Moving on

By the time you read these notes most of you will have heard that I am shortly to leave Ackworth. My last Sunday will be Easter Day, 7 April. On Monday 15 April I shall take up a new appointment as Deputy Chaplain at Leeds Prison, known to locals as Armley Gaol.

Prison Ministry

There are two full time Anglican Chaplains at Leeds, one full time Roman Catholic Chaplain, and many part time chaplains including Methodist, Baptist, Salvation Army and also a number of lay assistants. In addition there are representatives of other faiths including Buddhist, Muslim and Hindus. The Christian Chaplains try to work as a team, and also hold meetings with those of other faiths. The church's ministry in prisons is to all, both staff and prisoners. The church has a long history of work in prisons and in the last century the governor

of a prison was often ordained and acted as chaplain.

Prison ministry is based on the Gospels, and Christ's own concern for the outcast and sinner. He caused dispute by keeping the company of tax gatherers and sinners. When challenged he replied, 'It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I did not come to call the virtuous, but sinners.'

The churches are not working in prisons because they are trying to excuse crime, nor are the churches denying the very real suffering which offenders bring on innocent people. Not all prisoners are two headed monsters. Many are ordinary people who have made mistakes. Many deeply regret what they have done and wish to make a new start in life, if society will let them.

I hope that working in prison will provide me with an opportunity to develop my growing interest in counselling. I will leave Ackworth with mixed feelings - looking forward to the future, but with regret at leaving so many friends. Fred Davies, churchwarden writes about the approaching interregnum

Many in the parish were saddened and surprised by the Rector's announcement on the 4th February that he would be preaching his last sermon at Ackworth on Easter Sunday.

During the weeks that remain, there will be time to evaluate the remarkable changes that have taken place during the last ten years of Peter's ministry here, but for the present the following comments must suffice.

Some members of the congregation are aware that for historical reasons the right of presentation to the Benefice is vested in the Duchy of Lancaster. During the interregnum period my fellow church warden, Bill Branston, and I will be in constant touch with the appropriate authorities with a view to appointing a fresh incumbent - that process has already begun.



An interregnum is usually a period of months rather than weeks and it is unfortunately the case that a worshipping congregation can decline during this time. As the Archdeacon of Pontefract pointed out in his mission visit to the parish last summer, Ackworth is one of the small number of parishes in the Diocese where there has been considerable growth in recent years. With 44 lay outlets of ministry we should be able to maintain the life and worship of the church in Ackworth in what we hope will be a smooth and short interregnum.

Profile of Joyce Waites



I don't know about you but I'd always thought of Joyce Waites as Ackworthian, born and bred. Perhaps that's because she is married to Des who belongs to an old Ackworth family. Joyce says she is still regarded as an outsider by many people. She was born in Wakefield and spent most of her early life in Featherstone. One day, when Joyce was about fifteen years old, she came home from school and announced to her mother that she wanted to go to church. Joyce's mother told her she'd better go and talk to the vicar who was well known for his conversations in the village street. Without delay Joyce went to the vicarage and was invited in by the vicar's wife for tea and buns. After that Joyce became a regular attender at St. Thomas's. Purston and had her first taste of teaching at Sunday School.

Joyce left school at sixteen. She didn't want to go to college and she thought it would be more helpful if she earned some money. She worked as an insurance clerk in Leeds and travelled every day by bus, leaving at 6.30 am in the morning. It was on the South Elmsall to Leeds bus that she met Des Waites. One extremely foggy morning the bus stopped in Hunslet and

everyone was told to get off. Joyce found herself accompanying Des into Leeds on foot. After that Joyce started coming to Ackworth regularly see Des who played in a band at the church Youth Club. They were married in 1966 and moved to Agbrigg.

Work was sought nearer to home and Joyce took a job as a statistician (!!) - Joyce's exclamation marks - in the Public Health department at County Hall. She did this for a year and then went to work as an unqualified teacher at Fitzwilliam. Again, she went back to insurance until the birth of Jonathon in 1970 and Matthew in 1972. In 1975 Des passed exams in insurance and loss-adjusting and Joyce decided to go to college to become a qualified teacher. This she did, at Bretton Hall Annexe. It was a part-time course lasting four years and combined with running a home and looking after two lively boys Joyce found it a full-time iob. In addition, the Waites family moved to Ackworth in 1978.

