RECTOR'S NOTES

GENERAL SYNOD VOTE ON THE ORDINATION OF WOMEN TO THE PRIESTHOOD

In November the General Synod of the Church of England will take an important vote on whether or not to admit women to the priesthood. The vote comes after many years of debate over this question. If the Synod votes in favour, legislation to admit women to the priesthood will be put before Parliament.

Whichever way the vote goes many members of the church are going to be hurt and disappointed. Those in favour of the ordination of women, including those women who feel called to the priesthood, will see a 'no' vote as a major setback. Many of those who oppose the ordination of women will have to consider whether they can remain members of the church if Synod votes in favour.

Because the issue is likely to cause hurt, the Bishop of Wakefield has asked for a day of prayer and fasting in the Diocese on Friday 6 November. Each parish will make its own arrangements. Details of the day in Ackworth are given after these notes. As the Bishop pointed out in his letter last month it is important that 'whatever takes place should not be a partisan praying for or against the ordination of women.' It should be 'a time of waiting on God, seeking God's will for our future together.' To this end a specially written prayer is recommended for use - the Westminster Prayer. I hope you will use it during November:

THE WESTMINSTER PRAYER

Guide, O God, the Church of England through this time of decision concerning the ministry of women; grant that convictions strongly held may be voiced and heard with charity; give wisdom to the members of the General Synod; and when the decision is made surround with your love those of our brothers and sisters to whom it causes pain. Give to your whole Church the Spirit of truth and peace, that celebrating your gifts in each other we may serve you in humility and joy. We ask this for the sake of our great High Priest, your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

THE BRADLEY MEMORIAL

l am pleased to announce that Wakefield Metropolitan District Council has agreed to award the parish a grant of £500 towards the conservation of the Bradley Memorial, as the church is a listed building. In addition a donation of £50 has been made to the Fund by Dr Bradley's former college, Exeter College Oxford. The total in the Monument Appeal Fund now stands at £4,500. Since the WMDC grant must be spent in the current financial year the Church Council has agreed to complete the work, in the hope that the remaining £500 to complete our target will soon be forthcoming. Bishop Richard's Farewell: a Lay View

On Monday 21 September in Halifax Parish Church Wakefield Diocese said goodbye to Bishop Richard and Mrs Sall Hare.

I arrived three-quarters of an hour before the start and found one of the last seats in the church. The Worship Team was already in full flow as chorus after chorus filled the church. The whole church was alive, and the Spirit of God was amongst us.

The service involved many members of the community, with Holy Trinity C of E Senior School leading us in singing the confession and the Sowerby Dance Group adding another dimension to the worship. People were dancing in the aisles and all our voices were raised in praise and worship.

After hearing various messages of good wishes, Bishop Richard gave his testimony. He was bold in his approach and his love of the Lord was obvious. What spoke most clearly to me was that how little we ask of God when he wants to give us so much. Richard spoke about the occasion when at the end of an early charismatic meeting he was asked what he would like to receive from God, he replied "the lot".

I left Halifax with the chorus Celebrate ringing in my ears - Come on and Celebrate his Gift of Love... Come on and Celebrate, Celebrate, Celebrate and sing... to the King.

The evening was certainly a celebration. A celebration of the gift of Richard to the Diocese. A gift from the King.

Sall and I were overwhelmed by the generosity of the cheque we were given in Halifax parish church on St Matthew's Day. We did not need anything on that scale to make sure we did not forget the Diocese of Wakefield - we would not have done so anyway.

That evening will for ever be vivid in our memories and the cheque was a part of it. Thank you very much.

Halifax parish church itself was also immensely generous in making no deduction from the collection which, unprompted by me, was given entirely to the Calvert Trust Adventure Centre for Disabled People.

