This month is one packed with what are arguably the most important events in the Christian calendar and certainly the busiest month in the churches year.

This year more so than most, in that the whole of Passiontide – from the 1st of April (Passion Sunday) up to Easter Day on the 15th, falls in the same month. This creates the strange circumstance that the first half of the month is focussed on our Lord's passion and takes on a somewhat sombre tone as we contemplate the suffering, rejection and death of Jesus. Then, for the second half, we turn our attention upon his resurrection with all the celebration, hope and joy that holds for Christians. Rarely do we find a month so starkly divided!

Unfortunately, it is not something that makes to task of writing this article any easier! The problem is not one of having nothing to write about, but in fact being faced with an 'embarrassment of riches'. There are numerous events of which any one is sufficient for several articles. Beginning with the 1st of April, we have Passion Sunday; on the 8th there is Palm Sunday; the 12th Maundy Thursday, 13th Good Friday; 14th Easter Eve; 15th Easter Sunday; followed by Easter week, 22nd Low Sunday; not to mention St George, Shakespeare and the Queen! Where does one start?

To choose any particular one of these events would be to snub another; to miss any one out would be to deprive the 'season' of any important aspect of the whole. Clearly I am in need of certain attributes; juggling has never been a particular skill of mine nor has dancing (two left feet!) and then when it comes to manual or mental dexterity I seem to have been given (practically and metaphorically) two left hands! So, in this instance, the only course open to me seems to be to perform some sort of balancing act, so that neither the passion or the resurrection is ignored and one isn't given undue precedence over the other.

To attempt this, I would like to turn to the event that falls almost in the middle of the month and certainly in the middle of the two major themes which it encompasses. I am going to look at Easter Eve. A day which marks a lull between the highly charged events of the week leading up to this day and the 'explosion' of energy which typifies the outburst of joy and hope of the days which follow.

In terms of balancing, this day acts as a pivot in the middle of the see-saw. As the passion half goes down, the resurrection side rises. It is often seen as the calm between storms; a lull in what is the most heightened of emotions experienced in the life and faith of the Christian. It is the

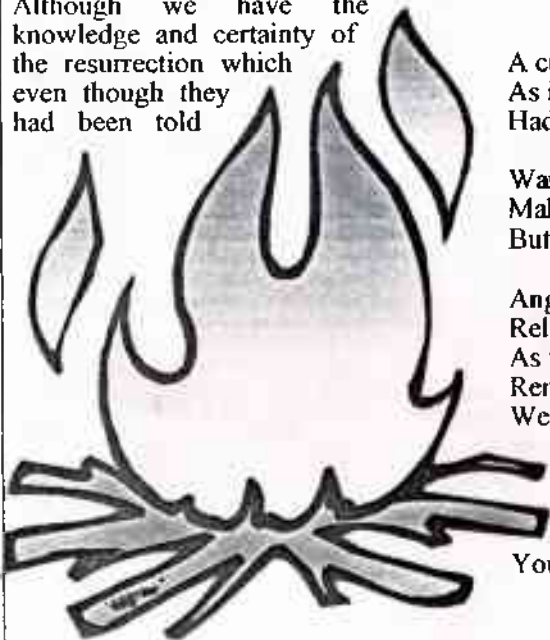

bridge between extremes of religious experience; it marks the transition from sorrow to joy; from a feeling of defeat at the death of our Lord and master, to that victory over death with the resurrection of our Saviour; despair becomes hope as Jesus, friend and teacher, is revealed finally as the Messiah or Christ.

And so we have this day of waiting, before, what we now know, will be a day of joy when death is conquered and we proclaim the victory with the words "Christ is risen; he is risen indeed. Alleluia". A day, which for those first disciples locked away in that upper room in fear and deep sorrow, would not have been a day of anticipation and expectation, but probably the lowest point; the saddest day yet in their discipleship; a day of shock after their sudden and violent bereavement of the day before.

And so, this is where we are left today in the life of the modern church. Although we have the knowledge and certainty of the resurrection which even though they had been told



several times, those first disciples could not yet grasp, we are left like them, waiting. As part of our waiting we stir the embers of hope; we kindle expectation with the lighting of the Easter fire in that poignant and very meaningful service we celebrate on Easter Eve - happily gaining in popularity. But ultimately, we still share a common bond with those early followers, those first Apostles of Jesus as we wait. I hope, as we wait, we can just stay with them for a short while, even though we know what waits us on the next day, that with its total contrast it may be even more a celebration of that victory over death - the death which on that first Easter Eve shrouded their souls.

I would like to finish with a poem that captures for me how those first disciples must have felt on their desperate vigil between the passion and resurrection of their Lord.

Easter Saturday -

As if the worlds life

The April sun
Warming dry grass
Makes pale spring promises
But nothing comes to pass.

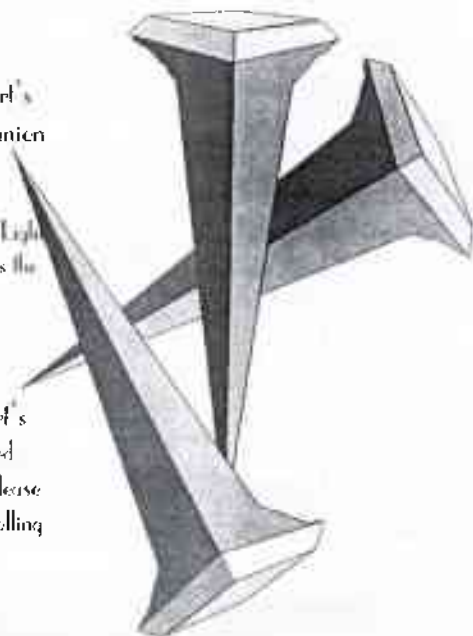

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RETIREMENT? I WISH!

