RECTOR'S NOTES, NOVEMBER 1993

Church Roofs

During the wet summer we have experienced serious leaks through the roof of the North Aisle at St Cuthbert's Church. Various roofing contractors were asked to quote a price for repairing the roof. Unfortunately we were informed that the roof was so badly laid in the first place that they could not guarantee a repair, this despite the fact that the roof was only repaired some twelve years ago. We were told that the roof would have to be completely re-tiled. The Church Council has agreed to proceed with this work, which will cost around £5,000. In addition we have had to carry out repairs to the roof at All Saints' Church at a cost of £465. We have had to meet these costs by using money from our reserves, which are now severely depleted. If anyone wishes to make a donation towards the cost of these repairs we should be most grateful. Cheques should be made payable to 'Ackworth Parochial Church Council'. Substantial gifts may be covenanted if you pay Income Tax.

The Sunday Evening Service

As an experiment the time of the Evening Service at All Saints' Church is to be changed. During the winter months the service will now be held at 4 pm. The first service to be held at the this time will be on Sunday 7 November. We hope that the new time will encourage people to attend the evening service in the dark winter months.

Christmas Fayre

We are holding our Christmas Fayre at the Howard School on Saturday 4 December at 2 15 pm. There will be all the usual stalls. Please bring gifts for the raffle and tombola to church as soon as possible.

Traidcraft Shop

As some of you may have noticed the Traidcraft Shop has moved. It is now to be found at what was the Wool Shop in Bell Lane, directly opposite the car park. The old premises have been sold. The opening times are the same as before.

Water Aid

Churches Together in Ackworth are trying to raise £1,500 for a village well in south India. Many people in the Third World do not have access to clean, safe water supplies. Often they have to travel great distances to obtain pure water. Water Aid aims to overcome this problem by sinking wells near to villages. These modern wells pump pure water deep in the ground and can transform the life of the people, especially improving health since the water is uncontaminated. The wells are partly funded by money raised through the charity and also by money donated by the British Government. The particular village to be helped by Ackworth is in the very south of India in the state of Tamilnadu. So far almost £1,000 has been raised towards the total.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

I've been married for 24 years, a mother for 22 years and a Family Planning doctor for 20 years, so I was intrigued that the Church of England has decided to consider the Future of the Family.

It's obvious to all of us who have anything to


do with them, that families are changing in all sorts of ways. Many young couples now live hundreds of miles away from their parents and bring up children without the help grandparents can give. Many couples choose to live together before marriage, and the large majority of couples choose to have sexual relationships before marriage. A third of parents don't get married when they have their children. The roles of men and women within the family have changed with moves towards sexual equality and sharing of roles. The falling birthrate due to (dare I say it) improved family planning services, combined with advances in medical treatment, mean that the average age of the population is rising. There are now many more elderly people living alone in our community. It's also a fact that the gap between rich and poor is widening.

How does the church respond to these changes and the opportunities, or problems, that they bring? The Church of England Board for Social Responsibility has asked all parishes that question. On 20 September a group of us met together to think about answers - not an easy task with such a large subject and so little time to it. But we did come up with some suggestions. The questions they asked us to consider were these:-

- How can the Church respond to changes in family patterns and support families? We felt that we needed to be non-judgmental in our approach. Different doesn't mean wrong. We need to reach out more into the community and we need to offer unconditional help is not with a view to filling the church but seeking to 'be Jesus' to others.
- How can the government support families? It is a function of the church to highlight social injustice in a highly professional way. The government must be made to realise that cost-effectiveness isn't everything people want.
- Bo we find Christian teaching about the family helpful or unhelpful? We thought it was unhelpful, in that the situations written about in the Bible and the circumstances in which they were written are very different from our own. However, the basic values of love, acceptance and support that Jesus taught are unchangeable. It is these that should underpin our thinking and actions today.

Of course I was a member of a family long before I was married — a very large family in fact, which now consists of 2 parents, 8 brothers and sisters, 8 brothers— and sisters—in—law and $16\frac{1}{2}$ nieces and nephews. Therein lies the reason for the title of this piece. Just what or who is the family? Surely we are all members of a family. Too often the church still behaves as though the family is father and mother and 2.4 children. Increasingly this is not so. As in so many areas of Christian life the church needs to celebrate the diversity of the family, to welcome and include all and to reach out to all.