Qualifying in 1979, Joyce began working in Hemsworth, first at Southmoor Road and then at Archbishop Holgate's First school Joyce is delighted to have been offered a post at the Howard school as a result of the recent reorganisation of schools. She will start work there in September as a teacher of Key Stage One.



'I envy you, Vicar - I suppose you go home now and put your feet up until next Sunday?'

Q. Where does Jesus give His mother away?

A. John 19:27



This act takes place at The Cross. It is the point in the crucifixion story where Jesus tells His mother that John is her son, and He then tells John that she is his mother. In this sense, Jesus is giving His mother away.

John's Gospel just happens to be my favourite Gospel. No doubt we all have our favourite. I have came to the conclusion that this is my favourite because it takes me out of this world, and gives me a glimpse of the next. I have a weakness for films and books which take me out of this world.

John's Gospel is obviously different from the other three gospels. It has far more theology in it than the others. Some people believe that it has so much theology in it, that it must have been written a long time after Jesus' death, perhaps even more than a hundred years. If this is the case, then it must be the least reliable of the four gospels. As part of my studies I chose to write an essay on this Gospel. I found myself in favour of a much earlier date for the writing of the gospel, and found it to be just as accurate as the other three. If you read it thoroughly, and count the number of years that pass as the story unfolds, you will count three. This is the number of years between the start of Jesus' ministry and His death. Therefore it is probably just as reliable as any other Gospel.

Another interesting thing about John's gospel is that it is made up of four different strands. A lot of the gospel is given to the retelling of Jesus' life and ministry, this is the story in the gospel. Next to that you will see that there is a lot of teaching as well. Alongside these are passages which contain theological comment and commentary. Lastly, in the midst of all this, there are explanatory comments, which explain why something was happening.

These four strands are very cleverly and closely interwoven into an exciting Gospel. It is sometimes very difficult to determine where one of these strands ends, and another begins, but with practice it becomes easier.

John's Gospel presents Jesus in a fully glorified way. That is as God. It is worth reading well.

Bishop Nigel writes:

In preparation for my visit to a school the vicar had been telling the children what a bishop does. So what did he say about me? I asked one class. Quick as a flash came the reply: You're in the newspapers, and on radio and television, too much!



Since 1993.

at the request of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, I have been

chairing the Church of England's Communications Unit. One of its key jobs is responding to the enquiries of journalists and broadcasters. So, among the bishops, I am the one who is chiefly responsible for speaking to the media. It is a five year post, and I shall hand over to someone else in 1998.

Hardly a week goes by without a request for a comment, on behalf of the Church, on some current issue — for the *Today* programme, *Newsnight*, BBC and ITV news, or, increasingly, one of the world satellite channels. Recently Canon Roy Clernents, my Chaplain,

counted more than 50 different radio and television s t a t i o n s ringing into B i s h o p ' s



Lodge in just one week!

I refuse almost all these requests—either because I can pass them on to someone else more knowledgable in that particular subject; or because I do not feel it appropriate for the Church to make a comment. Never do I make the first move (except once doing a phone-in on Radio Leeds!).

I had no idea, until I did this job, how frequently the media turn especially to the Church of England for guidance advice and opinion. Each day I receive, by fax, copies of every item to do with religion which has appeared in that day's press. Often there are several

pages. Indeed, the total amount of air time and column inches given to religious, and especially Anglican, matters has increased astonishingly.

Entering into the media world has proved to me how wrong people are when they say that the Church of England now occupies only a marginal position in our society. What is undeniably clear is that our Church and its message are news. It is, therefore, up to all of us to do our best to make sure that news is good.

That may mean sometimes saying things which people do not want to hear. Our Church is often at its best, and most biblical, when it is saying uncomfortable things. Then, being interviewed, on air, or by the press, can be a battle of wits

— requiring from us strong spiritual resources.

