

#### WITH CHRISTMAS IN MIND



His manner suggests that he never did anything else all year but stand there, hop a little, his head slightly cocked, eager to watch me, wanting me to notice him. "Hello Robin how nice

to have you back again." Suddenly the Robin was there, my little friend, as sure a sign of winter as any frost and fog. Since last winter, however so much has happened, some events which have touched us all, others which brought personal grief or joy, some which could be acclaimed or sorrowed over together, others which were tied up tight in our hearts, hurting or delighting - experiences we couldn't share. Whatever these events may have been the onsweep of the seasons rushes us now towards Christmas and towards farewell with 1993. For those as lucky as I was, childhood memories of Christmas are forever. A time of stealthy rustling of paper in the dark as my sister and I felt with our toes for the stocking. The wonderful thing is that in spite of all it really is here - look at children's faces when candles are lit!

God Bless us, everyone. I hope that in this Christmas season we may all avoid the panic and retain the joy. I hope we shall find some way of keeping a little oasis of peace and calm within ourselves so that afterwards we can feel we really experienced the true meaning of Christmas — the birth of our Saviour — and not just lived through it.

#### PARISH PROFILE - EDWARD WYNN



Edward is a busy man - filling a number of roles not only within our own Ackworth Anglican Community - but also beyond. I was then, a little surprised when Edward told me that it was only after marrying Ruth in 1990 that he came to live in Ackworth.

Edward, in fact, hails originally from Wymondham in Norfolk, and it was during a stint at the Norfolk and Norwich General Hospital, training as nurses, that Edward and Ruth met. Now working in the Intensive Care Unit down the road at the PGI Eddie — perhaps with less spare time than before after the birth of Hannah just under a year ago — 'unwinds' in a variety of ways.

At the Harvest Festival, we heard Eddie in the 'music group' playing the tuba and then taking the solo voice in the Taize' musical prayer. Eddie is also keen on running and cycling. However, it is through his duties at St Cuthbert's that Eddie is best known to many of us. Perhaps his most public role is that of Sacristan — an invaluable aid to the Rector on a busy Sunday morning. Of course, along with a number of others from the St Cuthbert's congregation, Edward regularly administers the chalice at the Parish Communion.

He gives freely of his time in a number of other ways; not only serving on the PCC but also on the Deanery Synod. Recently he was appointed foundation governor at the Howard School. Eddie tells me he is not a committee person. Perhaps his fingers were crossed at the time!!

Interestingly, Eddie is also a 'Companion of the Society of St Francis' - a body of Anglican Franciscans. He supports them through prayer and retreats.

It is, of course, well-known that Edward is considering the possibility of ordination himself. Although that may be some time in the future, another church's gain would most certainly be St Cuthbert's loss!

### BISHOP NIGEL WRITES:

Christmas is a time for love and peace. So it is sad to discover that more breakdowns and more stress related illnesses occur at Christmas than at any other time of the year.

That is a much more serious and fundamental malaise in our society than the commercialism of Christmas which church leaders normally, and quite rightly, attack.

Christianity has a particularly important message to give to a country like ours — where people treat each other with less and less respect

and where selfishness reigns tragically supreme.

Recent studies on the Early Church have again emphasised that the crucial factor in its missionary outreach was the exemplary conduct of ordinary Christians. It was this, rather than the professional evangelists and monks, which made the impact on

the population which led to the enormous growth of the Christian church.

That is why the way Christians should behave is so frequently emphasised in the pages of the New Testament. Writing to the Ephesians (4:29-32) Saint Paul urges:

Do not use harmful words, but only

helpful words — the kind that build up and provide what is needed; so that what you say will do good to those who hear you. And do not make God's Holy Spirit sad .... Get rid of all bitterness, passion

and anger. No more shouting and insults, no more hateful feelings of any sort. Instead, be kind and tender hearted to one another and forgive, as God has forgiven you through Christ.

There is indeed a powerful, contemporary message there for us all — and not least for families and individuals facing stress and breakdown.

In this past year, in the Church of England, there have been many harmful words, bitterness, passion, anger, shouting, insults and hateful feelings. It is time to act on Paul's message.

For if the members of the

Christian Church are not loving and forgiving for one another, then what hope is there for the world?

# IT'S NOT ALL DOOM AND GLOOM

I am not often surprised by the letters that arrive in my postbag, but the other day I received the following note:

"You gave us a generous grant from the Family Life Trust last year so that we could upgrade our hall kitchen to start a lunch club for the elderly. I'm coming back to you again to ask if you could make another grant! The project has been so successful that the original equipment has worn out and we need to replace it!"

Truly a tale of a need being identified and met with a vengeance!

It made me sit down and work out how much cash has been put into projects in the parishes of our diocese since 1988. [The year both the Church Urban Fund and Bishop's Centenary Fund came into being].

I can only speak about the funds that I have a hand in administering. There are other "pockets" in the diocese that have helped parishes, but the ones I am talking about are those specifically aimed at projects that reach out into the community in service in one way or another.

The result of my adding up was as follows:

The Bishop's Development Fund [Was "Centenary"] has made awards totalling £125,759.

Add on the grants of £440,800 received from the Church Urban Fund and;

Grants made to parishes from the Central Church Fund of £62,000 and; Grants made to parishes for outreach work from the Family and Social Welfare Trust of £100,000 and we have a grand total of:

£728,559 of NEW money made available to parishes for their work in their local communities!

