RECTOR'S NOTES

COMMON PRAYER

Praying can be a lonely business. If we are honest most of us, clergy included, do not find prayer easy. There are many different ways of praying and of what to pray about. Our prayers may include giving thanks to God, saying we are sorry for the things we have done wrong, praising God, praying for others and for ourselves. We can meditate, by taking a Bible passage, reading it slowly and carefully and then try to see what the passage is saying to us. We can pray in silence, simply by sitting quietly and allowing the presence of God to be with us in the silence. We can use objects like a picture, a cross, or a candle to be the focus of our thoughts and feelings and so be led into contemplative prayer.

The most common way of praying is to use set forms of prayer in which we can include more personal prayers. Examples of such set forms of prayer are Morning and Evening Prayer in the Prayer Book, or the Alternative Service Book. These set forms of prayer are known as Offices. They provide a simple pattern or structure for our daily prayers. They include the use of psalms, Bible readings and other passages from scripture called canticles. You may already have a prayer book which includes similar short services for personal use.

I have recently been using an excellent new book called <u>Celebrating Common Prayer</u>. This is one of the best prayer books I have come across and I would like to recommend its use in the parish. It is based on the offices of the Society of Saint Francis and includes Morning and Evening Prayer, a short Midday Prayer, and Night Prayer for each day of the week. It is designed for use by groups of Christians as well as for individuals. There is a wide variety of material for each season of the church's year. The title 'Common Prayer' suggests that those using such a book are not just praying on their own, but are joining in the prayers of the worldwide church. It would be an excellent book for use by Bible study groups, or as the basis for a parish prayer group. With Lent starting in February why not give your prayers a new lease of life?

Celebrating Common Prayer is published by Mowbray at £12.99 and may be obtained from the SPCK Bookshop, Trinity Church, Boar Lane, Leeds, or may be ordered through any book shop (ISBN 0-264-67284-4).


WOMEN PRIESTS - THE FUTURE

AFTER the vote to ordain women to the Anglican priesthood taken in the Church of England's General Synod last November, a series of measures to be undertaken means that it will be at least a year, perhaps rather longer, before any women will be actually presiding at the Eucharist.

Women deacons would be allowed to offer themselves for ordination, but would need to be selected - 'priesting' is not 'automatic'. Meanwhile the Bishops have been listening to opinions from the dioceses to draw up guidelines for moving forward and in particular for assisting those clergy and lay people who disagree deeply with the measure.

A number of procedures are necessary because the Church of England is the Established Church. The Legislative Committee of General Synod reports to Parliament's Ecclesiastical Committee; if this Committee decides the measure is 'expedient', both Houses of Parliament will debate it during the Summer.

The measure will need to be passed in both Houses and receive the Royal Assim before the cinonican be 'promulgated' - and that will have to wait until General Synod meets in July or November 1994.



Archdeacon John writes ...

1992 was a bewildering year for me. I celebrated my 50th birthday, and left the parochial ministry after 26 years. On the wider scene, fighting broke out on European soil for the first time in 45 years.

Millions of people died of starvation in Somalia, while millions here (including me) were so fat we had to go on a diet. Meanwhile the Church of England went off in new directions.

Where is God to be found in all this bewilderment? It's not a new question — the person who wrote the Psalms asked the same question 2500 years ago: "They say daily unto me, Where is now thy God?" (Psalm 42)

There are two tested answers to this question. The first is

"The Bible". God is to be found in the Scriptures which contain His Word. Actually, many of us don't find Him there. I have always been disappointed to see how few people follow

the Sunday Readings in Church, or study them carefully. No wonder we don't find Him in His Word. The second answer is "The Eucharist" — that Mystery

where we meet with Jesus. We regular communicants ought to shine with the joy of His Presence so often. Yet we don't — and that can't be God's fault! Too often we come to the Eucharist unprepared or distracted. It's high time we put some effort into finding God in His Word and in His Sacrament. Then we might just begin to

reveal Him to others.

In the middle years of middle life, I've been discovering a third way of finding God. I've realised — at last — that He can be found in the life of every person — and I mean every person — not just those I like or agree with! God created us all in His own image. Our task is to find the God who lies within each of us. All of us are equal value to Him — all our thoughts, opinions, convictions and beliefs. It is as

we find that mysterious God revealing himself in each other that our divisions will be healed.

In Lent this year (and it begins on 24th February, Ash Wednesday) let's concentrate on finding God again — in His Word and in His Sacrament, and also in the wonder of every human person — especially those who are not our "cup of tea".

With my love and my prayers for everyone.

Brought together in Hope

Bishop Nigel working with the Barnsley-based Coalfield Communities Campaign invited schoolchildren and students from all the 31 communities facing the closure of their colliery to a Carol Service at Westminster Abbey on 17th December. The Abbey was packed to overflowing for the occasion and the congregation heard Sarah Greene from BBC TV's "Going Live" read the first lesson, whilst the country's top brass band, Grimethorpe Col-

liery Band, led the singing. The Bishop of London and Cardinal Basil Hume were moved by the symbols of hope brought to the altar from parts of the country well known to both of them. "Communities and villages really put themselves out to be in London at the invitation of our Bishop", commented The Revd Ian Gaskell, the Bishop of Wakefield's Chaplain to the Coalfields. "We came together to give support, encouragement, prayer and hope for each

other", added Mr Gaskell. Here in our Diocese the playgroup at Knottingley collected the money to pay for their bus whilst schools from Easington and Seaham in the North-East spent 14 hours travelling to and from the capital.

