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Dear Friends,

We come round again to the greatest festival in the Christian calendar, the birth of our Saviour.

Early in November I received three Christmas cards and have known for some weeks that the turning of the Christmas Lights in Ackworth will be on Friday 25th November! It seems never ending and hardly surprising that some people dread the approach of Christmas. Certainly there may be more than most this year as the recession continues to bite and unemployment rises, more homes are lost, pensions are eroded and inflation carries on going up.

Christmas for many people will put extra pressure on their already dwindling budgets and what is meant to be a time of joy and celebration will be marred by worry and depression. So, what are we to do? The answer is at the heart of what Christmas is all about. In simple terms we seem to have lost the plot as the central message of Christmas has become lost amidst a fog of commercialism and excess. A saviour who will deliver us from the pains of evil and oppression; free us of our selfish and greedy lives where some people have so much that they throw it away whilst others starve.

In Memoriam Ada Pritchard 1919-2011

Ada was born in the village at Dixon's Yard in Low Ackworth was schooled at Hemsworth Grammar and Pitmans College. She spent all of her life in this village working right up until her retirement at 60. She began her working life as a secretary in Leeds moving to Hickson and Welch at Castleford and finally to a position as personnel officer in Horbury with Dunlop/Slazenger.

For Ada work didn't end at the 'factory gates' though, it was just part of a busy life which continued in the village and the church. She sat on the parish council - as leader for a while - was the 'relief in need' trustee of Ackworth United Charities (who oversaw the almshouses) and was treasurer of the Derby and Joan club. She served the church as a PCC member, stewardship recorder, sidesperson and frequent fundraiser.

Most of all Ada was a much loved and highly respected member of our Church family here in Ackworth. Her strong faith and dedicated service to our Lord has been an example and an inspiration to many people for many years. As Sunday School teacher, organist and choir leader she inspired many to become Christians and be faithful members of the Church. Her help and encouragement to young people both musically and in other ways has left a legacy that can never be repaid. Both this church and this village are indebted to Ada whose influence will long continue to inspire generations to come.

God bless you Ada, and may you long continue to live our hearts and minds.

TEN YEARS ON

Ten years ago the Restoration Fund was launched to raise badly needed money and at All Saints we decided to take up an idea from Sue to have a weekly coffee morning for a while to see what we could raise. So on the 6th of December 2001 we, (Sue, Wendy, Ann & Stella), opened the doors on a cold morning with just coffee, tea & biscuits and a small portable heater for warmth! We had three or four customers. After a while the numbers began to grow and a few buns were added to the biscuits. Then a cake was tried and then another cake and so it grew. The first month raised 46 pounds but by the fourth month the total was over 500 pounds.

After a while Jean moved into Ackworth and joined the 'team' and later still when Janet came to live in the village she also became part of the coffee morning group. As well as the weekly meetings other fund raising efforts have been included such as 'New to you' sales, table top sales, plant sales and sales of recipe books. So far we have raise forty seven thousand pounds.

Sadly during these ten years we have lost some of our customers. We have had some very generous donors too without whose help we could never have hoped to have made such a considerable sum. Unfortunately some of them did not live long enough to see the kitchen and toilet facilities which were completed last spring. We were grateful to all those who continued to brave all the obstacles and disorder to come each week during all the work which had to be done and to those brave souls who came during the dreadful weather last December and January.

Ten years seem to have flown by and what started as a temporary

event now seems part of the life of the village. It is not just for the ladies to get together for a chat we do have a group of men who also enjoy a Thursday morning out too.

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

MINCE PIES

Mince pies have been around as a seasonal treat for over 400 years. Forbidden fruits are often more exciting and this may be why they are so popular for once they were banned by law. Originally mince pies were made of a mixture of meat and spices such as ginger. Sweet ingredients such as dried fruit were added to give a more interesting flavor and also to help preserve the filling rather than smoking or salting.

It may seem strange today that the original filling was mainly meat

and they can still be partly made with meat in the form of suet. However most are now meat free as modern tastes prefer vegetable to animal fat. Mince pies can be all shapes and sizes but the original form was probably a large oblong like a manger, giving a link to Jesus being laid in one in the stable at Bethlehem. Often the topping is a cut out star shape to represent the star seen and followed by the shepherds and kings to find the special new born Child. Nutmeg, cinnamon and cloves added to the filling is said to represent the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh from the kings.

Christmas was abolished in England by Oliver Cromwell's Puritan Council in 1657. The Council seemed to be against any kind of enjoyment or celebration and viewed the festival of Christmas as pagan and over indulgent, leading to gluttony an encouraging too much drinking of alcohol. If this wasn't miserable enough they then passed a law banning among other things, mince pies. To this day the law has not been repealed. This makes the mince pie illegal fare. So the next time you bite into one, at Christmas, remember you are breaking the law as well as putting on those extra pounds!