This is not a time for false optimism or denial of the very serious financial position facing the diocese, but I thought that it might be useful just to remind us all of the support that is available for parishes when they seek new ways of serving their people.

# COME IN FOR CHRISTMAS

your preparations for How are progressing? Christmas parishes will doubtless be organising food parcels for the elderly, and ensuring that those people known to be lonely or ill are being cared for over the holiday period. However, there are many people who may not fall into these relatively easily defined categories, who still need support at Christmas. These are people who find themselves without permanent accommodation. without proper homes at Christmas.

The Team Parish of Dewsbury are again embarking upon a major Christmas project, aimed at the homeless and lonely. Designated areas of the Minster will be open from Christmas Day to January 3rd, to those who are in need of shelter and/or company.

The main aim of the project when it began last year was to provide shelter for those on the streets at Christmas, but from last year has come the realisation that it is not only those without home who need support, but also those who may be old, lonely or confused.

The project this year hopes to provide a daytime centre for those people who need food and shelter during the day for whatever reason, and a place for those without shelter to stay at night.

will include entertainment, people ready to talk, listen and advise, together with supplies of clean warm clothing.

The parish is already mobilising a highly motivated group of volunteers, but needs support from the Diocese for various aspects of the work. If you are aware of volunteers who would be willing to help please contact the Team Parish Office (0924) 457057. Alternatively if you can give support either financially, or with supplies of food or men's clothing, again, please contact the Parish Office.

### From the Rural Dean and Chapter Clerk of the Barnsley Deanery:

As a result of the General Synod's decision last November to ordain women to the Priesthood, three of the Priests of the Barnsley Deanery have in the past three months made a conscientious decision to leave the Church of England and seek reception into the Roman Catholic Communion. We feel it would be both sad and inappropriate if their contribution to the life of their Parishes, the Deanery and the Diocese were unrecognised.

The three Priests are Peter Stonier and Philip Harrop of Athersley and Shaun Swales of Penistone.

Of the three, Peter Stonier has served in the Deanery the longest, first as Assistant Curate and then as Parish Priest of Athersley, a total of 11 years. During this time he has not only set up "Athersley Cares" which has become a role model for other Community Programmes in UPA's, but has had a wider influence in the Deanery and Diocese through his

involvement with Education. served on the Diocesan Council of Education, Barnsley Sacre, and played a major part in the organization and running of the Diocesan Youth Festival in Huddersfield. ministry as Chaplain to the Deanery School has been marked by the way in which he is able to inspire the children in Religious Education and Experience as well as by the way he cared for both children and staff.

Shaun Swales and Philip Harrop, although they have not been in the Deanery as long as Peter, are in the same way recognized as conscientious Priests with a real pastoral heart and missionary zeal.

The three of them are remembered with thanksgiving for the way in which they so readily have shared their particular gifts in Education, Music and Spirituality, especially with Priests and Parishes of the Barnsley Deanery.

Changes-of-Order are concerned with how many copies each parish receives and whether the copies are FLAT or FOLDED. The cost is currently £3.05 per 100 per month.

#### PCC NOTES

- 1 The treasurer gave a report on the church accounts. The costs for insuring our churches will be £1966, to be paid in November. The covenant secretary reported that tax rebates to the parish should amount to £3343.
- The stone cross on St Cuthbert's Church porch is shortly to be replaced.
- 3 The Hunger Lunch and retiring collection for Water Aid raised a total of £130.
- Consideration was given to the Parish Share which in 1994 will increase from £13,980 to £17,200. It is hoped to encourage more people to use the envelope scheme.
- It was agreed to appoint A & K Bridgett and Son to repair the roof of the north aisle of St Cuthbert's Church at a total cost of about £5,400.
- Plans are in hand to install a sound system at St Cuthbert's Church. It is hoped to finance the system by an appeal for funds.
- The Bishop's statement setting out his vision for the future life of the diocese was discussed. The Archdeacon of Pontefract is to visit the parish in February.

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* A CHRISTMAS RECIPE

#### LEBKUCHEN

One of the festive glazed cookies which owes its existence to the medieval honey cakes made in Central European cities and a tradition among German-American families at Christmas. Lebkuchen can be formed into any fancy shape you like, cut into strips, or even dropped by spoonfuls on a baking sheet. It is a sweet, spicy cookie not unlike a thin gingerbread, and it improves with storage from two to six weeks in an airtight tin.

5 oz light brown sugar

8 oz runny honey l oz butter or margarine 14 oz plain flour

½ tsp ground cinnamon

 $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp bicarbonate of soda  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp powdered cloves 4 oz cut mixed peel

2 tbsp water
½ tsp salt
½ tsp ground ginger 4 oz flaked almonds

For the glaze:

4 oz iding sugar

3 tbsp boiling water

Heat the honey, sugar, water and butter slowly until it comes to the boil, remove the pan from the heat and let it cool to lukewarm. Sift the flour with the bicarbonate, salt and spices. Stir into the honey mixture until completely blended. Add the peel and almonds.

If you have the time, store the dough wrapped in plastic film for two or three days. Otherwise roll it about ‡" thick, on a lightly floured board and cut with fancy cutter, or cut into 3 x 1" strips. Put them on oiled baking sheets.

Pre-heat oven to  $300^{\circ}\text{F}$  (150°C) Gas 2. Bake the cookies for about 10 to 15 minutes. They should be delicately browned and firm but not hard.

Slide them off on a rack while they are warm.

Mix the icing sugar and boiling water and brush it over the cookies. Store between sheets of greaseproof paper in an air tight container.