In this Diocese we are blessed with radio and television stations and local newspapers which are usually friendly to the Church — and willing to give space to good news. It is my view that we do not make sufficient or imaginative enough use of these free facilities available to us. Here are means of entering almost every home.

So, please make sure that good news from your local church — the way it worships and how it serves the community — is regularly given to your local media. We are not in the newspapers, and on radio and television, enough.

Free Copies of St John's Gospel

Thousands of copies of Saint John's Gospel from Britain's most talked about Bible—the new Contemporary English Version—are to be made available nationwide as part of a huge evangelistic outreach by the country's Christian Bookshops.



With specially made dispensers for the Gospels outside their shop, supported by poster and window displays, the bookshops are providing people with a no strings attached opportunity to find out more about the Bible.

Behind the project are Bible Society, SGM International, Wesley Owen Books & Music and the Christian Enquiry Agency who are to make available 100,000 Gospels through Wesley Owen and other independent bookshops from 11 March.

The Bible Society will also be distributing the Gospels, at cost price in packs of 50—enabling churches to use them in their own mission, and join in evangelism.

The use of the Contemporary

English Version for this project is also an opportunity for people to make up their own minds about the modern language and phrases used in the new translation which made the national headlines recently.

The translation has been prepared to meet the needs of the many people who hear the Bible rather than read it for themselves. And, while remaining entirely faithful to the original Greek, Hebrew and Aramaic languages of the Bible, the CEV is written in such a way that people of all ages and abilities can grasp its meaning and relevance,

The CEV translation/paraphrase of Saint John's Gospel begins:

"In the beginning was the one who is called the Word. The Word was with God and was truly God. From the very beginning the Word was with God. And with this Word, God created all things. Nothing was made without the Word. Everything that was created received its life from him, and his life gave light to everyone. The light keeps shining in the dark, and darkness has never put it out."

The Bible with Anglised text is due for publication early next year, and is another development in Bible Society's work to enable people to relate to the Scripture in today's culture.



A DAY THAT CAN BRING JOY OR PAIN



Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday in Lent, is a time of cards and greetings. Many churches give children posies of flowers to give to their mother as a 'thank-you' for all her loving care.

But for many people it is also a day of painful reminders. Single people, childless couples, people who had a bad relationship with their mother or with their own children are among those who feel excluded or devalued by this day.

MOTHER CHURCH

This demonstrates how the same words can cause pain to one person and reassurance to another. Some of the sting can be taken out of it by explaining that the name 'Mothering Sunday' really comes from the reference to 'the heavenly Jerusalem, which is the mother of us all', in the prayer book epistle reading for the day, Galatians 4:26.

It has become confused with Mother's day, an American invention; but the title Mothering Sunday refers to our mother, the church, and our membership of that great family.

Helping people through their pain with what they feel Mothering Sunday to be about is one way in which faith comes to life. For it reminds us that faith does not exist in the abstract, it always comes to life among real people in real situations. And we need to understand their situation, to discover the fullness of Christ's love for all his family.

CAN YOU HEAR ME?

Do you know how the phone started? In March 1847, a boy was born in Scotland. His father was a teacher of deaf and dumb children and when the boy, Alexander Graham Bell, grew up he too became a teacher. His family moved to America and young Alexander began to invent a number of devices to help deaf people.

In March 1876 he patented his most famous invention - the telephone which is 120 years old this year. But, even though Alexander Graham Bell worded so hard on the idea, the telephone is no use to someone who is very hard of hearing or deaf. Modern phone have special switches that work with hearing aids but if you are very deaf you need to see someone to 'hear' them. You need to read their lips or to see the signs that their hands are making.

Can you talk with your hands? All of us use some signs to show what we mean without words. What about OK (finger and thumb in a circle) or good (thumbs up)?

In this country there are over 50,000 people whose main means of communication is through BSL (British Sign Language).

IT'S A START

First basic lesson in signing how to say HELLO and HOW ARE YOU?



HELLO

You use your right hand, open flat, palm facing the person you are talking to. Move

your hand away from the side of your forehead (a bit like an American salute).



HOW ARE YOU

Thumbs up (like saying 'good') on both hands. Hold your hands up against your chest

and move them outwards towards the other person.