NORFOLK CHURCHES TRUST SPONSORED BICYCLE RIDE

Saturday 1th September 2011

Three weeks before the event I reconnoitered my proposed route by car, finding it to be too long, I made adjustments, cutting out three churches with too long a distance between them, but adding two others which I did not check out!

The long range weather forecast was not promising: the remnants of Hurricane Katia were advancing across the Atlantic, with strong winds and rain predicted.

Came the day we awoke to a mild, still, cloudy morning but by the start time the sun had come out, but a stiff easterly wind had also risen, from the direction of the first twelve miles of my route along the coast. I assessed the wind strength to be '3' on my personal scale i.e. strong enough to retard.

I arrived at my first church by 09.00 to discover that my rear tyre, checked earlier, was going down; I pumped it up hoping that it was a

temporary valve problem, not a puncture, fortunately it was. At my second church I broke my pencil, essential for making notes to write this article, not to worry I had laid on plenty of spares, although they were of no use lying on the seat outside our caravan! Two mishaps already, a third was sure to follow? (There were to be four).

I made my way along the coast following part of my route from last year, I commented that one hill seemed steeper than last time; the recorder, who gave me a spare pen, replied that it would be worse next year when I would be a year older! The first few miles were challenging, not only against the wind but also due to the undulating nature of the route, don't let anyone tell you that Norfolk is flat. At Trimingham the recorder remarked that he had not been to Yorkshire since WW2, when he was recovering valuable spare parts from a crashed Sterling bomber from his base at RAF Linton-on-Ouse. On to Mundesley where I interrupted a game of handball in a church hall which I mistook for the church. A lady recorder there told me that she was from Doncaster and had played tennis against girls from Ackworth School.

The next stretch I had been dreading, as it included a long steep ascent past the picturesque preserved Stow Windmill, onward to the two churches I had not checked out. One appeared nearby across the field but I found out that it was not as near as it seemed. At least I had now turned west, with the wind no longer in my face, onto designated 'quiet lanes' for the next twenty five miles. As intended there was very little vehicular traffic, although it did come as a shock to be confronted by four motor cycles riding in tandem on one occasion. At Trunch I was greeted by what appeared to be a welcoming party but it was just a changeover of recorders! The wind had increased and blowing from my left was twisting my map case, on a string, round and round and at the next church I had difficulty removing it as it had twisted up so tightly. At Antingham we had to report to the kitchen, as a wedding was taking place, and my arrival was greeted by four Labradors in the garden opposite. At Suffield, about half way as I thought, I arrived to find that the rotating map case was missing; I retraced my steps for 3/4 of a mile before finding it lying in the road, the force of the wind had torn the knotted string out of the holes. I resolved the problem with an old shoe lace I had used to tie up my tools to stop them rattling. The next, an isolated Wesleyan Chapel was the smallest building I came across. It was hardly any larger than a double garage and the recorder was sitting outside although it had started to rain, fortunately only a shower. At Colby I met two ladies who were also taking part, the first fellow travelers since leaving Cromer twenty three miles earlier. At Erpingham I commented on a fine old iron bound chest (12th C I was

told) near the door and the recorder was keen to give me a potted history of the church, but time was of a premium if I were to meet my goal. Shortly afterwards I turned north for the welcome relief of a tail wind. At Aldborough I discovered that I had lost my glasses, I could only have left them at the last church two miles back into the wind and up a long hill. I decided that the extra effort was not worthwhile, the glasses being my sun ones and dispensable. (Four days later I recovered them as we passed by). Next I came to Thurgarton, a redundant church since the 1980's, not surprising as it stood isolated far from any habitation, although this had been the case with many I had visited! On to Sustead where the recorder lady had laid on a fine buffet for callers, unfortunately I felt unable to partake.

Into the last quarter of my route I had to contend with ascending the Holt/Cromer ridge which rises 300feet and contains the highest point in Norfolk, but there was the compensation of a long downhill stretch afterwards back towards the sea.


I finished at 16.30, half an hour before the cut off, having visited 40 churches and covered 45 miles, five more than planned and my longest bike ride for 13 years (28 churches &35 miles last year)

I visited 8 Methodist chapels, 1 Catholic Church, 1 Wesleyan Chapel, 1 Care Home Chapel, Quaker Meeting House &27 Anglican Churches dedicated to All Saint (6). St Margaret(3), St Mary.(3), St Peter& Paul(3), St Andrew(2), St Giles(2), St. Martin(2), and 1 each to St. Botolph, Holy Trinity. St. John, St. Joseph, St. Michael and St. Peter.

I expect to raise over 350 pounds again this year and am grateful to all those who have so generously supported me in this joint fund raising effort; whether I do it again remains to be seen!

PS-On line I have gleaned that there were once over 1,000 medieval churches in Norfolk, 659 remain. There are more churches per acre and per person than anywhere else in the world.

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


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

Please note that any gifts brought to church after the time will not be distributed until next year!






