

Dear Friends

Palm Sunday to Easter Day is without doubt the most important week in the Christian calendar and certainly the busiest for the Church and its clergy. With at least 12 services, not counting prayer and meditations and any funeral which may come along, I often feel exhausted when I get to Easter Monday and am very appreciative of the next few days holiday. Quite often I say to myself, another one down - another 9 (or whatever) to go!

Perhaps not unusually, this is the way that many Christians look at Holy Week, as a series of individual services, each with its own theme which relate powerful events in our Lord's life. I was reading something recently which suggested that we try to look at Holy Week as a whole; a journey from Palm Sunday to Easter Day - a journey which relates the prime motive of Jesus' ministry to the world he came to save. It is a journey which teaches us about humanity and God's relationship to it. We see, in the week a Jesus at both his most vulnerable in human terms and all powerful in heavenly terms as he wins victory of the most ultimate of enemies to human life - death itself. It is a journey in which we see the worst of human nature when even his best friends desert him and he is brought to the point of dereliction when even he doubts God his father's purpose. Also the best of human nature, raised to touch the divine when Jesus, fully human takes upon himself all that the darkest side of humanity can do to its own and still loves it to the point of complete forgiveness. Finally, that love defeats the world that the evil of human nature can do to another human; death - the ultimate of dereliction, hate and sorrow.

We begin the week on Palm Sunday with what humans see as a victory when they cheer a new king, only to find that this king doesn't meet their human expectations and their joy turn to hate on Good Friday. However, we end the week with God's victory - love's victory! On Easter Sunday we celebrate the ultimate victory - the victory of love over death. Jesus embraces death as he rides into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to conquer it on Easter Day so that we may never have to fear death again. I see what death can do to people's lives time and time again - the fear and the deep sadness to the point of breakdown. On Easter Sunday Jesus frees us from the light of darkness to give us new hope; new life!

Easter then is a celebration of life and love after our Lord had been through the opposites in that Holy Week journey. Alleluia, Christ is Risen is our victory cry as we celebrate our freedom from sin and death. Holy Week is our Lord's journey from earth to heaven from the death of all he embraced as a human being to the new life of God's love, promised to all who would follow him, walk with him on that journey. We have already begun our preparations for that journey through Lent let us now walk through this final week with our Lord, that we may share in and proclaim his victory on Easter Sunday

St Cuthbert's Day 20th March

The life of Saint Cuthbert is usually celebrated on 20th March, on the anniversary of his death in 687. However, it is sometimes moved, and celebrated on September 4th, the anniversary of the translation of his relics to Durham Cathedral. This year, at St Cuthbert's Church Ackworth, we celebrated his life at our main service on 16th March. Cuthbert is a very well known saint, especially in the North of England, and undoubtedly in Northumbria, where he spent much of his life.

He was born to a well-to-do Saxon family in the Scottish lowlands. His job as a shepherd, gave him ample time for prayer. The story is that one night whilst tending the sheep on the hillside, he saw angels carrying a soul into heaven. This was the night that Aidan founder and Bishop of Lindisfarne died. On this night Cuthbert resolved to devote his life to Christ. He became a monk at Melrose Abbey in 651, and prior there in 661. He undertook several missionary journeys around the north of England. He attended the Synod of Whitby, a meeting of several prominent Bishops, who were gathered to negotiate and sort out difference between the northern, Celtic Church, and the southern, Roman Church. This synod was attended by Wilfred Abbot of Ripon who persuaded the Synod to adopt the Roman way of calculating Easter, amongst other Roman customs. Cuthbert returned to the North and became Prior of Lindisfarne, adopting the Roman customs.

Following this, he spent a lot of time in solitude, on Inner Farne, and what is now, St Cuthbert's Island, just off Lindisfarne. He was persuaded to return to Lindisfarne as Bishop where he was known for

travelling his Diocese and his zeal in preaching and teaching as he travelled, with gifts of healing and prophecy. He died on 20th March 687 and was buried at Lindisfarne. Eleven years later his was body was moved to a new shrine, when the monks found his body to be incorrupt. From then on he was venerated, and the cult of St Cuthbert grew.

As the Vikings approached the North of England, and Lindisfarne, the monks there took the remains of Cuthbert, and travelled around the North of England and Southern Scotland, eventually resting permanently in Durham, where a Saxon church was built over his remains. In 1104 his body was translated to the new Norman Durham Cathedral, and when examined was reputed to be still incorrupt. In 1828 his bones were re-examined and reburied in their present site, but his vestments and pectoral cross were removed.

