

Dear Friends

It's that time of year when schools are closed and a large number of the population starts to wind down and take a well earned break from those everyday routines and work. As I write this article, temperatures have been in the 80's for over a fortnight and we have even been given health warnings on TV regarding the hot weather (this is the UK isn't it?).

As I am sure I have commented before in past articles around this time, the word 'holiday' comes from the two words 'Holy Day'; days for whom those in bygone times was a day off to celebrate some religious festival or another. This ties in nicely with the other holiday activity of travelling to another location, in their own country or abroad. This custom also had connections with religious celebrations that journeys were undertaken to visit a particular spot associated with a holy person or event. Thus such journeys -pilgrimages - were synonymous with Holy Days!

I also write for a number of readings in the churches lectionary which had the common theme of religious journeys for the purpose of spreading the Christian gospel (i.e. 7th July: Luke 10:1-11... The sending out of the 70 disciples and 10th July—Matthew:10:1-7...the sending out of the 12 Apostles). Not unusually my thought turned to mission and the notion of not just what we gained from visiting foreign climes, but also what we took with us and left there. In both of these passages when Jesus sends out his disciples to preach the good news by word and deed he is quite definite about what not to take for the journey (no purse, no pack, money, no tunic, no gold, silver or copper, no staff, or sandals; eat only what people offer you).

Regardless of the detail, what it all boils down to is that mainly you are taking just yourself without any baggage; leaving aside baggage money and other possessions we just can't do without on holiday, we take a lot of mental and emotional baggage with us (i.e prejudices, opinions, hang-ups, anxieties, insecurities and so on!) It is this sort of 'baggage' the Jesus was referring to, metaphorically, when he spoke of what to take with us on the journey. It's the sort of baggage that we leave behind us in places we visit. It's this baggage that will leave an impression upon those people and communities which we visit. Not the things we buy, or the lost property we leave in our hotel room or

apartments. Sadly one picture or impression which people in foreign resorts seem to have of the British is that of the mindless 'lager louts'.

So remember, wherever you visit on your holi-(holy)-day this year don't forget that more importantly it's what you leave than what you take away, and it's not what you take in your suitcase or pockets that people will remember you for, but what you carry in your heart and mind, baggage can often be a burden rather than the things we need.

Have a good rest, see you in September,

The Making of a Priest

Wednesday, June 26th, 7:30pm, St Cuthbert's Church. There is an air of anticipation, and air of excitement, and air of expectation. I was about to be ordained as Priest. It was a strange feeling before the first hymn was announced and everyone started singing. I had had some input into the service, and was anxious that it should go well. I had spent many an evening practising with the singing group. But now I was on my own, with a group of clergy from around the Deanery and the Diocese, including an Archdeacon and a Bishop.

The service went well, of course. It was a warm evening, and dressing in cassock and surplice some people said I was glowing. I'm not sure how much of that was a holy glow, or just feeling very hot! There were several moving moments in the service. The entrance of the priests to the singing of "Men of Faith", even if one of the priests was a woman (and a feminist at that!). The moment of the ordination when Bishop Stephen placed his heavy hands on my head, and the priests placed their hands on my shoulders as the words rung out "Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant Paul for the office and work of a priest in your church". The fact that the Bishop came and gave me communion before anyone else, was a bit of surprise. The receiving of yet another Bible, but a version I did not already possess, one we were told to purchase for our training (but I never got round to it). And of course, all the good wishes of everyone around me.

So now, I have been made a priest. Many people congratulated me on making it. Meaning making it as a priest! So this was the culmination of

many years of discernment, including interviews around the Diocese and of course the national selection panel. Of three years of essay writing and discussions and study. Of a year as a Deacon here in Ackworth, grappling with some of the practical aspects of Church Ministry. So now I have made it. What next?

As I preached at my first celebration of Communion the following Sunday I reflected, that we never actually make it. We are always moving on, God is always challenging us with new things, and changes. Yes I have made it as a priest. I have reached this stepping stone, but it is not the end of the journey. It is the beginning of a new one, and who knows where it might lead.

Being a priest is not about roles or tasks or jobs, although inevitably being a priest brings tasks and job. Being a priest is simply that. Being. Being a priest is about who he/she is, not about what he/she does.

So how do you make a priest? In essence, you don't. It is God's work. God and His Spirit is at work in each one of us, changing and moulding us daily by our interactions with him and the world around us which he created. We are who we are because God has made us that way. As Individuals we are defined by our relationship with those around us. But the most important relationship we have, is that which we have with God. And it is that relationship which defines who we are most. God has chosen to mould me into a priest, to work in His Church. Even if I still ask why, I know this is God's work, and part of my being.

I would like to thank everyone for your kind wishes, and cards, and gifts, and especially your support and prayers, and my family for tolerating me whilst I was twittering in the background whilst studying. But I thank God, for putting me in this place, and making me who I am.

"I cannot bear the weight of this calling on my own, but only by the grace and power of God" And I need more prayer still!

Abraham Lincoln wrote the Gettysburg address while travelling from Washington to Gettysburg on the back of an envelope.



USE UP THOSE STRAWBERRIES!

NO COOK STRAWBERRY CHEESECAKE

INGREDIENTS

150 g digestive biscuits
75g butter/margarine
225g softened cream cheese
5 tablespoons caster sugar
200ml double cream (whipped)
Sliced fresh strawberries



PREPARATION

- 1. Melt butter/margarine gently in a pan.
- 2. Finely crush the digestive biscuits and add to melted butter.
- 3. Line a loose bottomed cake tin an d press mixture firmly down.
- Refrigerate until firm.
- 5. Beat together the cream cheese and sugar.
- 6. Gently fold in the whipped cream and spoon the mixture over prepared base.
- 7. Refrigerate for a minimum of 2 hours.
- 8. Garnish with the sliced strawberries.



Christian life is lived in relationship with God through Jesus Christ and, in common with other Christians, seeking to deepen that relationship and to follow the way that Jesus taught.

Central to that relationship is knowing we can trust God. Saint Paul says at the end of the eighth chapter of his letter to the Church in Rome, 'if God is for us, who can be against us?' And this is the heart of faith.

How do we know that 'God is for us'? Because Jesus Christ, the one human being who is completely in tune with God - with what God wants and what God is doing - has carried the burden of our human betrayals of God and running away from goodness. He has let himself be betrayed and rejected, executed in a humiliating and agonising way, and yet has not turned his back on us. Death did not succeed in silencing him or removing him from the world. He is alive; and that means that his love is alive, having survived the worst we can do.

Nothing - says St Paul in the same passage - can separate us from this love. But this isn't an excuse for doing what we like, knowing we can get away with it. Once we know that God is 'for us', we open up to the gift that God wants to give us - which is a share in his own love and freedom and mercy. We breathe with his breath - that's part of what it means to say that we receive God's 'Spirit', which makes us live like Jesus 'in tune' with God. If we have really taken the message in, we shall live lives of selfless generosity, always asking how the gifts given us - material or imaginative or spiritual or whatever - can be shared in a way that brings other people more fully

alive. And we shall be able to trust the generosity of others and be free to receive what they have to give us.

Generosity, gratitude, confidence that when we fail we are still loved - all of this focused on Jesus' life and death and resurrection. That's where we start in the lifelong job of being a Christian.
