Dear Friends

Partly for those who were unable to get to the meeting and partly to inform people of the priorities for our church over the next year, I have decided to write a precis of my report to the Annual General Meeting. Though much of the report may seem to be gloomy, as many of the figures (attendance and financial income) are on the decline, this would not be the first time that the Church, both locally and nationally, has seen a dip, but after 2 millennia it is still the largest religion in the world and will do far more than to live to fight another day. Whilst the media may delight in reporting decline in the Christian Church, the church has never been stronger than when its back is against the wall. What may be seen as insurmountable problems by one person are seen by people of faith as challenges that can be overcome.

As regards church leadership in our parish, David Teece, our curate, left us at the end of January to move on to pastures new. Last year, however, Paul Fox was deaconed and will be priested in June this year. The average attendance at our weekly services has seen a dip over the last year, more specifically the evening service at All Saints is down to 3 or 4 attending. It is a disappointment to see some of our regulars staying away for the baptism services on the last Sunday of each month. On a day when we have more non-church goers than any other Sunday, we should be out in force to encourage and make our occasional visitors feel welcomed. The all-age Eucharist on the second Sunday has been abbreviated to make it shorter and it would be good to see more younger people being encouraged to come! In terms of improving our 'communications', we have purchased a 'standalone' sound system for St Cuthbert's which is portable and flexible. Finally, 2013 has seen the start of our new Mothers and Toddlers Group which meets on the first Thursday of each month at All Saints. This can only be a positive move forward in welcoming younger families into our churches.

In the year ahead, we look forward to the installation of new audio/visual equipment into St Cuthbert's which will broaden the scope and variety of our worship. As already mentioned, we look forward to the Priesting of Paul Fox on June 26th and we hope to host a Confirmation Service later in the year. So much for the good news – and now for the challenges that face us in the year ahead! I have already mentioned my concern regarding falling attendances and this may be connected with my other major concern for the year ahead. In a nutshell, we are struggling financially. In particular it is in our weekly giving, both via envelopes and in the collection plate. For the 3rd year running our collections are down on the previous year and our ability to live within our income is virtually cut to the bone. In 2011 we received £37,147, compared with £34,284 in

2012 (almost £3,000 down); this year alone, in the first 2 months of January and February our giving was £4,532 compared with £7,293 for the same period in 2012 – an alarming drop of some £2,761 for two months only. Clearly, if this trend continues through the year then we would be in serious financial difficulties by the end of the year. Reported in the P.C.C. minutes for April, Anne our Treasurer says with some concern that in the 1st quarter of 2013 giving is down by £1,000 per month.

Desperate though the situation may seem, it is not a time to despair but a time to rise to the challenge. In the first instance I appeal to you all to examine your consciences and your budgets carefully and see if you could increase your level of giving. I know that we live in difficult financial times, but our church is suffering as well as businesses and individuals; I can only appeal to your love for the church and your generosity, which has always seen us through in past years. Secondly I would welcome any suggestions or offers of help that will help us to raise extra income.

I thank you for your continued faith and support in anticipation of conquering this challenge to the Church here in Ackworth. Yours in Christ

EASTER IN NORFOLK

It has been three years since we were last in Norfolk over Easter, so we were glad to join Sheringham Churches Together for their annual Service and Procession of Witness again on Good Friday.

We had our usual doubt as to the starting time, arriving in the centre of the town at 11.00 to find no evidence of what we hoped was to take place. Colin noticed a Salvation Army bandsman in a nearby shelter and he advised us that he was from Milton Keynes but believed

the service was due to start at 11.15. Sure enough a few minutes later a horde of people arrived from the direction of St. Peter's, the local Church of England Church. As last time there were no street closures or police presence and a disabled motorist had parked on the double yellow lines in the middle of the usual place designated for the service!

The service was led by the local Free Church minister, with prayers, a modern language version of the Easter Story and there were two hymns which were 'When I survey the wondrous cross' and 'There is a green hill' accompanied by the Salvation Army Band. Afterwards we processed through the town to climb Beeston Hill, known locally as Beeston Bump, a 200 foot humpback prominent feature of the coastline the site of a World War Two Observation Post, the foundations of which are still visible. After a steep half mile climb, including 51 steep steps, we were congratulated upon reaching our goal, as many of the 200 or so climbers were quite elderly. The panoramic view now includes the forty or more wind turbines of the Sheringham Shoal wind farm on the horizon and this year the big top and caravans of Russell's International Circus, in addition to the rooftops of the town. The Cross was raised and there were further prayers and then the blessing was given.

