Parish Magazine:				
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In the months covered by this issue of the magazine we have probably the greatest festival of the sacred and secular worlds combined. Although for the Christian, Easter is arguably the most important festival, it sadly doesn't have as much significance to unchurched people as does Christmastide.

So in this special period (twelve days if counted until Epiphany, or forty days if Christmastide is taken through to Candlemas). we have two of the biggest events of the year, particularly in terms of secular celebration: Christmas Day and New Year's Eve. Two days of feasting. partying and extravagant excesses: two days on which we spend considerably more than any other two days of the year: two days of getting together with friends and family, buying each other presents and generally making every effort to create a happy and memorable time: a time to remember and hold in our minds for years to come.

It is a favourite pastime for many to remember what they were doing at the moment a significant event occurred. For many it might be the Queen's coronation, or the first man walking on the moon, or the day President Kennedy was shot. For football fans it may be when England won the World Cup in 1966, or the Munich air disaster when most of the legendary Manchester United team were killed. Stories in vears to come may include, "do vou remember Christmas 2000 or New Year's Eve 1999 - the eve of the new millennium? We often link our memories to those rare, significant 'once in a lifetime' events in our human history, memories of which are often crystal clear. Other memories may become distorted, however, changing over time or being selectively weeded out by the brain so that they become hazy or only partial in their recollection.

Memories of Christmas can be like that, particularly because it occurs every year. We may remember separate bits of different years and in our minds fit them together to create a memory of that perfect Christmas we had many years ago. We also do this, believe it or not, with the Christmas story itself. Ask anyone on the street or in the supermarket to tell the Christmas story and I'm willing to bet that they will begin with the journey of Mary and Joseph on the donkey to Bethlehem for the census: you may get the annunciation to Mary prior to that, if they have a good memory. You will almost certainly be told the bit



about there being no room at the inn and having to go into the stable where the baby Jesus was born and laid in a manger. Chances are you will be told about the shepherds on the hillside and the throng of angels that appeared to them; they might also remember the bright star leading the three kings or wise men to the stable to see the baby, with their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrth.

This is the sort of potted nativity that the majority of people know from school, the charming nativity plays and tableaux that most have seen, if not taken part in. I wonder however, how many people will know that the story they describe is in fact an amalgam of two separate accounts from the gospels of Matthew and Luke (check for yourself)! There may also be details that are not even in the original accounts, but come from carols, Christmas cards, poems or other sources and have been integrated into the originals over the years. But that is what memory does; it draws together different details from many years, linked by the same event and we end up with the memory of that one perfect Christmas that in reality never actually existed by itself.

The great problem with this sort of 'selected' memory event is that we try and recreate it each year, failing more often than not and ending up feeling disappointed. I'm sure that many of you, like me, have experienced that. The chances of succeeding in recreating this perfect Christmas are even

less when we consider that in each successive year, so much has changed that although we might recreate the picture as near as we can get it — other people or events may not fit into that picture in the same way. In short, sad to say, we will never be able to recreate a memory and any attempts will almost certainly end in disappointment.

Disappointment is a poor way to feel at a time when we should be rejoicing for the hope that this season can offer us; the hope that as Jesus brought joy to the earth by the offer of salvation; so that hope is ever present and can enter our hearts any Christmas-time. The Christmas hope brought by our Lord's incarnation is not a one-off that happened 2000 years ago, but an ever present reality; a constant potential for this and every Christmas.

So this Christmas, especially when we celebrate Jesus' 2000th birthday, let us not struggle to try and relive a memory that may in all probability not be a real event anyway - but live for the present one instead. Let us approach Christmas as though it were our first, as we receive Jesus into our hearts and lives afresh, rejoicing in the hope that this knowledge brings. To coin an old adage, let this Christmas be the first day of the rest of your lives!

In anticipation we wish you a joyous and exciting Christmas and a Happy New Year!

JESUS THE KING

This is a slightly odd title for Jesus in some ways, but a perfect one in others.

The problem for Jesus, was that the Jewish nation were expecting the arrival of the Messiah, to be a great event, which would be marked by a notable victory, and then the Messiah would reign forever in the Jewish nation. This was the prophecy they were waiting to have fulfilled. They were expecting some great and mighty king like King David, to save them from foreign occupation. In essence they were expecting a general to lead an army

Jesus was well aware of this, and even more aware that he was not the king and Messiah they were expecting. This is one possible explanation why Jesus often tells his disciples not to tell other people about his great works. We have already seen that the miracles he performed were often misunderstood.

Jesus never claimed to be a king; he did not deny it when asked directly by Pilate (John 18: 33-40), but it is never a claim he overtly made for himself, probably because of the connotations which the Jews would attach to the title. However, king is a very good description of Jesus.

Once you have accepted that Jesus is more than just a great teacher, whose teaching you can pick and choose from; and consistent with the belief that he is the Son of God and The Christ, then his teachings take on greater meaning. I can follow the teaching of any human being if I like, and I can choose which teaching to follow, when it suits me. However, once I accept that the teaching is

coming from God, then that teaching takes on a different perspective. It becomes more urgent, it takes on more authority, it is much harder to ignore, or pick and choose, You cannot accept Jesus as the Son of God, and then ignore half of what he said. If you accept Jesus as the Son of God then you have to accept all of his teaching as well. Not only accept, but act on it.

Now I would he the first person to say that it is difficult if not almost impossible to act on what Jesus taught. Much of what he teaches is very hard indeed, but that shouldn't stop us trying, otherwise there is no point in listening to him at all.