Perhaps the "Family" is an out-moded word. Any suggestions?



BISHOP NIGEL WRITES:

Advertising and awards are in the news. The Church Army has just given a cash prize of £1,000 for good evangelistic practice; and published a special supplement featuring the runners-up for that

monetary award for spreading the Gospel. Meanwhile, a nationwide campaign of bill-board advertising for Christmas has been agreed by the

main denominations. It's slogan? "Give Jesus your Christmas presence — deliver it yourself."

But isn't all this rather distasteful, even vulgar? Cash for communicating the Gospel? After all, didn't Jesus upturn the money tables in the Temple? And doesn't advertising the faith on bill-boards trivialise the Gospel? Jesus gave a profound message which led to the cross.

Well, let's get some biblical facts

right first. Jesus was not objecting to cash in the Temple. It was the dishonesty and exploitation which he found there which really concerned him. You could only buy the items required by

religious law for Temple sacrifice with special Temple money. The money-changers provided that at vast profit to themselves.

That was why Jesus upturned the tables. As for being vulgar, the Gospels indicate that Jesus enjoyed the company of the vulgar. Indeed, he got rather cross about what he saw as false piety.

So, after careful prayer and thought, I have decided to give the go ahead for the Christmas adverts to be posted on bill-boards in this diocese. I have also agreed to a request from the Trustees of the Bishop's



Development Fund to make annual cash awards. These will be given to three congregations and one individual in order to encourage: service to the community, outreach to youth, and good evangelistic practice.

But — and this is very important — the cash which accompanies these awards is to be used as in the Parable of the Talents. The parish which receives £500 will be expected to use that money to raise more — in order that other parishes can be given help for their missionary projects.

And as for the adverts? Next

month, when you get stuck in a Christmas traffic jam and find yourself looking at our advert, remember it was because of a traffic jam in Bethlehem that Jesus had to be born in a vulgar stable. He spent his earthly ministry shocking people and giving them a divine message with a common human touch.

That certainly earned him the disapproval of religious people, but it did change people's lives. It could just be that, by the grace of God, our awards and our adverts will help to do the same today.

MARA SUPPORT GROUP

There is a small but very dedicated group of ladies from Carleton and surrounding areas who meet periodically to organise events, to fund raise and to pack items to send to Mara via Faith In Action in Huddersfield.

The idea to fund raise was initiated by Lucie Naylor of Carleton when she was a student at New College, Pontefract. Indeed she was confirmed by Bishop Gershom when he came to Pontefract in 1991 and he extended an invitation to her to visit Mara at some future date. After her departure to University the fund raising was continued by members and friends at Carleton Church.

Lucie has just returned from Mara where she spent eight weeks helping to teach English to groups of 16-17 year old girls at the Secondary School in Issenye. As a direct result of this she is hoping eventually to teach English as a foreign language when she finishes her English degree at Oxford University next year. She flew out in mid-July taking money raised locally for churches in the area and for the Secondary School.

Her experiences were many and varied ranging from seeing a black cobra slithering out from under a chair she normally occupied; receiving several offers of marriage (the first within a few hours of arriving in Nairobi from a Kenyan Police Officer); going on a safari in the Ngorongoro Crater and visiting Carleton and East Hardwick's link parish of Nyamaseiki. She enjoyed her visit so much that she hopes to return one day.

A major project recently undertaken by the Support Group is the compilation of a book of *Favourite Prayers* to raise funds for our brothers and sisters in Mara who are materially poor but spiritually very rich. Some of the contributors are local and are known only to their friends, while others are famous. All have some connection with Yorkshire. Some prayers reveal humour, others simplicity.

The group is hoping to raise over £1000 from the sale of these books and this money will be used to help spread the Gospel in Mara. The cost is £1.75 each plus 28p postage and can be obtained by contacting Canon Leslie Brooks, The Vicarage, East Close, Carleton — (0977) 702478.

ALL HANDS ON DECK!

Michael Rogers, Vicar of Ryhill, responds to Bishop Nigel's Vision Statement

Bishop Nigel is the Captain of a large ship — the Diocese of Wakefield. He has many deck hands to turn the rudder, but the rudder must be turned in the right direction by each one or we shall be lost at sea, and maybe even shipwrecked.

So how do we start? First with DEDICATION. If we look around, the only success stories are those where there is total dedication. So every

Christian man, woman and child in our Diocese must be totally dedicated, putting aside any personal differences, and any doubts lingering in our hearts.

Then there is COMMITMENT. To do a job well we have to be committed. It's easy to go to church Sunday by Sunday and feel we've done our bit for the church. But what happens on the other days of the week — at the

shops, at work, in our homes, or at the Employment Offices looking for work?

We must show others, that whatever the situation is in our personal lives, we have faith in God. We have to show that being a Christian is the right way to live. No organisation flourishes without committed members.

So, with Dedication and Commitment, we must spring into ACTION. The church will not grow if

we do nothing about it. It will decrease, and instead of seeing 20,000 Anglicans at the Great Commissioning in 1999, we would see less than there were in 1988.

ACTION means not being a hopeless deck hand on Bishop Nigel's ship, turning the rudder in the wrong direction, but being an efficient deck hand who can encourage new deck hands so that the rudder not only turns in the right direction, but that it helps the ship to speed up.

NEW HANDBOOK FOR CLERGY HOUSEHOLDS

Bishop Nigel and his wife Celia have together published a new booklet, with illustrations by national cartoonist "Taffy", for all clergy households in the Diocese.

Entitled "Signposts", the booklet, a revision of one formerly provided for wives of clergy, is intended to help those who live in vicarages on all those special problems and difficulties of dwelling in tied accommodation and living "over the shop".

Written especially for those who are married to clergy or for other family and housekeeping employees who live on the premises, there are sections on housing, finance, education and health. There are also chapters on looking forward to retirement, dealing with personal

bereavement, coping with marital troubles if they come, taking proper time off, and getting adequate support in the unusual professional life of the clergy household. Clergy spouses will also be able to find guidance on the security aspect of dealing with the wide variety of callers who are attracted to vicarages.

In their introduction, the Bishop and his wife say "Vicarage life can be an extraordinary mixture of isolation and intrusion. One thing is certain — pressures on family relationships can be very heavy.

This little booklet does no more than provide some practical information and advice which may help to ease some of the pressures — especially in an emergency."

PILGRIMAGE

On Saturday the second of October three of us travelled with members from St James Church, Ryhill on a pilgrimage to Walsingham. Walsingham is a shrine in Norfolk.



We joined the coach at the Beverley Arms under a darkening sky, however the welcome by our fellow pilgrims soon dispelled the gloom. It was a pleasant journey with a break for coffee half way. The last quarter of an hour was enhanced by the singing of the pilgrim's hymn. On arrival at Walsingham it was still dull, but there were a few signs of better things to come.

On arrival we were met by a member of the staff and taken in to the Holy House. Here we had a short time to look around or to sit in silence, before the Mass began at twelve o'clock. The organist aroused instant memories of Michael Ashworth when he was Choir Master at St Cuthbert's Church with 'O Saviour of the World'. This was followed by 'Parnus Angelicus'. Although the Shrine was packed and people were standing or sitting in alcoves the atmosphere was one of peace and tranquility. We came out of the service to the strain of 'Exultate Jubilate'.


Lunch followed in the Refectory with an hours free time to spend either in the gardens, the Shrine or just to look around. At 2 30 pm we gathered in the Holy House. Father Martin Warner, the new Administrator gave us a short resume of how the Holy House came to be built and directed our thoughts towards the approach of the 'Sprinkling at the Well', and the way this would take place. This was followed by prayers.

We then had another short break during which we spent some time sitting in the gardens enjoying the sunshine. Afterwards we ventured out in the village. It seemed that the peace and tranquility which we had found in the Holy House was also to be found in the streets through which we walked.

Our last gathering of the day in the Holy House was for the 'Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction'. We entered the Shrine in semi-darkness, thus giving time to be quiet, to settle down and to wait in silence. Once again the speaker was Father Martin Warner. He reminded us about the purpose of the Holy House, for its grace and healing, and that the Shrine will not change but will always be for all people. As the Blessed Sacrament was brought to the altar we sang a hymn. This was followed by prayers and another hymn as the Blessed Sacrament was returned to the tabernacle. We then silently departed and set off for home.



He was taken prisoner for being a Christian and condemned to death in the same way as his beloved master. Legend says


that he was crucified on a diagonal cross. This type of cross is known now as St Andrew's cross.
