many more and we are always delighted to hear of them.

The benefits so far

The BCF has awarded grants of £52,000 for 15 local parish projects and in addition, we have received £252,000 from the Church Urban Fund for 16 projects in our Diocesan Urban priority areas. The policy of the Trustees is to only use the income from the Fund and we will only be able to increase the numbers of grants we make when we achieve our Fund target.


As I look at the wintery wasteland of my garden, I know that when spring arrives it will burst into new life. Unfortunately, this will mostly be weeds! Weeding is a constant battle. As weeds are removed and thrown into the bin, then new weeds sprout up to replace them. If I give up I know that my garden will be overrun.

However, gardening isn't simply about weeding: it's about creating something of use and of beauty. If nothing worth growing is in my garden then all my weeding is in vain.

KEEP AT IT!

By now you will have realised that my discussion of gardening is meant to provide an analogy with our lives. Our New Year's resolutions are similar to weeding; we need to tackle our failings but like weeds they are bound to spring up again. In trying to correct our faults we shouldn't expect to achieve perfection, but we can expect to keep them reasonably under control.

But why do we become disheartened? Is it because, despite all the weeding we do in our lives, nothing worthwhile has been planted? What should we be doing with our lives?



If God is planted at the centre of our lives then our lives can become things of beauty and of benefit for other people. God's presence in us helps us in the task of ordering our lives.

In 'The Waste Land' T.S. Eliot writes:

'I sat upon the shore Fishing, with the arid plain behind me Shall I at least set my lands in order?'

It is a call made to all of us, but we are not alone in the task: God is with us and helps us. It is only as we take up the task that we start to transform the arid plain behind us. The more of us there are setting our lands in order then the sooner the arid plain will be changed into a garden.

MORE GO TO CHURCH THAN YOU'D THINK!

ON AN average Sunday, 10 per cent of England's adult population choose to be in church, rather than in bed, the garden or the DIY shop. And one in seven of those go to church twice on a Sunday. The English Church Census

reveals that 3.7 million adults in England are churchgoers. And 1.2 million children under 15 attend church services or Sunday School, around 14 per cent of the child population. This means over eight times as many people go to church each weck as go to Football League matches.

- If the child still proves difficult, take him/her for a walk to the back of the church. If all else fails go for a short walk outside.

Last but not least, a word to the rest of the congregation. Remember it takes a great deal of work, and not a little courage, to bring children to church. Make sure you welcome young families. Black looks, because a child happens to be making a bit of noise, can put off parents for life. Be sensitive, be welcoming, and lets have more children in our churches:

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr George Carey, has warned that England will lose 'something very special' if legislation comes in allowing unrestricted Sunday trading.

'We have to retain the specialness of Sundays. If we lose that, we will have destroyed something we will never be able to replace again. Once you actually bring in bills that negate the holiness of that day - a day of rest, a day when people can worship - then you will never, ever, get that back.'

Dr Carey, commenting after legal moves towards unregulated Sunday shopping, said: 'I recognise the need for the prosperity of our nation and I fully understand the need for people to have access to shops. We have to find ways of helping the nation. But I do believe Sunday is a special day.'
