RECTOR'S NOTES, SEPTEMBER 1993

Parish Records

Amongst the mountain of letters and paperwork which lands on my desk there is occasionally something which, despite sounding tedious and boring, turns out to be of real interest! One of the most intriguing of late has been information about parish registers and records. keeping of parish records is covered by the Parochial Registers and Records Measure, 1978, which was amended at the beginning of this year. The Guide to this Measure explains in detail the responsibilities of the incumbent, the churchwardens and Parochial Church Council with regard to the keeping of registers and records. All services in church including the pastoral offices baptisms, weddings and burials are recorded in the parish registers. The keeping of such records was first introduced in 1538. Prior to that date many parishes kept no records. It may be of interest to know that Ackworth's records of Baptisms, Weddings and Burials date back to 1558, and so are amongst some of the oldest in the They were also meticulously maintained and only recently the West Yorkshire County Archives Office asked my permission to photo-copy some entries, for use in a course they were giving on Parish Registers.

In addition to registers, the Guide points out that other records should be preserved including those concerned with: churchwardens, minutes of meetings, accounts, documents relating to church buildings, together with any relevant correspondence, maps and photographs. It is also suggested that parish magazines should be kept, as a record of parish life.

I know that some people have parish magazines dating back over a long period of time. The parish archives contain magazines dating back to 1942, but there are some years which are missing eg 1957-1962 inclusive and 1971-1977 inclusive. If anyone would be willing to donate their collections to the church, either now or in the future, especially for these years or prior to 1942 it would help us maintain a complete record for future generations. If you are willing to help in this way please contact me, or the churchwardens.

WHOSE CUP IS IT ANYWAY?

Inside me, something was wrong. My spirit was troubled and I suspected I knew why. I am intelligent enough to trust the evidence that no one gets AIDS by erinking from a common cup, but I was still afraid.

Ray could no longer come to church, so the priest asked me to take communion to him at home. The brightness was gone from his eyes. His face was gaunt, his body now emaciated. He could not walk any more. I passed the chalice to Ray. He held his hand and said, 'You first'.

I don't know what came over me. I seemed to have no control as the words came out in a whisper, 'No, I'm not afraid of you'. The Blood of Christ, the cup of salvation.

I had lied. I was shaking. As Ray raised the cup to his parched lips to drink, I entered a moment of terror at the thought, 'What if the experts are wrong?'

It was then that I saw the tears well in Ray's eyes. As he passed the cup to me, saying those familiar words I have said so many times, my own tears mingled with Jesus blood. I had come to minister, to bring Communion, but I received the healing of forgiveness in the sharing of life.

Richard Giles responds to the Bishop Nigel's Vision for the Diocese

"Born too late" was a pop song when I was young, and, having the necessary lean and hungry look, I always regretted being born too late to work as a missionary in Africa with UMCA. I needn't have worried; I'm going to work in a missionary diocese after all.

The conditions which made Africa in the 1930's an exciting and rewarding mission field are now replicated for us right here in our Post-Christian materialist culture, so 'three cheers' for the Missionary Diocese of Wakefield!

I welcome Bishop Nigel's Diocesan Vision Statement because

1) it is **REALISTIC**. We are deep in missionary territory, and the chips are down. To face up to that will be uncomfortable, but a healing process. I shall never forget spending a week at the seminary of the Mission de France at Pontigny in the 1960's; tough young men being trained as combat

troops in a mission field right on their doorstep, in a joyful militant spirit lacking in the English Church clinging to the delusions of Establishment and 'residual Christianity'.

- 2) it is PRECISE. We all know how to spiritualise failure with talk of 'growing in depth' when we DO need bums on pews. Local Christian communities must grow if they are to change the world, and the Diocesan Vision Statement gives us a precise target to aim at just five new members each year in each church. So we can begin work on this as if our life depended on it because it does!
- 3) it is **POSITIVE**. We have got ourselves into such a downbeat state of mind that we begin to believe all we read in the papers about decline. A young couple seeking faith recently were bemused when the sidesman kept asking "Have you come to hear

your Banns?". The people in that church were kind, but it never entered their heads that there were people out there hungry for God and wanting to join them. Inwardly they had already admitted defeat. The Diocesan Vision reminds us that we have an exciting story to tell, and people eager to hear it once we have the courage to begin.

4) it GIVES US A JOB TO DO: by requiring us to spend the first three years of the Decade of Evangelism talking about women priests, the General Synod has not served us well. That must now be put behind us. We are assured that both 'integrities' within the Church are to be recognised and valued, and both have a vital part to play in the growth of the

Church as a powerful force towards the conversion of England.

The traditional Catholic insight is that incorporation rather than instruction is the key to church growth, and if this is to play its full part in making the Diocesan Vision a reality, we need to work hard at creating local Christian communities which are both lively and demanding, fun to belong to and unbearable to stay away from.

No, we were not born too late. This is our moment, here is the place. In the name of the Lord, let's go for it!

Christian Broadcasting Library Service

The challenge.

A survey by Christian Broadcasting Library Service has revealed that, in any given year, more people go to their local library for information regarding Christianity than the total membership of all churches in that library's catchment area.

