RECTOR'S NOTES, MAY 1993

Christian Aid Week, May 17 - 21

In past ten years the public has almost tripled the amount it donates to the Third World in real terms, while government spending has fallen, according to Christian Aid's Annual Report on government aid spending.

In 1991 government aid spending increased by 21 per cent or 14 per cent after adjusting for inflation, to £2 billion. But it remains at a lower level in real terms than in 1981. In 1991, despite the recession, the public increased its donations by 13 per cent after inflation. Grants from voluntary organisations are now equivalent to just over a tenth of government aid. Certainly in Ackworth the amount given during Christian Aid Week has increased considerably in the last two years. On behalf of Churches Together in Ackworth I would like to thank everyone who gives to Christian Aid, and hope this year's response will be as good.

The focus of Christian Aid Week 1993 is International Trade. It's a complex subject. Part of the problem is that whilst many Third World countries receive large amounts of aid, they still remain poor because of world trading conditions. For example, in 1985 Ethiopia received \$3 billion in aid from countries like ours, while Africa as a whole lost \$19 billion during the same period because of the fall in coffee and copper prices. Much subsidised food from Europe is sold on the world market at a cheap price, so making it difficult if not impossible for Third World farmers to sell their produce. For this reason most of the money raised in Christian Week is used to meet the immediate needs of the poor. A small percentage is used to campaign for fairer trade with the Third World. You can help directly in this matter by using the 'Traidcraft' shop on Bell Lane. Third World producers receive a much larger share of the profits from goods sold in the shop.

Wakefield & Five Towns Ecumenical Council

We are fortunate in Ackworth in that the churches have always worked closely together. Despite some differences in belief and emphasis Christians in Ackworth know that we should try to cooperate as much as possible.

In the wider area an important new development is taking place. The West Yorkshire Ecumenical Council covers so large an area that it is being split up into local groupings. Wakefield & Five Towns Ecumenical Council (W5TEC) is a new Enabling Group, covering the geographical area of Wakefield Metropolitan District. Its mission is promote church unity in the WMDC area. It will do this by offering advice, help and encouragement to local church groups such as Churches Together in Ackworth.

To launch its work a Forum is to be held at St Wilfrid's High School, North Featherstone, on Saturday 22 May. It is hoped the Forum will allow Christians from our area to get together, celebrate their faith in Christ and talk over what they need for Christian cooperation and commitment to happen locally. There will be presentations at the Forum by people involved in existing ecumenical projects which it is hoped will give ideas and stimulate discussion.

As each day passes a few more grains of the stonework are blown away and the erosion continues relentlessly - just walk round St Cuthbert's and you will see for yourselves.

The spiritual life of a community merits some consideration and that life is dependent, to a certain extent, on the buildings in which the residents of our village can come together and worship.

We should endeavour to ensure its continuity even though we ourselves will not be here to share its joys.



John Finney, Bishop-designate of Pontefract, writes

"Jesus Christ is King" is the heart of the Ascension. "Glorified" is the word usually used – not just "taken up in glory" but shown in his true light – the cloak of the incaration was in part removed and he was revealed as God in majesty. He was seen for who he was and is and will be.

Sheila and I have already received the warmest of welcomes from the Bishop and many members of the diocese

and we look forward greatly to working among you. We will remember that my consecraion on May 14th is shortly before

Ascension Day and seek to make Jesus our Lord and King. The service asks the new bishop to affirm his loyalty to the faith and "in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation".

It is to that that we dedicate ourselves. We know that we do not come to Wakefield at an easy time. I am not primarily thinking about the ordination of women. That is an issue which is difficult for some and joyous

for others and we must find in Christian charity the best way in which both points of view can be held within one communion – if

necessarily permanently.

There is a question which is greater still. We have come to the end of the time when the Christian faith was the automatic faith of English people. There is now a great mass of people who have no concept of the faith handed down to us by the saints and no experience of

four questions about what we say and do in the church and outside. the Christian church. We now live in a more bracing atmosphere for the world no longer owes a living to the Church of England or any other denomination.

Educational evangelism must be what we are about. We must teach the faith ... proclaim the faith ... live the faith so that Jesus may be seen as Lord. Can I suggest four questions which we can ask of what we say and do in the church and outside:

- Does it speak of Father, Son and Holy Spirit? I think we need to speak more of who God is and less of what he can do for us. There is a danger that our desire to make God relevant reduces him to a sticking plaster for hurts.
- Is love our aim? A real concern for people keeps us from evangelising so that our churches may grow, or our denomination prosper. We

must love them for themselves.

- Does it change things? The New Testament is full of people and situations being changed. True evangelism makes a difference.
- 4. Is it bold? The Epistle to the Hebrews says boldness is being so aware of the goodness of God to us so that we can approach him with confidence and offer what we know of him to the world.

Very sensitively, very humbly, conscious of the burden and joy of it, we offer the ascended Christ to the world.

Assistant Bishop for the Diocese

The Rt Revd Anselm Genders, of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, has been appointed an honorary assistant bishop in the Wakefield Diocese. Bishop Anselm, a former Bishop of Bermuda, is firmly opposed to the ordination of women as priests, but remains a committed member of the Church of England.

Announcing this appointment to the Diocesan Synod in March, Bishop Nigel said that the move meant that the diocese would have a greater flexibility when it came to the need for a bishop's ministry.

THE SITUATION IN THE PITS

Bishop Nigel has stated that he is deeply disappointed with Mr Heseltine's announcements in the House of Commons. "The Government White Paper is a disgrace and a tragedy. A tragedy for the coal industry and above all a tragic and disgraceful way to treat the miners." "It fails to provide a long term overall energy policy for which the churches have been pressing", he said, and "many families will be devastated by this blow to their livelihood. "We are very disappointed that, once again, market forfces are seen to be more

important than people. We are very concerned about the future strain this hugh increase in unemployment will put on family life and the well being of our communities."

"As Church leaders we remain committed to bringing hope to all who are in despair, and to supporting the miners and all our local communities who are facing unemployment at this sad time."

To the Government Bishop Nigel says "Keep the pits open. We want coal not dole."

To the miners he says "Keep up your spirits, keep up the struggle, with the courage and the dignity which has gained you so much public support and respect. God bless you all."


TWO THOUGHTS

Drink water from your own wells

The children lined up to fill their buckets from the water pouring from the tap. This tap and one on the other side of the village are the only source of water for the one thousand people who live here.

But they are greatly appreciated by the villagers, who until recently did not have clean water at all.

Richard Francoise, president of the La Libertad community association, pointed at the slow-moving grey water in an irrigation ditch behind La Libertad. "That is what we used to use for everything: drinking, washing and bathing," he said.

La Libertad is in the Dominican Republic, in the Caribbean.

Most people came from the neighbouring country of Haiti as migrant farm labourers. The work is hard and the pay is low, with long lay-offs during the dry season.

People in La Libertad formed a neighbourhood committee several years ago. They started a school, and take care of villagers who

are too old or sick to work.

In 1990, with the help of Christian Aid's partner in the area, the Centre for Community Work, the committee asked for funds to dig a well. The grant was only £2911, but it paid for the materials and the hire of

an engineer. The residents of La Libertad did all the work.

Diarrhoea is a big killer of children in poor communities. Richard Françoise held his newborn daughter in his arms and said, "Now that we have clean water, I don't have to worry so much."