After the service Bishop Nigel led pupils and teachers into Downing Street to give special Christmas Cards to the Prime Minister. All in all it was a day that thousands of children and adults will never forget.

The Reverend John Cowperthwaite R I P

John Cowperthwaite died at the end of December. He served for 26 years as a priest in this Diocese, first as Vicar of Ryhill, then successively as Vicar of Royston and Felkirk.

He will be remembered for his sensitive reconstruction of Ryhill Parish Church following the disastrous fire of 1970. But much more than that, he was a caring and loving parish priest with a sense of humour and a

generosity for which many will be thankful.

John Cowperthwaite will also be remembered by many outside the Church — he was a keen member of the Royal Navy Association, the Sea Cadets, the British Legion and the Saint John Ambulance Brigade. His wife Rita died in 1984 when they were at Felkirk, so John spent his retirement years alone at Crigglestone. We send

our loving sympathy and prayers to his daughter Pat, son-in-law Gerald and granddaughter Georgina. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Decade Siblings

The Decade of Evangelism is very much the thing at the moment. From its conception at the Lambeth Conference in 1988 it has grown up to be a strapping lad, rushing around the playground of the Church, organising us into teams for the game of life. But did you know that he has an older sister? She is not so noisy. As befits a well brought up young lady, she works diligently at her lessons, and stands in the corner of the playground, making sure that her friends get picked for a team by her younger brother. Her name is the Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women.

Her parents - the World Council of Churches - first thought about her in 1985, when the Central Committee considered the results of the United Nations Decade of Women. They decided to consult mem-

Churches discover to whether the position of women in the Churches had improved over the previous ten years. The results were rather depressing. So the Central Committee decided to launch An Ecumenical Decade Churches in Solidarity with Women at Easter 1988. WCC gave their little girl rather alarming instructions as they sent her out into the world. She was to 'promote the participation of women in the life of Churches, encourage women to do theology and share their spirituality, develop the vision and activity of women in areas of peace, justice and care of creation'. Unperturbed, she works away at her task, while her younger brother blusters about. She is told that ladies should be quiet, demure and content themselves with doing flowers in church.

But she knows that the hand that rocks the cradle can sometimes rock the boat.

WILL JARRETT (1903-1993)

Edited extracts from a sermon preached at his funeral:

Will Jarrett was a remarkable man, a man of many interests and talents. Music was one of the great loves of his life. As a young man he was a talented musician. He played trombone in various bands, and broadcast on the wireless a number of times. He could, so he told me, have been a professional musician. He was deeply moved by music, and certainly had a good ear for it. And one part of his active social round was to attend concerts given by Ackworth Concert Society.

Since its inception in the mid 70s Will has been a committee member of Riding for the Disabled. He had a great love of horses, and was also a member of Ackworth Riding Club. He had a nack of getting money out of people, and so for RDA he sold Christmas cards, took the money for pony rides, and organised the queues at various events. He was also an active member of Ackworth Probus and went on as many of their days out and holidays as he could manage.

Will Jarrett made an outstanding contribution to the life of the church in Ackworth. He was churchwarden for many years and continued to be fully committed to the church until he died. If he wasn't in church he was either off on one of his famous holidays, or he was unwell. In recent years Will helped at all church funerals. He was by nature an emotional man, and often got uoset at funerals. I'm sure that this was partly because he was so easily moved, but it was also a continuing grieving for his wife, Eleanor, with whom he shared his interests in life, and whose death continued to affect him. My abiding memory of Will is of him coming down the aisle here at St Cuthbert's Church to receive Communion. As befitted his status as our honorary churchwarden he was always one of the last to receive Communion. He was enormously proud of his role as 'elder statesman' within the church, and justifiably so.

He had a wonderful sense of humour and of fun, and when something struck him as funny he rocked with a deep, almost breathless laugh. He was quite simply a lovely Christian man. Yet despite all his fine qualities I know that some found him difficult. That was because he was a bluff, honest, straightforward character, who said what he thought. He had a sharp tongue and could, if he wanted, be brutally direct with people, almost rude. It has to be said that when he was so, it was often with some justification. He hated petty mindedness and insincerity in others and was prepared to challenge them.

On a personal level I'd like to say that Will was a great support to me. He didn't always agree with me. But the great thing about him was he told you so. And that was the end of it.

Whilst Will's death is very sad it was perhaps the best thing for him. None of us can escape death. It's the one inevitability of life. He was an independent spirit who wouldn't have tolerated life in some old folks home, or hospital ward for geriatrics. His quality of life was remarkable for his age. It's difficult to believe that only a month ago he was a relatively spritely 89 year old, caring for himself and driving his own car around Ackworth. We've all lost a good friend. A man who radiated love, and who in turn received love and affection from others. He's now at rest and we pray that he will rest in peace with his Lord and Master, and that he will rise in glory.

Grease and line a swiss roll tin (28x18cm / 11x7 inches). Put the margarine, sugar and dates into a saucepan and heat gently until soft. Take the pan off the heat. Stir in the Rice Crispies and coconut, mix well. Turn the mixture into the tin and press down evenly. Melt the chocolate (in a bowl

over hot water or in a microwave). Spread the melted chocolate over the mixture and leave to set. When cold, turn out and cut into 24 slices.
