The Rector Writes...



This month we celebrate a very important birthday, one which many people share in common, not because it is a date on which they or a member of their family was born, but a day which a much larger family whose membership numbers millions share.

lt's difficult to know with absolute certainty, but the birthday we will be celebrating this year will be somewhere in the region of 1,996th give or take a few years. If you haven't guessed it's the Church's birthday which we remember and hopefully celebrate together in church on the 23rd of this month – Pentecost or Whitsunday.

The Church was born when the Holy Spirit came down upon a few disciples in an upstairs room and empowered them to go out and tell others what knowing Jesus Christ could do for their lives. After years of following, observing and listening to their Lord and Master, seeing him overcome the worst that evil could throw at him, even death, they find the strength, courage and inspiration to go out and pass on to others the Good News about the abundant life which they had received in full measure.

And so a church was born and we continue to celebrate its birth almost 2,000 years later. But what are we celebrating? What does the church mean to you? Is it a magnificent

edifice of stone where we worship, sing God's praises and offer him our prayers? That place where people are baptised, married, confirmed and are committed to God's care through the funeral service? Is it that place where we go to find peace and commune with God both spiritually and sacramentally? Is it a place where we first learnt about God and Jesus in Sunday school or grew up in through youth clubs or the uniformed organisations? ls it to do with Archbishops, Bishops, clergy and lay ministers, General Synod and other hierarchical structures or a one- toone relationship with fellow Christians through which we find comfort. support encouragement? It can be any one of these or many other things, and we should not despise any of them.

The Church is many things to many people, it is a vision that can change at different points through a lifetime. Whatever way, style of approach or objects we use under the wide umbrella of the Church. thev are all symbols whereby God communicates Himself to others: meeting points of the earthly and the heavenly. However we

find God, one

thing is for certain, without people the Holy Spirit cannot continue the work it began on that first birthday. Far and above anything else the church comprised of and 18 concerned with people! Spirit filled though that body of people may be, they are still merely that - people with all their faults and imperfections who are reliant upon all the paraphernalia of what the church is to each individual

In a perfect world we would not need elaborate buildings. ceremonies etc. to communicate and celebrate the love of God come down into the hearts and minds of ordinary people through Jesus Christ; but then only one was perfect. People are far from perfect and there are as many different ways of thinking, behaving understanding as there are traditions, denominations and styles of worship within the universal catholic church. For as long as there is such diversity in the human race we need to maintain as many ways of bringing God to that mass of humanity as possible.

In the world in which we live today, that means using that which is said to make the world go

Not only do we need to maintain what we already have, but to look to the future also, and to look with faith to where the continued activity of the

Holy Spirit will stimulate growth.

As we stand at the threshold of a very significant 'birthday' for the church, with the dawn of a new millennium at the end of this year, we need to think carefully about whether we are in a fit state ut present, but also whether we are in a good enough shape to face the future - the next 1,000 years. As a result of this thought, later this year, we will be launching a Stewardship campaign to try and effect a recovery in our seriously failing financial condition. More of that later!

There are various reasons why we are struggling, one is simply that there are fewer people giving than twenty or even five years ago; yet that can be changed if we - the few can make a sacrifice today, that the many might easily bear the burden tomorrow. We need not despair if we remember that the Church was born from just a handful of people who were open to the Holy Spirit.

celebrate the Church's As we birthday this year, let's think about what the Church means to us - what priority it has in our lives and then as we open our own lives to the Holy Spirit let's give our Church the best birthday present ever. As we have been given new life through Jesus Christ, let us offer our church in this community that same gift of new life; a fresh start and the opportunity to go forward without having to worry whether it merely has the means to stand still.



Exodus Chapter 3

Exodus is one of those books of the Bible which contains one of the great biblical figures, that of Moses. Many people will know something of the story of Moses, the bullrushes and a Moses basket, the burning bush, the plagues, the Red Sea. The Ten Commandments, the journey through the desert. Mention Moses, and most people will think of Charlton Heston who exchanged shepherd's a head-dress for a Hollywood hairstyle.

Chapter three of Exodus is the chapter which deals with the burning bush. On Mount Horeb, Moses meets with God in the burning bush. Moses is commissioned to carry out God's work. God works through people, and on this occasion He chose Moses. However, Moses was not the willing follower of God's will that Abraham was. Moses does not feel he is able to do what God asks, and questions his own ability, but we all know that he gives in eventually to God, as do all who hear His call.

Moses moves closer to the bush and is told to take off his shoes. He is on holy ground. Moving into the presence of God is like that; moving onto holy ground. or on behalf of someone else, for assistance in coping with today's world? The Jews were enslaved by the Egyptians and were being treated cruelly. They had much to cry to God for.

In this chapter we read that God has heard their cries, and will act to save them. Good news indeed! This is God's way. When we cry to Him, He listens, and we can be assured that He will act - in His time.

God promises His people, through Moses that He will come down and save them from the yoke of slavery the slavery of Egypt.

We must also be assured that just as God will hear us when we cry to Him, He will come down also to save us, His people. Once we have dedicated ourselves to His service as Abraham did, we can be sure that He will save us, and that He will do it on a personal level.

Jubilee 2000 and Debt Relief

FACTS & FIGURES

Jubilee 2000 is a coalition of over 50 Tanzania organisations, including Christian Aid, £4,750,00 Oxfam, VSO and the TUC.

Jubilee 2000 wants to cancel £100 billion of debt owed by 'Heavily Indebted Poor Countries', (HIPCs).

This sum, £100 billion, is less than 10% of the world's currency market's daily turnover.



It is 28% of what Americans spend on gambling each year.

Britain's share is 2.5%, or £2.5 billion.

That's 10% of our annual defence budget.

Or 12.5% of building society 'windfall' profits.

Or 21 % of what we spent on cigarettes last year.

Or about the same as we spend on chocolate every year!

DEBT RELIEF & MARA

Tanzania now owes the 'north' £4,750,000,000.

There are 27,000,000 Tanzanians. Most don't earn money - they grow food and eat it. Most of the 2,000,000 or so who do have paid jobs work for the national minimum wage of £4 a week. Every one of them would have to donate their entire salaries for more than 11 years to pay off the national debt.

70% of the money Tanzania earns from exports now goes on the repayment of debts taken out at low interest rates in the 70's, but repaid at today's higher rates.

That leaves 30% for health, education, transport, police, etc, etc. As well as the rise in interest rates, unfair trading conditions mean the value of Africa's exports fall, whilst the cost of its imports continues to rise.

Jubilee 2000 wants to monitor the debt relief process so that money 'saved' is used to help the poor.

Much aid in the past has been squandered by corrupt politicians, leading to cynicism in Tanzania and throughout Africa, as well as in the donor countries. Jubilee 2000 wants to see schools and clinics - not limousines and palaces.