The survey was carried out over a one-year period among 150 libraries in Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. It shows that, when available in sufficient numbers, Christian books in local libraries are borrowed and read up to twice as much as the average of all other categories of book.

A total of 5000 non-churchgoers were asked, "If you desperately wanted to know something about the Bible or the Christian Faith, where would you go?" The top answer with 27% was 'the public library', a further 20% answering 'don't know'. This 47% of unchurched people presents one of the biggest challenges to the Christian Church in the UK.

The freedom to accept or reject Jesus Christ is a freedom given by God. Yet few people in the UK - especially the younger generation - have had the opportunity to make that choice. There is widespread ignorance of the Christian faith, and public libraries and school resource centres have generally not recognised the shortage of Christian material to enable that choice to be made.

In addition to the unchurched, more that 7 million people in the UK are churchgoers. While there are many good church bookstalls and Christian bookshops, research has shown that 32% of churchgoers (2.25 million) are likely to borrow from libraries. Yet out of 135 million books in the UK public libraries, less that half a million are Christian. Were the Christian bookstock to reflect the demand from just these 2.25 million potential borrowers, a further 5.5 million Christian books would need to be added.

The Solution.

CBLS is now redressing this serious inbalance by offering all public libraries a selection of free Christian books and all education authorities a selection of its top 20 Christian videos.

It is also challenging local churches to finance the placing of books into their local libraries and videos into their local schools, through their education resource centres.

Help Needed.

CBLS and the local churches can work together to promote the Christian Faith locally through libraries and schools. This must be seen as part of the churches' commitment, not left to local authorities. Please make this need a matter of prayer in your church. There is a harvest of people right on your doorstep. CBLS provide the ground-bait for the churches to go fishing!

ONE PERSON'S EXPERIENCE OF QUIET DAYS AND RETREATS

When I was asked to write in the magazine about why I went on quiet days and retreats it instantly brought to mind a fellow Mothers' Union member, Win Lambert, who first encouraged me to attend one. As in many other things it is my membership of the Mothers' Union which has widened my horizons, and step by step led me on to being able to share my faith with others.

I took my first tentative step when I became a representative from our branch to the Deanery Committee and a couple of years later was asked to become a representative on a Diocesan Committee. This was when I first met Win way back in 1969/70.

When I was first asked to consider attending a quiet day I had quite a few misgivings, foremost of which was, could I stay silent for that period of time? How would I cope? What went on at these sort of days? Would it all be explained? Would people think I was trying to be goody goody? At that time no one I knew, or a least that I was aware of, went to quiet days, so it was a step into the unknown — a real reaching out. I was filled with apprehension. However, within the first few minutes after my arrival at the convent, and the warm welcome with which I was received by the sisters, as well as those who were more aware of what the day together would give to us all, I began to relax.

After coffee and biscuits we wended our way from the guest house into the main building passing the school room, the kitchens and then on to the chapel itself is very beautiful and one is instantly aware that here one can find calm, peace and serenity within a loving prayerful atmosphere. Our day began with Holy Communion followed by a short address. Time was then given to sit in silence and to read or walk in the gardens. We were also invited to share in 'Sext' and 'None', two of the services which the nuns hold. Our packed lunch was eaten in the dining room, then back to chapel for a short talk and silence once again until the day ended at four o' clock, with a cup of tea!

The day changed so many things for me. It made me realise how much I had been missing; how much I needed that time apart giving me space to think things through; to wait on God and try to find out the way He wanted me to go forward. So, over the last twenty or so years quiet days have become part of my life, usually attending two or three each year. Most of the time these have been at Horbury but for the last few years I have been to Mirfield.

Why do I go? For me it has been a means of recharging my batteries — a time apart with God to enjoy His peace, and then to go out accepting and facing everyday life in the knowledge of God's strength and love. Building a relationship with God when times go well gives one the faith to hold on to when the going is hard.

I shall always give thanks to God for the Mothers' Union and Win Lambert in particular, without whom I may never have taken those first tentative steps towards exploring my faith further.

'KEEP TALKING ON FAMILY MATTERS' SAYS C of E

Much has been said about the role of 'the family' recently. The Church of England plans to keep everyone talking about it throughout the summer and autumn. Profound changes are taking place in the structure and functioning of families and the Church of England's Board for Social Responsibility is asking everyone with an interest to discuss the subject of the family seriously and put their views on paper.

'We want to get as many people as possible talking about the future of the family,' said Alan Morgan, Bishop of Sherwood and chairman of the Working Party on the Family. 'We want to hear about the actual experiences, hopes and fears of families today, and the people working with them, so that we can look at the changes that are happening and evaluate the contribution that the Christian faith and the Church can make.'

The working party has issued two consultation papers for anyone concerned about the family. One is aimed at individual Christians and churches, encouraging them to set up groups to study the issues and send in their views. The second is aimed at voluntary organisations, other Christian denominations, other faiths and groups with an interest in the family.

The working party was set up in autumn 1992 and will continue into 1994, publishing its findings and reporting to General Synod to encourage further discussion and action. The present consultation period ends on October 31.