Making Jesus equal with God, gives the kind of authority which no-one else can have, that is the kind of authority which a king would have. Therefore that makes Jesus the King in our lives. It is he who rules over us, and tells us what we should do, although we know that that is not always easy. However, Jesus is the kind of king who not only sets us the rules; he actually helps us to keep those rules of life.

Earlier this year I spoke about Jesus being our friend. Fancy having a king as a friend! Friends are there to help us. Jesus sets the agenda. We try to keep to it, and when we find it hard, when we fail, Jesus our friend will help us through that difficult patch.



Howard Headteacher Returns from South Africa

I have just about come down to earth after what can only be described as an incredible visit to Rebonwe Primary School in South Africa. Ralephata, the Principal of Rebonwe, who visited the Howards School in March/April this year certainly got his own back as regards having a busy schedule. I saw so much, visited so many places and met so many people but my overwhelming memory will be of the warmth and generosity of everyone that met - particularly in the schools and church. Being welcomed by 1300 children singing as only Africans can and being invited to speak before a 400+ congregation at Church were two of the highlights.

Rebonwe is in the formal township of Ivory Park, near Johannesburg, in quite a poor area with a large unemployment problem. In 1993 it was an empty field – today it is a school, a community where children want to learn and where they can begin to build for the future.

During my visit I was able to go to several of the local schools – one where the children came in shifts (the platoon system), where there were not enough chairs and tables, and where the class sizes ranged from fifty to a

hundred!! But wherever I went the atmosphere and attitude could be to quite tangibly.

The largest class I taught had to children and it was a marvellous experience – especially their reaction when I greeted them in Zulu, Tsong or Sotho (the children are taught in English as well as their tribulanguage). The schools are not well resourced and the books that were collected throughout Wakefield are eagerly awaited – the schools have designated library areas and actually have empty shelves read and waiting!

South Africa is a wonderful country but a country of contrasts. There is tremendous enthusiasm and vitable amongst the people and the parplayed by the schools and the churches is central to the reconstruction and reconciliation the is taking place at the moment. The read ahead will be difficult but the future could be fantastic.

Our links and friendship will continue with further exchanges and visit already planned. Our support an interest is much appreciated and welcomed.

Common Worship starts in Advent!

As most of you will now be aware, the ASB services, which have been in use for the last 20 years will no longer be able to be used by the end of this millennium year. They will be replaced by a whole set of new service which the Liturgical Commission have labelled 'Common Worship.' The Book of Common Prayer (BCP) of course, which have been in use since 1662, will still continue as an authorised form of worship. So now, instead of BCP and ASB we will have BCP and Common Worship.

The first new service we will use will be the Holy communion, or main service in both churches and that will begin on Advent Sunday, December 3rd. We will be using Order One, which is virtually the same as the ASB Rite A. there are one or two slight differences in wording and order, but for the most part we should find it very similar to our old service. The biggest difference is in the eucharistic prayer which the priest says over the bread and wine. Whereas in the ASB we have four prayers which could be used on different occasions (of which we in Ackworth used three), we now have a choice of eight (of which we will be

using four; A, B, F and G). The main thing to watch out for are the congregational responses which are introduced with different words in different prayers. As we have always done, we will print which prayer we will use on the top of the notice sheet.

As I have already said, the service of Holy Communion will be the first to change, followed by Baptism and others as they become ready for use. You may ask, in comment to what I have already said; "If the new service is so similar to the old one we have been using for the last 20 years, why change?" Well quite frankly that is a question I personally would also like to ask those who have made the changes. All I can really offer is an explanation the Liturgical Committee gave in an information booklet they sent out to clergy. In answer to the question "Why do we need new services," they write:

'When the ASB was published, one knew which (if any) of the new services would stand the test of time. The ASB soon became an established part of the worship of the Church of England alongside the Book of Common Prayer, However, after 20 years of use, the weaknesses as well as the strengths of the ASB have become apparent. The General Synod therefore decided that there was a need to revise the ASB, so that the Church could continue to draw on both modern and traditional services '



Remember, they are as new to me as they are to you, so please excuse the occasional inevitable mistakes as I lead you in worship. Together, in time we will become as familiar with the new services as we were with the ASB. Prayers for patience all round I feel, will be the order of the day!



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On-line, Christian Soldiers!



The Internet has become the most important form of communication, and Christians should get on-line. So says a recent Church of England report, Cybernauts Awake!

The report urges that "cyberspace will, willy-nilly, shape our thinking. Rather than allowing it to do so passively, we believe that Christians should seek to play an active role in shaping this process, and thereby influence cyberspace itself.

"Cyberspace is a strong force for social change, and Christians should be using it to work for social justice and evangelisation." Cybernauts Awake! was produced for the Board for Social Responsibility by a working party of scientists and academics who covered topics from internal e-mail systems through to total-immersion virtual reality.

The report goes on to say that "cyberspace is changing how we perceive truth: websites may give the facts behind the stories, but can

mislead and misrepresent; it is changing the way we treat people; we can keep in touch and make friends by e-mail, but there is a risk of confusing the cyber-presence with the person. It is shifting power: anyone with a website can reach the world, but a few organisations have immense power. Its diversity and complexity can be exhilarating, but can cause alienation."

For Christians, "the challenge in cyberspace, as in all other areas of our lives, is to discover God's will and to enact it." The report suggests that Christians should respond positively to cyber-technology because "no part of creation is outside the care and concern of God, including cyberspace."


However, the report doubts that cyberchurches might ever replace tangible congregations. "There are limitations to what cyberspace can do."







She takes up her new office on January 1st, 2001.




