RECTOR'S NOTES

THE COMMUNITY OF THE RESURRECTION, MIRFIELD

In 1992 the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, celebrates its centenary. The Community, little more than half an hour's drive away from Ackworth on the M62, is world famous. Yet I suspect that few in Ackworth have either heard of it, or know much about it.



THE COMMUNITY'S LIFE AND WORK

It was established a hundred years ago by two men, Charles Gore and Walter Frere. Originally based near Oxford, the Community soon moved to Mirfield near Huddersfield. The founders wanted to live out their Christian vocation in an industrial area of the north of England. The members of the Community are Anglicans, mainly priests though some are laymen. All are single, and they follow an ordered life of worship, prayer and work. However, the members are not confined to the House of the Resurrection. Some work in the adjoining Theological College, others make visits to parishes on missions. A few are based in London, and there is a small group in South Africa.

Perhaps the best known member of CR is Archbishop Trevor Huddlestone, who at one time worked in South Africa. He was eventually deported from that country because of his resistance to apartheid. He is now a leading member of the Anti Apartheid Movement, and was one of the first to publicly greet Nelson Mandela on his release.

THE COMMUNITY'S ROLE IN THE CHURCH

The Community of the Resurrection has played an important role in the life of the Anglican Church, sustaining it with prayer and action in this country and in many parts of the world. It's influence has come through the training of men for ordination at its theological college; through parish mission; through being a centre to which church members, both clerical and lay, can go on retreat (a time of silence and prayer), and for spiritual guidance by members of the Community. Many church people are associate members of the Community, supporting it financially and through prayer.

COMMEMORATION DAY

Each year the Community holds an open day called Commemoration Day. This year it will be held on Saturday 18 July. The day begins at 12 noon with a service of Holy Communion. The preacher at the Eucharist on this occasion will be Dr George Carey, the Archbishop of Canterbury. Details of the day are given on the inside back cover of this edition of the magazine. If you have not been to the Community Commemoration Day is a good opportunity to visit this interesting place.

THE PASTOR WHO GOT DEODLE MOVING

AS many of us set off on our summer holidays, it is interesting to recall the career of a Danish Lutheran pastor, Eilif Krogager, who died earlier this year.

Known as Denmark's 'flying vicar', Pastor Krogager opened up the world for Danes who had been starved of sun and foreign travel during the Nazi occupation in World War II. In 1950, he took 70 parishioners from the hamlet of Tjaereborg on a bus tour to Spain and then, with his bishop's approval, started the Tjaereborg travel agency. It was to become a £450 million business with offices abroad, including Britain.

Using the vicarage as its headquarters, the agency was soon operating a fleet of 80 buses and in 1962 Krogager moved into air charter. He bought two second hand DC6 aircraft from Swissair and set up his own Sterling Airways. Eventually, it was to be Western Europe's largest privately owned charter airline, with 40 planes.



Krogager fought vested interests to bring about cheaper air travel and in 1972 resigned from the priesthood to devote himself to the travel industry. He once said: 'I am only a mediocre priest; I have preached the same sermon for close on 40 years'. Later, he sold the travel agency and airline and he retired in 1988.

The 450 children on the 12th and over 300 on the 30th were there to welcome their new

And from Hereford

A Church in the Diocese of Hereford has devised a Daily Office for evangelism. It comprises a set liturgy plus different readings, collects, prayers and responses for each day of the week except Sundays. Another Heritage Trek for The Bishop's Centenary Fund

For the second year running there is to be an August Bank Holiday trek through the Hebden Valleys promoting the **Bishop's Centenary Fund**. On Saturday, 29th August, 500 sponsored walkers are wanted to raise money to help the Fund to reach its target of £1 million by the end of the year.

The walk is suitable for walkers of all ages and abilities, with a 20 mile route for the hardened hikers, splitinto four manageable shorter walks for the less ambitious.

The trek is jointly managed by the central fund organizers in Wakefield and the parish on the spot – St James' at Hebden Bridge. Church members there last year bore most of the organisation and are putting their effort into a repeat performance.

They hope not only to get more walkers

than last year's 300 but to better the £8,000 then raised.

Fund organizer, Ron Carbutt, said he hoped many parishes would manage to field a team for what last year proved to be a splendid day out. The Heritage Trek will be a lot of fun for groups of walkers and everyone will enjoy the beautiful countryside around Hebden Bridge.

One of the 'saints days' that comes to mind most readily in July is that of Saint Swithin (or Swithun): 'If it rains on Swithin's Day, it will rain for the next 40 days' (and, many add, if it is fine on that day it will remain so for 40 days).


St Swithin's Day in this context is 15 July, the day when, a century after his death, his remains were moved, or 'translated' from their earlier humble resting place to a shrine within Winchester Cathedral He has also had the feast day of 2 July (the day of his death in 862).

In fact very little is known about his life except that he was Bishop of Winchester from 852, and apparently a trusted adviser of Egbert, King of Wessex. The stories that grew up after his death remember Swithin for charitable giving, for an energetic church building programme, and for a number of associated miraculous events.

He can, however, remind us that we are all accounted 'saints' if we are committed to Christ and his work, and our standing before God does not depend on whether people remember the good we tried to do, or whether they remember us accurately at all.

The saying about 15 July may have arisen from the story of a downpour on the day his bones were moved. The day was popularly remembered by stories of miracles occurring then. Other suggestions are that one of the regular, natural weather 'patterns' has tended to coincide with this piece of meteorlogical lore. Or the story may be linked with a similar saying about another saint's day which was actually on 2 July. Summer holiday project: test out each date in the light of this year's weather:
