RECTOR'S NOTES, OCTOBER 1993

Making a will

It is not often realised that, according to the Book of Common Prayer, one of a clergyman's tasks is to remind people to make a will! In 'The Visitation of The Sick' is found the following:

'And if he hath not before disposed of his goods, let him then be admonished to make his Will, and to declare his Debts, what he oweth, and what is owing unto him; for the better discharging of his conscience, and the quietness of his Executors. But men should often be put in remembrance to take order for the settling of their temporal estates, whilst they are in health.'

Of course that was written in the seventeenth century when life was more precarious, death more frequent in illness and it was assumed that only men made wills. Today both men and women are advised to make a will, for the 'quietness' of their surviving family. Dying without having made a will can often lead to complex and difficult consequences for those left behind.

Good Will Sunday

Sunday 31 October this year has been designated 'Good Will Sunday'. A recent survey among Christians into attitudes towards making wills revealed some telling insights:

- * Half of those interviewed had not yet made a will.
- * Only one in five had made a will which included a legacy to charity,
- * Those who had not made a will intended to include a charitable bequest.
- * Those who had not made a will admitted that they simply 'needed prompting'; they had 'not got round to it yet'.

Good Will Sunday is an opportunity to prompt Christians to make a will and, if they wish, to leave a legacy to the Church and Christian Charities, thereby enabling them to further their work. Recently this parish has benefited from two legacies, from Mrs Turner, formerly of Long Lane, High Ackworth, who left £500 for the repair and maintenance of St Cuthbert's Church, and from Will Jarrett's estate, a gift of £1500. As a follow up to Good Will Sunday one of the Diocesan solicitors, Mrs L Box of Dixon, Cole and Gill, Wakefield, has offered to help in the making of a will. She can be contacted on 0924-373467.

VIEW FROM THE PEW



"Have you given your life to Christ?"

That was a question put to me only days before my confirmation five years ago. I was quite astounded by the fact that someone felt the need to ask me such a question. I had been going to church for over a year. I had been on the vicar's confirmation course. I had even started reading my bible regularly, though perhaps not every day as I should. So how did I answer? "Yes".

It seemed quite obvious to me. I had done all the right things. In any case I couldn't have said no, or that would have made my confirmation meaningless. But somehow I felt uneasy in my answer. Why?

Because I had done all the right things, said all the things, and even asked God to send His Holy Spirit into my heart. This He dutifully did, and boy didn't I know it, and I accepted Jesus into my life. What I hadn't done was to fulfil my part and give my life to Him.

I thought at that point that I was committed to God and willing to serve Him. The fact was that I was committed to going to church every week and taking part in the services, but the rest of the week was for home and work. Looking back I made all sorts of excuses for not helping during the week. It was easy for me, being a doctor on call had its advantages. During this time I heard a story about a lamb that wanted to be a lion. So it learnt to roar, and even tried to eat the same sort of food, but decided that the only way to be a real lion was to live with them. He didn't live long. So going to church regularly, and saying all the right things, and doing all the right things, didn't necessarily make me a Christian.

Prayer was the only way out. To speak to God, and say to Him, "My life is yours. Do with it what you will."

This time, there was no revelation, no flashing lights, bolts from heaven or anything. But very slowly I found myself involved in all sorts of churchy things. Now church matters take up a great deal of my time, but God provides that time. I could do nothing without Him.

What I had learnt was to use my heart and not my head. Words are only words unless they come from the heart. It is the heart that gives them meaning. The words of our Communion service are a pointless exercise unless we mean what we say, and then every word can be transformed into actions during the week. For it is during the week that our faith must have relevance, because if it doesn't then we cannot spread the Good News as Jesus always intended us to do.

We must mean what we say, because if we don't, if we don't shout about our faith, if we don't get excited about our salvation, how can we ever expect other people, like the baptismal respondent, to "Turn to Christ"? What's more how can we persuade them to give their lives to Christ?

Take my will, and make it Thine; it shall be no longer mine: take my heart, it is thine own; it shall be Thy royal throne.



Steven Croft responds to Bishop Nigel's **Uision Statement**

TWO THOUSAND YEARS AGO a small group of believers were given a command to be witnesses. Filled with the power of the Spirit they went out. Within a generation new communities of believers were established in every province of Rome.

We have the same command.

Christ's commission is now focused for us in the Bishop's vision: to arrest decline and see growth begin. For each church to grow by at least five adults each year. For the Diocese to in-

crease by 1,000 worshippers every year. For 20,000 adult Christians to be commissioned in 1999 to carry the gospel of Christ into the next millennium.

For me, three things are vital as we seek to respond:

First, the vision needs to throw us back onto God in urgent

prayer. In human terms, this vision is impossible. For the best part of a century, the Christian faith has been in decline. We are looking to see a miracle happen in the next six years. Yet we believe in a God of miracles who raised his Son from death and pours out his Spirit on the

Church, No amount of clever planning can substitute for the power of God. Our first response Bishop Nigel's vision needs to be urgent, faithful intercession.

Second, the vision needs to bind us together. "By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another". We are already a large family. There are different traditions, different languages, different priorities. We have been given a vision which can unite us and help us work together. That

means sharing weaknesses and strengths; being open to the insights of others; and not being afraid to shout "Help!". The barriers need to come down.

Third, the vision needs to focus on making disciples. Christ does not command us to go and make church attenders who come simply because they enjoy the services. Not does he command us simply to make converts who will stay as infants in the faith. Our commission is to make disciples: women and men who are prepared to grow to maturity; surrender their lives to Christ and to follow where he leads.

For a whole generation God has been renewing his church. That gentle renewal has profoundly transformed our worship; our understanding of ministry; our appreciation of other Christians; our knowledge of the Spirit's work and many other areas of Christian life. The renewal has been for a purpose: so that the Church can begin to grow again in a major way; so that individuals can find Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour; so that our whole society can be renewed. In the name of the Lord, let's go for it!

Sunday Trading

Bishop Nigel has recently written to all MPs of constituencies in the diocese, expressing his concern about the Government's proposals to reform the law about Sunday Trading.

He pointed out that neither he personally, nor the church at large, are taking an unthinkingly negative view on Sunday Trading. Rather, we want to protect the family, low paid workers and society as a whole from finding itself in a situation which does not enhance life but, by removing the distinctiveness of the English Sunday, diminishes its richness. His preference is for the Keep Sunday Special proposals which would restrict opening to smaller shops en-

gaged in a limited number of trading activities.

He would be unhappy to see complete deregulation because of the lack of focus in the week for families to be together. Low paid workers need to be protected from exploitation and conscience would need to be respected from those who felt they could not work on a Sunday.

We live in a very complex society where many tasks do have to be un-

dertaken on a Sunday, and for that reason, Bishop Nigel thinks that we must all continue to help people to get a proper balance between work and rest. If proper recreation is not taken, then illness and stress escalate. Bishop Nigel also reminded the MPs that in February the General Synod of the Church passed a motion affirming the importance of Sunday as a day of spiritual renewal, rest and recreation - and for the nurturing of family life.

Which page goes with which?

I once heard a lecturer begin a description of poisons by saying "there are those what do and those what don't!" In the world of word processors for a PC they can all be classed as those what don't. Until the latest release of **WordPerfect** that is. (Version 6.0 for DOS.)



Now, at long last, there is a word processor available which can format and then print-out booklets. No longer do we need to print each page sepa-

rately and then figure out which page to match up with which at the photocopier. WordPerfect can now print out, for example, a 12 page booklet by printing page 1 and 12 on one sheet, and then 11 and 2 on the back, and so on. This is just the thing for parish magazines and even See-Link (which is produced using WordPerfect on a home assembled i486 PC). It sounds so simple but it could be so frustrating for the poor photocopier operator, especially if it is a booklet with something like 31 pages, and in despair you discover as the job progresses, that half the pages are in the wrong place.

Now it can be left to the technology to sort it out. If you use WordPerfect for Windows this particular upgrade, which will format booklets, is due later this year. Needless to say there are other useful improvements in this latest upgrade, including a much greater variety of fonts.

PCC Notes, 6 September

- 1 The treasurer reported on the accounts.
- It was agreed to apply for a faculty to purchase Communion plate and altar superfrontals for St Cuthbert's Church with the donation from the estate of Mr Will Jarrett.
- 3 It was reported that a total of f1439 was collected by all the churches during Christian Aid Week.
- A report was received from the Pastoral Care Committee. This included details of a new, non church, 'self help' bereavement group to be set up at College Lane Surgery, and also plans by Churches Together in Ackworth to set up a letter writing and form filling service in Ackworth.
- A report was received from the Fabric Committee. It was agreed to appoint a contractor to carry out urgent repairs to the roofs at both churches. Minor repairs and maintenance is also to be carried out on the bells at St Cuthbert's Church now that we have the start of a bell ringing group. There was a short discussion on church sound systems.
- 6 Edward Wynn was appointed as a foundation governor at the Howard School to replace Mr Stuart McDougall whose term of office ended on 31 August.
- 7 It was agreed to seek the winding up of two parish trusts which yield very small amounts of income. As a result of recent legislation on charities the amount of future administration does not justify the continuation of these trusts.
- Doreen Belk gave a short talk on various ways in which the Sunday evening service could be developed in order to attract a larger congregation, eg making more of 'special Sundays' throughout the year, inviting outside speakers, extending the use of 'invitation' services. Many of the ideas have been used successfully in a variety of other parishes. These ideas will be considered in the future.