The collection amounted to £1750 and the Trustees are thrilled to bits. It is being used to cover the course-costs of a party of disabled young people from Zimbabwe who will be at the Centre in April/May 1993. There will be five of them coming, with their headmistress and their physiotherapist, from a school not far from Bulawayo. British Airways are being very good to us, and are providing free air travel for four of the party. I am not begging for further funding, but if by any chance any parish should have a special interest in Zimbabwe

Canon John Montague

Canon John Montague, who was Canon Missioner of the Diocese 1962-1974 and Vice Provost 1973-4, died at the end of August. After a brilliant Cambridge career, he was ordained in 1942 and served, in a number of parishes, becoming Vice Principal of Bishop's College, Cheshunt, immediately before coming to Wakefield.

His keen and agile mind coupled with a generous and gentle spirit, quickly gained the confidence of the clergy and laity of the Diocese in seeking the meaning of mission and leadership in a changing world. Scholarship and compassion mingled together. He was the official translator of German Theological works and a Proctor in Convocation for 10 years in both of which he excelled. His was a major contribution to the Diocese and to the whole Church. Many will remember with gratitude the generous and gracious spirit of a gifted and perceptive spirit that was John. To Mary and her family go the love and prayers of many in the Diocese.

In this, his first book, Bishop Nigel highlights the need for Christians to:

- pray for the renewing love and power of the Holy Spirit
- be equipped to live and share the Gospel
- explore God's activity in different situations and cultures
- change where necessary the Church's worship, ministry and structures

- confront injustice and respond to human need
- proclaim the good news by word and deed

For those wanting to know what the Decade of Evangelism is really about, A Gospel to Proclaim is essential reading. It is published by Darton, Longman and Todd at £4.95.

BISHOP ATTACKS AID CUTS

Bishop Nigel has joined the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of Oxford and other Church leaders in reacting strongly to reports that the Government is considering cuts in the overseas aid budget. The Bishop, who has visited central Africa several times, in admitting that he was "deeply disturbed by reports of the proposed cuts said "the contrast in food and water supplies and in general living standards between what we enjoy and what is available to so many people in other countries is appalling.

It will be a disgrace if a country as well off as ours reduces its aid programme. We should not be cutting it - we should be increasing it. However much the going seems tough here, what we go through is, as we know from our televisions, nothing compared with what others have to endure.

Both the Prime Minister and Lynda Chalker (Overseas Aid Minister) have made proud claims in Parliament and the press that our country is doing well with overseas aid and will do better, yet we fall far short of UN recommendations.

The United Nations official standard for proportion of Gross National Product to be devoted to overseas aid is 0.7%. The Government accepts this as a long-term aim, but our actual figure for 1991 was only 0.32%. This has declined from 0.51% in 1979 - so we start from an already weak position.

Individuals, churches and voluntary agencies have worked extremely hard to raise funds, and will feel very much let down if the Government goes ahead with its plans."

WHAT THE PEOPLE WANT

The Children's Society firmly believes that it is not enough just to do things for children and young people. We must speak out about injustice. Better still, let the people themselves speak out:

"I get £60 a week off the social. You need £100 to live on, with all the things you have to pay for - electricity, food, gas, clothes, nap-

Play areas are not looked after. The grass is never cut, there's broken glass and dog mess everywhere. "The system is degrading. They never know what you should have."

"We would like the choice over whether to work or not. Creches are expensive - the average cost of local child care is £1.50 an hour. If you have more than one child there is no point in considering work.

"If water is metered, we'll have to cut down on the washing. If people decide not to flush the toilet, it'll be a health hazard. It will be a problem for all of us on Income Support and low wages and Family Credit."

These views are quoted in What the People Want, a new report published by The Children's Society which gives the views of 80 parents in 12 of the Society's family and neighbourhood centres across England and Wales. One of the centres involved is from our own area, the Braithwaite project in Keighley.

The report highlights how a victous poverty trap affects the health, education and development of children. The situation is particularly difficult for single parents, who want to find a job to support themselves but are forced back onto social security. Low paid jobs at £2 - £3 an hour don't provide enough money for child-minding as well as basic living needs.

To mark the launch of the report, three parents from the Braithwaite Estate went to the House of Commons at the invitation of MPs Peter Bottomley and Joan Lestor. They had an opportunity to publicise the report and to voice their concerns to MPs at a reception.