I wonder just how many of you were surprised to hear about my retirement? (see *February issue*) If you were, then I was in good company, because I was not entirely aware that I had retired. However, I have talked to many people at work about retirement, more so since it is only twenty years away for me.

Of course what Sue was saying is that I have retired from writing my usual series of articles for the Parish Magazine. So why, I hear you ask, have I written this one?

Well, in fact I have not retired from writing full time. What I have done is to take stock of what I am doing and tried to rationalise. This is something which I think everyone should do from time to time, and I have probably stated that before in more than one article. What I have not done is to give up on the magazine, or the church, or my passion for teaching and preaching the Good News of the Salvation of Christ, for it is this which fulfils my life.

Over the last two years I have found myself taking on more and more work, not just in church but also in my professional life. I have taken on the role of a Macmillan GP Facilitator in Palliative Care. This is a role funded by Macmillan Cancer Relief. It finds me organising training and teaching for GP's and District Nurses

and their staff in Palliative Care. What is Palliative Care? It is the care of those people whose disease is no longer curable. That usually means cancer, but also includes some chronic neurological diseases, also those suffering from HIV and many other problems. These are patients often looked after in a Hospice, but most patients are looked after in the community. Consequently not only do I perform my role as a full time GP, I also devote seven hours a week to this new role.

However, in order to keep one step ahead of the rest, which is vital when teaching, I have also embarked on the Diploma in Palliative Medicine, which started in September 2000. This is a distance learning course based in Cardiff University of Wales College of Medicine, which means that every week they send me a pack of reading, and an assignment to do. This means that they are giving me on average ten hours of work to do each week. At the end of June I will take the exam and it will all be over. So you can see that I am still keeping quite busy, alongside the work I still do in church and the time I spend with my family, who are top of my priorities.

Palliative care, the care of the dying, is a tremendously rewarding role. It is a time of great spiritual stress for the patient and for the families of

those patients. When I look after these people, and help them to be comfortable with the fact that they are dying, to accept that fact as part of life, to ease their passage from this world into the next, I feel a great weight of privilege. It is at this very important phase of a person's life when deep seated issues come to the surface and a lot of work needs to be done. It is a great privilege when a patient can share this time with me and can help them in whatever way I can and they wish. I see this as an intensely spiritual event, and as pastoral care at its best.

In performing this role, I can combine my professional skills and my pastoral skills together, and I think it is one of the best jobs in the world. Each time I look after one of these patients I become spiritually stronger, and I become a better doctor for having known that patient. I have even learnt some DIY when looking after one patient!

Whilst doing this job, I can relate my spiritual life in church to the task in front of me, and when I am performing my role as Reader in our Churches, I can offer these people to God in prayer. It is a pivotal role between this world and the next.

Perhaps you can sense that I really do enjoy this part of my job. So, Retirement? No chance. There is so much work yet to be done, and with God's grace I will carry on for a long time yet.

Does this mean more doctoring, or more church work? I don't see a difference. There will be more of both. So I don't think I've retired. I'm just hibernating for a while, so don't think I've given up on our churches because I haven't. There is a lot of work for us to do in our churches and in this village, and I will certainly play my part when God hands to me what he wants me to do.

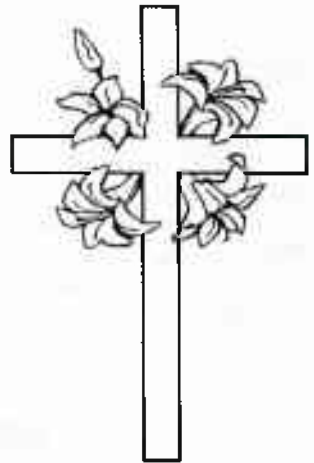

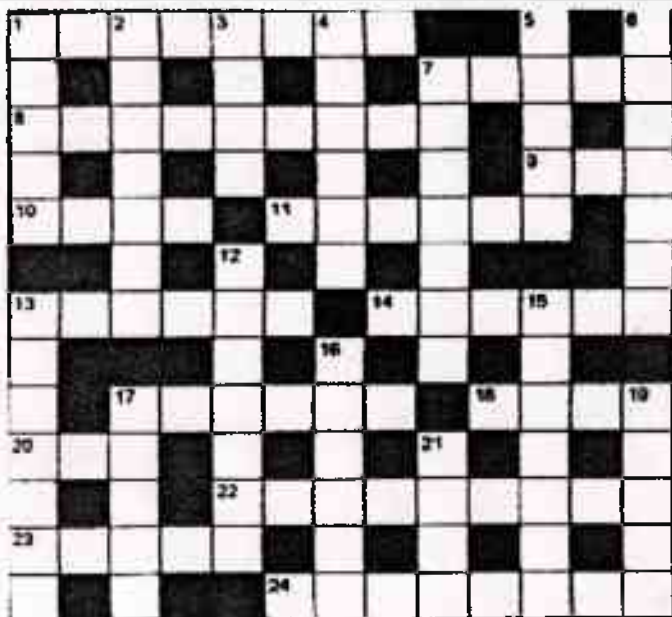