These are the bare facts of his life, his biography, but says nothing of his achievements in spreading the word of God in the North East of England at the end of the first one thousand years of Christianity. An image of St Cuthbert can be seen in the centre of the East Window of St Cuthbert's Church Ackworth. He holds something very interesting in his hands. Do you know what it is, and what is it's significance?

NORTH SEA SURGE-5TH DECEMBER 2013

On January the 15th we returned to Norfolk to attend a funeral and took the opportunity to visit familiar sites that we had been informed had been damaged in the December storm.

We called first at Blakeney for lunch to be advised that the coast road, through Cley by the Sea, was still closed following the previous weeks helicopter fatality. Being familiar with the back roads we journeyed inland to avoid the closure, and at one point in a very narrow lane we were confronted by a 'Coasthopper' bus which had also been diverted!

We visited our caravan site to find that there had been two cliff

falls. Although our caravan is unlikely to be threatened in our lifetimes some near the edge are becoming vulnerable. Nearby at the adjacent car park, a heavy cliff fall had carried away a large pile of lobster pots which had been stored on top of the cliff for some years.

On to Cromer where the devastation was hard to believe. Planking on the pier which we had watched being re-laid in the summer had been torn up like matchwood. A shop and the Pier Pavilion booking office had been inundated by the deluge and left in disarray. The cafe had been cleared up and was drying out. In the distance we could see the gaps in the lines of beach huts where some had been washed away and others were upturned and damaged. The promenade had been mainly cleared of debris although massive heaps of shingle was piled against the sea wall. There were many ragged gaps in the concrete balustrade between the beach and promenade and the children's amusement park equipment had been devastated, as had the adjoining amusement arcade. Iron railings which bordered the cliff paths had been broken in places and two lamp posts broken off ten feet above the ground. The steep cliffs between the beach and the town had been scoured of large areas of clay/earth which made the buildings above look vulnerable to future subsidence unless urgent re-enforcement work is undertaken.

ACKWORTH COMMUNITY LIBRARY CELEBRATES

On the 1st March, 2014 Ackworth Community Library celebrated its first birthday. The library, situated within the Parish Council building on Bell Lane, was closed by Wakefield M.D.C. in February, 2013 but quickly reopened as a community facility by a band of dedicated volunteers supervised by librarian, Helen Worth.

The library now boasts over 650 active members and 20 volunteers from the ages of 14 to 80 and offers the same facilities as the old library, and more.

As well as fiction, children's library, local history, reference and talking books internet access is available and courses in basic computer skills are already on offer. The Trustees are hoping to offer support for jobseekers in the near future along with additional facilities for teenagers, and additional courses in non-vocational subjects including creative writing, music and healthy eating.

The library relies completely on public donation of books, time and cash and there will be an ongoing programme of fundraising events throughout the year.

Opening hours are Monday and Saturday 9.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m./ Tuesday and Thursday 1.00 p.m. to 6.00 p.m.

SOME FACTS FROM 'SAYWELL'

St. Cuthbert's clock

"A church tower is scarcely complete without a clock, but it was not until 1879 that subscriptions were raised to purchase one. The present clock was supplied by Messers. Potts and Son, of Leeds, and inserted by them in 1879. Its cost was £100, and the works were first set in motion by Miss Fallon, the Rectors daughter."

Many thanks to Mr. Tom Precious who kindly looks after the clock

and ensures its accuracy and well being.

St. Cuthbert's organ

"The old organ having become dilapidated, the Rector and Churchwardens decided to have a new one built, and the work was entrusted to the late Mr. Booth of Wakefield. The old organ was sold for £10. The new instrument cost £322, and was inaugurated in 1874, by Mr. Rogers, the organist of Doncaster Parish Church. The new instrument although small, contains some remarkably sweet pipes, and several stops, contained only in continental organs, the tones of which Mr. Rogers exhibited with considerable skill and taste."

A St. Cuthbert's epitaph

"Hannah Camplin must have been a most estimable young person if the following epitaph upon her gravestone in Ackworth Churchyard accurately describes her qualities:

'Her manners mild, her temper such,
Her language good, and not too much.'
She died August 18th, 1837, aged 27. She was evidently too good for
this world; had she lived, the manners, temper and language of
Ackworthians might have been leavened into something very differently;
but 'Those whom the Gods love, die young.'