As we approached the village, where our caravan is sited, two miles away, the cross could be seen standing proudly amongst snow flurries against the darkening sky. On Easter Day we were pleased to note that it was still there and had not been subjected to vandalism as had occurred previously.

Her favourite cake is Date and Walnut so we made sure that this week one of us had made one. She always asks for 'a weak tea please' and you can be sure that it is -in fact it looks like barely coloured water -but then 'the customer is always right!

No matter what the weather she always tries to come -even some of the unpleasant winter weather doesn't deter her. Many of the other friends she has at the coffee mornings had brought her cards and some presents too. The reason for this special celebration was that she was having her 95th birthday! Of course she had to endure the off key singing of Happy Birthday.

This brought back memories of another stalwart of All Saints' Church celebrating her 95th birthday in Church. It was Miss Ethel Smith who lived next door and who was a great supporter of all we did. It was to be her last communion on the Wednesday morning and she was really surprised when Paul announced her birthday and led us in the rendering of Happy Birthday. If you have an old copy of the All Saints' cake recipe book the front cover shows Ethel walking along the pavement in front of the Church.

LIQUORICE

Anyone living in this part of the world is familiar with this product and indeed Pontefract has given its name to the famous 'Pontefract Cakes'. Liquorice has been around for centuries, in fact the Egyptian Pharaoh Tutankhamen had a jar of it buried with him to keep away the evil spirits. Emperor Napoleon found that eating it helped him to relax. During the Second World War liquorice was given to the soldiers after it was found that the Japanese troops fighting in the jungle used it to quench their thirst. Another fan of it was Hannibal who gave it to those famous elephants to give them extra energy when making the crossing of the

Alps.

Every year now of course there is the Liquorice Festival in Pontefract and there is even a Liquorice Queen.

When I was young the town smelled of liquorice and there were four factories producing it. I used to see the young women going to work with their hair in curlers under their headgear ready for their evenings out. It was good if one knew someone who worked at Wilkinson's or one of the other factories because, if lucky, one might be given some of the off cuts. To this day I still prefer liquorice allsorts to any chocolate. My grandfather and my two uncles farmed in Pontefract and I remember them growing liquorice in the field off Knottingley Road. I well recall chewing the root until all the flavor had gone. Nowadays it is used in cheese making, teas and ice cream. Today liquorice is said to help with stress, clear coughs and help digestive upsets and in 2012 was named Medicinal Plant of the year..

KEEPSAKES - MEMORIES

During the long, cold, dark days of winter I was thinking of something to do which would pass away the time. I thought of playing some nice music so I decided to clear out some drawers and cupboards. What would I find? What should I keep? And what should be consigned to the dustbin?

I found a gold cross which had belonged to a great aunt which had been bought for her 21st. birthday around 1900. It was then given to me in 1953 when she died. There was a Bible given to me by my granddad and my best friend, when I was 11 in 1960.

There were lots of books belonging to Kitty Cooper, a good Church friend, who sadly died a few years ago. Then there were three beautiful cross stitch pictures all with special things on them. One had the Lord's Prayer worked on it, another had a picture of St. Cuthbert's Church, and a third was a sampler done to celebrate our Silver Wedding in 1995, all done by Church friends. There were cards sent for my Confirmation in1993 and there were lots of photographs of my delightful God children christened at St. Cuthbert's Church.

There were too, small tokens of gifts given from the many friends I have made on my Pastoral Care visiting. You can guess what happened to them all! Yes, all put safely back again to look at on another rainy day. Treasures for me, memories of my Christian journey so far. Ann Atack

Are you feeling the pinch? As a result of the recession, many people are having to tighten their belts and make cutbacks. High street shops are going into liquidation, and businesses are closing their doors. Many more are finding it difficult to make ends meet; and so is our church.


Each year we are required to pay a sum in excess of £40000 to the Diocese to cover diocesan expenses, and last year our running costs of gas, electricity, insurance, etc. came to a total of £16590. This meant that our basic weekly expenses amounted to £1110. Repairs and maintenance were additional extras. Inflation inevitably means that this year's bill will be even higher.

By March this year our income was already down by £3000 on last year's figures. This is a huge decrease in income so early in the year, which if it continues will leave us in the impossible situation of not being able to pay our bills.

Knowing that it is difficult for all those who are feeling the pinch, all I ask is that everyone considers the importance of keeping our churches alive and gives as generously as possible throughout the months ahead.
