#### Stewardship

The last two meetings of the Church Council have included discussions on the meaning of Christian Stewardship. The idea of Stewardship is based on the belief that all we have, our personal gifts, our possessions and wealth are a gift to us from God. When we die we will have to give back these gifts to God. How we make use of those gifts during our lifetime is of great importance. Do we simply use them all for our own ends, or do we use a proportion of them in God's service, and to help our fellow men and women? How we use our gifts is a part of our spirituality. It is, if you like, an acted prayer.

A number of Jesus' parables were about this theme. Remember the parable of the talents? The man who buried his talent in the ground and made no use of it was condemned. Remember the story of the widow's mite? The rich sneered because the amount of money she gave to the temple was pitifully small. However, as Jesus points out, in proportion to her income she was in fact giving much more than they were.

Stewardship is about the right use of our gifts. This applies not only to individual Christians but also to the human race. Whether we use the gifts of creation wisely, or whether we destroy this earth and so destroy ourselves is a matter of vital importance. The Christian teaching that we should be stewards of our gifts, whether as individuals, or on a global scale has much to say to us.

Visiting Preacher, the Archdeacon of Pontefract, 20 June

On Sunday 20 June we shall be having a visit from the Venerable John Flack, the new Archdeacon of Pontefract. This will be the Archdeacon's first official visit to the parish. He will attend both morning services - the 8 30 am Eucharist at All Saints' Church, and the Parish Communion at 10 15 am at St Cuthbert's Church, at which he will preach.

John Flack was previously Team Rector of Brighouse, Rural Dean of the Brighouse Deanery, and chairman of the House of Clergy on the Diocesan Synod. He has served most of his ministry in this diocese and trained at the College of the Resurrection, Mirfield. I hope that many will take this opportunity to come and meet our Archdeacon, and to make him welcome in Ackworth.

#### Churches Together in Ackworth

The committee of Churches Together in Ackworth meet regularly to plan joint activities. We have representatives from the Anglican, Methodist, Roman Catholic churches, from the Community Church on Bell Lane, and from the Society of Friends at Ackworth School. One of our major jobs is to organise the envelope distribution in Christian Aid Week. Until recently the Christian Aid Secretary has been Andrew Lowe, a member of the Methodist Church. Andrew is moving from Ackworth because of his work, and we now need a new Secretary. If anyone is interested in helping in this way please let me know. On behalf of the Christian community I would like to thank Andrew for the excellent work he has done as Christian Aid Secretary.
